

PLANS ABOUT READY.

New Quebec Bridge Will Be of Cantilever Type on Old Site.

OTTAWA, June 10.—Hon. George P. Graham, minister of railways and canals, returned today from New York, where he met Commissioners Vautlet, Fitzmaurice and Moderski, who have been preparing plans for the new Quebec bridge. Work has advanced to a stage which will enable the commission to report in a few days upon their plan. In his final conference with them, Hon. Mr. Graham told the commissioners that Canada wanted a substantial bridge built as expeditiously and economically as possible but that the government did not want strength sacrificed to their speed or economy.

It is known that the commissioners have practically settled upon a bridge of cantilever type upon the site of the old bridge with 150 feet clear space above high tide and a greater capacity than was de-

signed for the old bridge.

While in New York Hon. Mr. Graham visited the Hudson terminals, which give accommodation to several railroads brought by the tunnel from Jersey City.

Tonight Hon. Mr. Graham left by the first train for the Soo to give his personal attention to the repairing of the damaged locks. A telegram was received from J. W. Ross, superintending engineer of the canal that the locks might be in shape to accommodate traffic as early as Monday night, though the work might require a longer time. However, in view of the importance of this avenue of traffic Hon. Mr. Graham decided that work should be pushed with the greatest expedition and his presence on the scene might promote this. He does not expect to return to Ottawa until traffic is again passing through the canal.

TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS.

A freight engineer was killed in a collision near Three Rivers, Que. Ex-Banker Roy is in the St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary hospital with diabetes.

Peter Welch, an M.C.R. sectionman, was killed by a train at West Lorne yesterday.

C.P.R. traffic for the week ending June 7, was \$1,424,000; for the same week last year, \$1,222,000.

Charges preferred against Charles and John Little, hotelkeepers of Maldstone, of inducing witnesses to commit perjury, were dismissed yesterday.

The world's record for a day's run by a trans-Atlantic liner has been moved up a couple of miles by the Mauretania and now stands at 673 nautical miles for the day.

"The Girl in Blue," a burlesque dancer recently sentenced to eight days imprisonment in Montreal, is now out on \$500 bail in New York City for "offending public propriety." Joseph Hurtig, the theatre manager, is similarly accused.

Montreal Druggists' Troubles. Montreal, June 11.—As the result of an action taken by the Pharmaceutical Association against Hanfield, the druggist, a thousand actions are entered. Hanfield was charged with selling cocaine, and his brothers, lawyers, have entered eight actions against 150 druggists for selling cocaine illegally. These failed on a technicality. They are bound to get their revenge, and have entered a test case, being followed by 150 others for selling liquor illegally.

The practice is general by all the druggists, and the only defence can be that the offence is technical. The penalty is \$50 or \$100, of which the informer gets a quarter.

Mustn't Smoke Cigarettes. Seattle, Wash., June 11.—The new anti-cigarette law went into effect at midnight on Wednesday. Any person who has them in his possession is subject to a fine and imprisonment. The Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition police will enforce the law strictly.

A Seizure of Furs. Belleville, June 11.—Capt. Hunter, fish and game inspector for Eastern Ontario, has made a big seizure of hides and furs near Pembroke. They are supposed to belong to poachers in the Algonquin Park district.

Autos Prohibited. Rome, Ga., June 11.—The little town of Seney, near here, has adopted an ordinance prohibiting the use of automobiles within the city limits.

In Montreal Next. London, June 11.—Montreal was finally decided upon yesterday as the next meeting place of the High Court of Canadian Order of Foresters.

Five Thousand Premier's Offer. Wellington, N.Z., June 11.—Premier Ward yesterday was presented with an illuminated album containing the signatures of 5,000 citizens who endorse his action in making an offer of a Dreadnought to Great Britain.

Kingston Monument to Mowat. Kingston, June 11.—It is proposed here to rear a monument in the city park, at the extreme southern end near the corner of King and Baitrie streets, to the memory of the late Sir Oliver Mowat.

Big Ship Ashore. New York, June 11.—The Spanish steamer, Antonio Lopez, with 526 passengers and a crew of 135 men ran ashore on the sand beach at Fire Island Wednesday night and lay on the beach all night pounded by heavy seas.

Drowns in Shallow Water. Kingston, June 11.—At Drysdale Mills, on the line of the Kingston & Pembroke Railway, Joseph Payen, aged 16, was found drowned in three feet of water. He was playing on logs in the creek and it is thought he fell and was rendered unconscious.

100,000 Children Parade. New York, June 11.—Over 100,000 Sunday school children marched through the streets of Brooklyn in a parade yesterday. They were reviewed by Vice-President Sherman, Governor Hughes and other notables. The occasion was the eightieth anniversary celebration of the Brooklyn Sunday School Union.

Woman Charged With Usury. Winnipeg, June 11.—Magistrate Daly yesterday committed Miss Mary A. Glynn for trial on one general and six specific charges of usury, and subsequently allowed bail from herself and two others at \$500 each. In one case the interest demanded was at a rate of 300 per cent.

Guilty of Perjury. Belleville, June 11.—Thomas Smart, the young Indian a short time since acquitted of the murder of his uncle, was yesterday found guilty of perjury in having sworn one thing at the inquest and another at the trial. The jury recommended mercy.

CROWNED HEADS AND CLOISTER.

Kings and Queens Who Would Get as Far From the Throne as Possible.

Viewed as a profession, being a king, queen or prince must be one of the hardest, most unenviable jobs on earth. How can this be proved? Easily, by the fact that, though the most honorable and one of the best-paid positions, yet great numbers are always "throwing up the job" of wearing a crown.

Whenever a king or a queen feels that pride and conscience will permit, he or she promptly descends from the throne and gets as far away from court as it is possible to go, which usually means the convent or monastery.

It is said on excellent authority that Queen Maria Cristina, mother of King Alfonso of Spain, will take the veil within the next few months. She has long said that as soon as her son was happily married and an heir to the throne established she would escape from the hated ceremony of court forever.

The Dowager Queen of Portugal would leave the court and the world at once if the tangled state of the little nation's affairs did not make it her duty to help keep the tottering dynasty on the throne.

If Mexico were to think better of its murder of the Emperor Maximilian, and decide to re-establish a monarchy, it would have to seek its new emperor in a monastery. A few weeks ago Prince Augustine de Iturbide the heir to the throne, joined the Third Order of St. Francis.

In the fashionable society of most of the European capitals Prince Augustine was prominent for many years, but, as in the case of the Grand Duchess Elizabeth of Russia, an assassination preyed on his mind and after a recent severe illness he decided to retire from the world.

The other day the Cardinal Archbishop of Cologne received in private audience a Dominican monk, who gave his name as Brother Raymond. The cardinal and the monk remained for some time in prayer.

Many were surprised at the unusual honor done to a poor priest, until it was whispered that the monk was none other than Prince Charles of Lowenstein, in whose veins flows the blood of kings and crusading princes.

It is only a few weeks since his highness took the vows. Several reasons have been given for the step. One is that the prince is a victim of unrequited love, the other that he is disgusted at the small progress made by his anti-dynastic campaign.

The first reason is rather absurd, for the prince is nearly 75 years old and is still passionately devoted to the memory of his late wife.

The second reason may have something in it, for though the prince found converts in the Kings of Saxony and Wurttemberg and the Grand Duke of Hesse, it was known that the Kaiser himself disapproved secretly of the Anti-dynastic League and the crusade has made comparatively little progress.

Four of his children are in convents; one is a poor sister of charity of St. Francisca of Aachen; another is in a lonely convent among the mountains of Bohemia; a third is in a Hungarian convent of the strictest rule, and a fourth is a Benedictine nun at Ryde, in the Isle of Wight.

The last has as her companion the widow of an ex-King of Portugal, the Archduchess Adelaide, who married the Duke of Braganza, after he had been forced to abdicate from the Portuguese throne.

English Names Have Old Associations Connected With Them.

Among the old things that have died out are the local nicknames given to inhabitants of various cities or counties. There is a well-known Lancashire saying connected with a stage-coach driver, which is remarkable for its nice grades of distinction between four passengers. The old driver was asked: "Who has taken to the coach, Jim?" And Jim replied: "Who, there's a gentleman from Liverpool, and a man from Manchester, and a chap from Oldham, and a felly from Wigan."

"Yorkshire," again, is a term used for cunning or shrewdness. "He's a deep 'un," says someone in one of Charles Reade's novels. "But we are Yorkshire, too." A lying old proverb says: "Shake a bride over a Yorkshireman's grave, and he will arise and steal a horse."

A jocular nickname for men of Norfolk is "Norfolk Dumplings," perhaps because these East-country folk still maintain the custom of serving "dumplings" or pudding before meat, which in old days was a general custom, especially in economical households, for the pudding took the edge off the sharp appetite.

The Lincolnshire nickname is the uncomplimentary one of "Yellow Belies," in allusion to the frogs and eels which abound in the fen country. A neighboring county has long been called "Bean-belly Leicestershire," and there is an old saying: "Shake a Leicestershire yeoman by the collar, and you shall hear the beans rattle."

A Wonderful Harbor.

Churchill harbor is simply a landlocked lake of eight miles in length running northeast and southwest by about four miles in breadth, in area approximately two townships in extent. The Churchill or English River falls into the harbor on its southwest corner. An outlet of about one-quarter of a mile wide at Fort Prince of Wales, leads to the open sea and to deep water.

This channel at low waters in its shallowest spot is 27 feet deep. It has an average tide of two fathoms. The sheltered harbor requires dredging and the removing of large boulders, stones and other impediments. Its deepest and best ship anchorage, gives 45 feet, opposite the present whaling station. A powerful ice-breaker could keep the channel leading to the open sea serviceable the whole year round. As time will prove, suitable tugs, aided by lighthouses, fishing stations, improved charts and the all important wireless telegraphy, will simply pick up and lead in a transatlantic vessel with ease, as soon as it enters the straits at the Button islands.

Dogs Prevent Accidents.

Superintendent Stinson, of the Ontario Provincial Department of Game and Fisheries, declares that that province has had this year the smallest number of serious accidents from hunting with hounds. He argues that still hunting requires the expert, the man who knows woodcraft, and that among the thousands who go to the woods not half a dozen could bring home a deer if it depended on woodcraft. Nearly all the deer are shot along the water paths with the hounds in pursuit. The use of hounds in hunting, he holds, is a preventive of accidents, for there is no mistaking the approach of an animal when chased by dogs. Moreover, in the northern districts, with their second growth of timber, still hunting would be almost impossible.
