MENDING SOO LOCKS

Hon. G. P. Graham Starts Off For Scene of Trouble.

MAY RESUME ON MONDAY

Chance Is That Damage May Be Repaired to Start Traffic Again In a Few Days—Iron Ore May Have to Be Dumped to Stem Heavy Current of Water—Accident Was a Thrilling One, It Is Said.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., June 11.—The loading of hundreds of tons of pig iron on cars at the Algoma Iron Works and dumping it into the canal from the swing bridge appeared the only method of stopping the torrent which continues to sweep through the Canadian lock. At noon all the wickets except one had been placed. This concentrated the current on the narrow space where the wicket was to fall. After much labor the wicket was lowered a short distance only to find a huge boulder impeding it. In the effort to raise the wicket again the frame work was bent so that it cannot be raised or lowered. The crucial test is now on; the entire nineteen-foot fall is concentrated in the small place to be occupied by this wicket. A question arises, too, whether the other wickets will be able to hold, as the last one is lowered and the strain is put upon them as well.

Those who witnessed the accident claim that the boats escaped by a miracle. The Walker came into the lower gates at great speed, and the high wall of water held behind the gate came down with tremendous velocity. The lines of the Assiniboia were snapped like strings, and she barely missed the Walker as she came out of the chamber. The Crescent City followed, and marine men cannot understand how she escaped the sill of the lock. She stuck there for a short time and teetered like a seesaw until she finally tore loose and came down, crashing into the Assiniboia and later into the Walker. Had the Walker crossed the channel and the two boats piled into her a record wreck in the history of North American marine would have occurred. The Assiniboia was crowded with passengers, and there is no doubt that hardly a soul would have escaped.

Outside of the damage to the canal the disaster had no bearing on the other industries in the Soo. The water in the power canal, which feeds the pulp mill and the dynamo rooms, lowered nearly a foot just as the accident occurred, and after that regained its level.

Hon. Mr. Graham returned yesterday afternoon from New York, where he was for several days conferring with the commission of expert engineers which has in hand the preparations of plans for the Quebec bridge. Mr. Graham left at midnight for Sault Ste. Marie, to personally inspect the damage to the locks on Wednesday. Experts of the Department at Toronto will meet him here. A telegram was received from J. W. Ross, superintending engineer of the canal, that the locks might be in shape to accommodate traffic as early as Monday night, though the work might require a longer time.

C.P.R. Conductors.

Winnipeg, June 11.—Eight C.P.R. conductors representing the unions of this body from the Atlantic to the Pacific, who have been in session in Winnipeg for the last two weeks, left Wednesday for Montreal, where they will take their troubles before Sir Thomas Shaughnessy. The committee came to Winnipeg in the first instance because of the fact that the trouble was principally on the western lines. The visit to the president would indicate that they are of a serious nature.

Capital May Flee to Canada.

London, June 11.—In the House of Commons yesterday Mr. Arthur J. Balfour, attacking the budget, said there were two great portions of the Empire which were in no fear of the income tax—Canada and India. High authorities had told him that as a result of that kind of legislation capital would find its natural use in those countries. He was afraid that was so.

Forest Fires in Nova Scotia.

Guysboro, N.S., June 11.—Destructive forest fires are devastating eastern Guysboro County. The drought of the past three weeks has made the forest as dry as tinder and within the last two days fires have started in six different places within sight of Guysboro town. Whole belts of valuable timber have been wiped out.

Dunsmuir Begs Off.

Victoria, B.C., June 11.—Lieutenant-Governor Dunsmuir has asked to be relieved of the duties of his office. He has written the Governor-General-in-Council to this effect, but has consented to remain in office until a successor can be found. His terms of office of five years had another year yet to run.

Sold Ring For a Quarter.

Pelleville, June 11.—A few days ago a stranger sold a ring to a hack-driver at the G.T.R. station here for 25 cents. The ring was solid gold with a diamond, valued at \$150. The police yesterday received word that the ring had been stolen from the store of J. S. Gill, jeweller, Sudbury.

Tug Sea Lion Run Down.

Victoria, B.C., June 11.—The tug Sea Lion of Seattle was run down on Wednesday by the schooner Oceania Vance during a thick fog about five miles east of Race Rocks. The crew escaped in the tug's boats and made Port Angeles.

Compulsory Half-Holiday.

Ottawa, June 11.—D. H. Ross, trade agent at Melbourne, Australia, reports to the Trade and Commerce Department that the State of Victoria has passed a law for a compulsory half holiday on Saturdays.

PRESS IS TO BLAME

Lord Morley Says Newspapers Can Prevent International War.

RE-BARBARISM IS NONSENSE

So Declares Lord Milner In a Speech Before the Imperial Press Conference at London—Day Is Given Up to Literature and Lord Morley Makes an Appeal for Simplicity—Beresford to Travel.

London, June 11.—(C.A.P. Cable).—At the Imperial Press Conference yesterday Lord Morley presided. Mr. Birrell, Lord Milner, and Winston Churchill were present. The subject was "Literature and the Press."

Lord Morley asked the editors to strive for two moderate aims—simplicity and directness.

"I know of no more stupendous and overwhelming fact," said Lord Morley, "than the supreme dominance of the English tongue over the millions in the new worlds in the west and the ancient worlds in the east."

Referring to what he called the "rebarbarism of Europe—the rattling back into arms and the preparation to use arms," of which so much had been heard in the course of the conference, Lord Morley said he thought the press was more answerable for this than all the Ministers, officials and diplomatists taken together, and he pleaded for a systematic and persevering work on the part of newspapers on behalf of peace among the nations.

Winston Churchill reminded the pressmen that confidence bred confidence between nations, and hatred and suspicion bred the very dangers wherefrom they originated.

Lord Milner said they had heard much about the rebarbarization of Europe. He thought it dreadful nonsense. If they reflected they would remember that disputes between nations now were settled less by war than ever before. One of the most powerful reasons was that nations were organized on the system of national armies, and it was the citizen armies which made for peace.

Hon. Arthur J. Balfour, presiding at a lunch at the Constitutional Club to the press delegates, said: "We are all parochial in our instincts. Unless we can cultivate amongst the populations of the Empire the imaginative, sympathetic insight, based upon knowledge, which is the only solid bond of unity, we shall deprive ourselves of the greatest of all aids to unifying the Empire into an organic whole."

He was sure the press would preach that local security must fundamentally depend on imperial security. In the Government of the Empire the parental stage was over. We now had reached the stage of formal equality. No one desired to disturb it. He was proud to belong to an Empire, the parts whereof found absolute independence no bar to higher unity.

Lord Charles Beresford has intimated that he will visit Canada in the autumn.

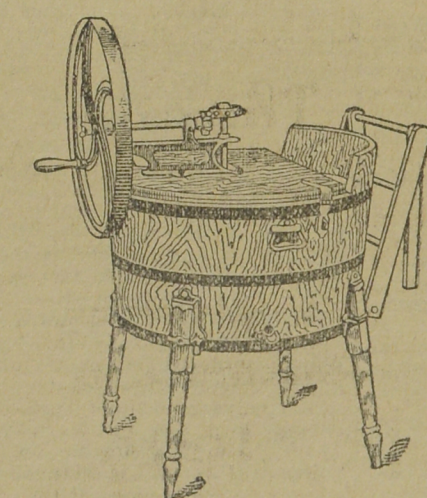
