EDWARD EVERETT HALE DEAD.

Noted Boston Divine Passed Away After Strenuous Life to Better Humanity.

BOSTON, Mass., June 10.—The morning light was breaking as the venerable Rev. Edward Everett Hale, D. D., chaplain of the United States Senate, Unitarian divine, philanthropist, author, journalist and lover of peace, breathed his last today in his home in Roxbury.

On his return from Washington, a few weeks ago, it was reported that Dr. Hale was not in good health, but he soon regained his activities and until Tuesday, attended meetings and received friends.

It seems today as if the whole country joined in mourning the loss of Dr. Hale. Messages expressing sorrow and esteem, poured into the Hale household, one of the first being from President and Mrs. Taft.

As an author, his fame rests on the short stories, such as The Man Without a Country; as an instigator of the social uplift, the work of the two great organizations, the Lend-Hand clubs, the King's Daughters, will always be to his renown; as a minister and pastor, his half a century in the pulpit of the South Congregational church and his preaching in many other churches, were unusually prolific of wise spiritual inspiration, while as a historian, drawing patriotism from his famous uncle, Captain Nathan Hale, the Revolutionary martyr, his writings and antiquarian works have become authorities.

It was Dr. Hale, who, twenty years before its consummation, predicted a world-wide peace tribunal; it was Dr. Hale who upheld Garrison and Phillips in their anti-slavery work; it was Dr. Hale, whose benevolent counsel brought comfort to the sick and wounded soldiers of the battlefields of the civil war, as a member of the sanitary commission and it was Dr. Hale who gave to the world the famous stanza:

Look up and not down; Look forward and not back; Look in and not out; Lend a hand.

Said Senator Henry Cabot Lodge, upon learning of his death: "That which will be longest remembered will be his unwearying services to his fellow men."

HEARST WILL GET PULP AREAS

Arrangements for Purchase of Large Tracts of Timber Land.

NORTH SYDNEY, N. S., June 10.—W. H. Taylor and T. J. Freeman arrived here last night from Newfoundland. The latter is largely interested in the immense pulp wood areas on the west coast of Newfoundland, for the purchase of which negotiations are now being conducted by Wm. H. Hearst, the American newspaper publisher.

several millions of dollars. On the train arriving here last night were eight gentlemen representing the Hearst party, who accompanied Messrs Taylor and Freeman to the Ancient Colony.

This early start, it is thought, means business on the part of Mr. Hearst, and it only requires the decision of the engineers as regards the water power and other facilities being equal to the requirements to remove this project from the realms of uncertainty and make it an accomplished fact, thus converting Fortune and Hermitage Bays into a laboring centre, equal to if not greater than the Harmsworth's at Grand Falls.

The project, when completed, will mean the erecting of an up-to-date pulp mill plant in the vicinity of Bay Despair, costing from \$10,000,000 to \$15,000,000. The territory covered by the land in the above deal includes a tract of 16,000 miles, situated between Bay Despair and Bay Dunrod, and it is said to be one of the richest and vastest lumber areas in Newfoundland.

Mr. Taylor, who is connected with the sale, only three weeks ago disposed of 250,000 acres, or about 385 miles of lumber areas on the Ganda River, on the east coast of Newfoundland, the purchasers being a syndicate of capitalists belonging to Syracuse, N. Y. The latter company will also erect pulp mills, which when completed, will represent an outlay of \$3,000,000 within three years. Mr. Taylor has been instrumental in putting through such deals, nearly all of which were of the same magnitude as the sales above referred to, today, 50c at all dealers.

Suit For \$22,000,000.

A suit for an estate in Walkerville, Essex County, valued at \$22,000,000, and which, if won, will make C. H. Labadie treasurer of the Hamilton National Insurance Co., of South Bend, Ind., richer by \$8,500,000, will be started in Toronto, according to a report despatched from Laporte, Ind. Hiram Walker purchased the estate from an uncle of Labadie, into whose hands it had come from Labadie's grandfather. This transaction, according to the allegation which will be made, was in no sense legal, as the uncle only held the estate in trust and had no right to dispose of it.

Labadie, who has been empowered to act as attorney by the several heirs, asserts that if the case is lost in Toronto it will be taken to the Chancery Court of London. On the estate is the Walker distillery.

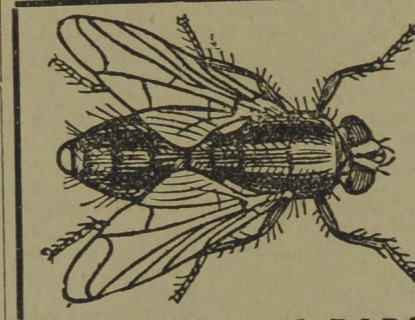

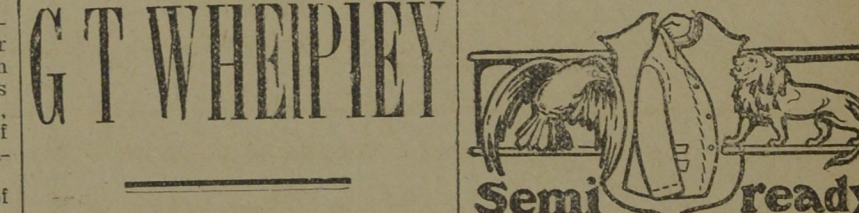
