COURT MARTIAL.

Word has been received at the Barracks from Ottawa that the finding of the recent court martial into the case of Private Smith has been approved. Smith has been sentenced to the County Jail for six months with hard labor. The sentence dates from May 7th. The sentence was read out at parade (this morning and Smith will be taken to the County Jail on Monday. Smith was charged with escaping from confinement; striking a superior officer; looting his kit and also with desertion.

YOUNG INDIAN STABBED.

James Nash Claims to Have Been Assaulted by Gang of Hobos on the Bridge.

Between twelve and one o'clock this morning a young half breed Indian named James Nash, belonging to the St. Marys reserve, arrived at the residence of Dr. McGrath looking for surgical aid. Dr. McGrath examined the young man and found him to be suffering from a dangerous wound in the neck. The wound extended from the back of the neck around to the left ear and that member was almost severed. The Indian was bleeding profusely and was so weak when he reached the doctor's office he had to be assisted into the house. He was accompanied by a colored man named John Kennedy. The men explained that they were crossing the highway bridge in company with a squaw about midnight when they were met by a gang of about thirty men, supposed to be railway navies. The gang tried to take the squaw away from Nash and his companion. The two men put up an argument against this and one of the gang of hobos stabbed Nash in the neck with a knife or some other sharp instrument. They then retreated across the bridge towards St. Marys and the young men came to this city to have the wound dressed. Neither Nash nor Kennedy are able to describe the man who did the stabbing or any of the companions. Several tramps have been around town on Friday and today and last evening the police had a call to the residence of Senator Thompson where a couple of tough looking characters had walked into the house. Sergt. Phillips responded to the call but the visitors had got wise and decamped before he arrived. The Chief of Police is going after the tramps today red hot and any hobo who does not do the "23" trick at once will be dealt with in a severe manner by the authorities. Chief Hawthorne and Police Sergt. Phillips this morning arrested three tramps who are now occupying cells at the police station.

DISGRACEFUL CONDUCT.

A number of young men who have been attending the Normal school were about town last evening celebrating their departure "back to the farm." They got decidedly fresh and managed to ring in two false alarms of fire. The only excuse that can be offered for their conduct is that they may have mistaken the fire alarm boxes for letter boxes. THE RACE MEETING.

Park Directors Provide Additional Accommodation for Horses.

It had been expected that the erection of probably fifteen or twenty new stalls might be necessary to accommodate the horses for the races here on June 30, July 1st and 2nd, but a meeting of the directors of the Fredericton Park Association was held at the Barker House last evening when Postmaster Edwards, D. McCathern and Ale. Jewett were appointed a committee to make the necessary arrangements for using some of the exhibition stalls with an entrance through for the horses near the race track grandstand which will relieve the track of having to put up new stalls until the fall meeting at least.

A report was made last evening by Postmaster Edwards and the Secretary, who were the committee to meet Mr. W. B. Howard, district passenger agent of the C. P. R., regarding special excursion rates for the "curtain raiser" racing. The reply received from Mr. Howard is highly satisfactory and shows that the C.P.R. will do their part towards helping the Maritime Circuit prosper. Announcement of details of the arrangement will be made next week.

On Tuesday next nominators in the stakes at the curtain raiser meeting here on June 30th, July 1st and 2nd will make their third and last payment and name their horses and on the same day entries in the 2.15, 2.17 and 2.19 classes will close. The directors of the Fredericton Park Association will meet again about June 21st and on that date definite announcement can be made of the horses which will be here for the Dominion Day meeting.

The directors of the Park Association last evening decided to extend the time for receiving tenders for furnishing refreshments at the race meeting on June 30th, July 1st and 2nd until noon on the 21st inst. and all tenders made are to be addressed to the President, Mr. T. H. Collier, and marked "Sealed Tenders."

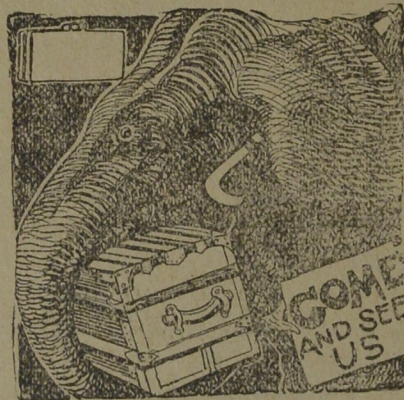
