LOCAL NEWS.

EQUITY COURT.—The Equity Court opens to-day.

THE "REPORTER."—The Reporter comes out as a semi-weekly paper to-morrow.

THE FERRIES.—Both the steam ferries are now making regular trips.

CITY COUNCIL.—The regular meeting of the City Council will be held this evening at 7.30.

RIFLE ASSOCIATION.—York County Rifle Association meets this evening in the Maritime Farmer office.

C. of E. T. SOCIETY.—The Church of England Temperance Society met in the Madras School last evening.

THE METHODIST CONFERENCE of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island will meet in this city in the fourth week in June.

THE POLICE.—The new policemen Wright and Phillips were sworn in yesterday, and went on duty last night for the first time.

ON THE CANVASS.—Mr. White, assisted by Mr. R. D. Wilmot, Jr., has begun his canvass in Sunbury. Report says that he finds the outlook very blue.

DISTRICT MEETING.—The annual meeting of the Fredericton District in connection with the Methodist Church will be held at Marysville this year.

THE POLICE COURT.—In the Police Court yesterday a young man named Landers, charged with being drunk and abusing his father, was cautioned and let go by Police Magistrate Marsh.

A CORNER IN DEALS.—Mr. Gibson has, we are told, bought all the deals in the Province. His shipments during the past few weeks have been enormous, averaging fully two million feet a day.

THE ATTORNEY GENERAL left the city this afternoon for the west. We do not know where he has gone to, but it is probable that he will not turn back much this side of Ottawa. We understand that he will be away for a week.

CRICKET CLUB.—A meeting of the Fredericton Cricket Club will be held in the Barker House on Thursday evening. Any person who knows where the grass roller belonging to the Club is, will oblige by informing the Secretary, Mr. C. L. Richards.

PROPERTY SALE.—Mr. Hoban has purchased the Beverly cottage on the corner of Church and George streets, and his family moved into it yesterday. Mr. Cameron, who occupied it last year, has removed to the house lately occupied by Judge Wetmore, who has moved into the old Peter house.

WILD DUCKS.—Wild ducks are very plentiful this spring in the lower St. John. Sachem Gabe says that it is because the water is low. This makes the feeding ground here very good. When the water rises he says the ducks will go away, and will probably be no more plentiful in the autumn than they usually are.

IMPORTS INTO FREDERICTON.—The following is a statement of the goods entered for consumption at the port of Fredericton during the month ending April 30, 1882, compared with the same month in 1881:—April, 1881, value, \$23,262; duty, \$5,208.70. April, 1882, value, \$24,270; duty, \$5,678.81. Increase April, 1882, value \$1,008; duty, \$470.05.

MAY DAY.—A fine May day is something rare, and when it comes it is appreciated. The number of families who moved this year is not very large, and there have been very few changes in the location of business places. The Street Commissioner signaled the day by setting his hoe brigade to work, for which people who have to cross Queen street feel abundantly thankful.

FROM THE WOODS.—There is no word yet from the woods of stream diving, and judging from the appearance of the main river the brooks must be very low. There is a very great deal of snow yet in the woods and it would not be surprising if some of it remained in sheltered places until June. On the 12th of June, 1868, snow was found in the shelter of some spruce trees near Grand Falls.

THE RIVER AND THE ICE.—The river is now running free and clear here, but there is still a considerable quantity of upper ice to come down. The ice ran out of the Long Reach, Queen's County, on Sunday evening, which opened up navigation, and the steamer "Fawn" of the Union Line left St. John for Fredericton yesterday morning at 10 o'clock, but up to the hour of going to press she had not been heard from.

NATURAL HISTORY SOCIETY.—We have received from Messrs J. & A. McMillan a copy of the bulletin of the Natural History Society, which they have on sale. The pamphlet contains among other things an interesting list of additions to the catalogue of N. B. Plants by G. U. Hay, Robt. Chaloner and J. Vroom, and a catalogue of the birds of New Brunswick, with notes, by M. Chamberlain. This catalogue contains the names of 269 varieties of birds found in the Province.

SAD CASE OF POISONING.—Mrs. McDonald, wife of Dr. M. H. McDonald, of Wickham, Long Island, Queen's County, accidentally poisoned herself last week with fatal results. She had got up in the morning very early, and having been up late the night before waiting for her husband, who was out on professional business, she had a bad headache. She went to take a sedative, but by mistake took a strong poison of some kind, from the effects of which she died in about 25 minutes. Mrs. McDonald was a Miss Ganong of Springfield, King's County, and her sad and untimely death is much regretted and lamented in Wickham, where she was much respected and honored. Much sympathy is also felt for Dr. McDonald in his painful bereavement.

THE EXPOS.—Influenced no doubt by the articles in the papers relating to the success of the Press Colonization Scheme, the newsboys of the city organized an exodus on Sunday. The party were originally to have consisted of a dozen or so, but it became diminished to four by the time the hour of starting came. The four youngsters, who rejoice in the names of Beattie, Dunbar, Katcher and Lottimer, started about dusk for fame and fortune via Houlton. In order to be above the tyranny of a grinding railway monopoly they determined to walk, having taken the precaution to organize two of their number into a commissariat department, with strict orders to beg at every house. The youngsters have not yet been heard from.

PERSONAL.—Hon. W. E. Perley was in town yesterday. He says he has not begun his canvass yet.

Mr. A. Gibson is expected to return to-day from St. John, where he has been for about ten days.

Mr. C. W. Wetmore, of St. John, came to the city yesterday. He will return to St. John this afternoon.

Mr. A. B. Blaney, who has been teaching school in Marysville, leaves for Colorado this morning.

The Halifax bar reconsidered their action in regard to Mr. E. L. Wetmore, of Fredericton, and allowed him to appear as counsel in the Supreme Court. Mr. Wetmore is one of the counsel for the plaintiff in the suit of Gregory vs. the Eastern Railway Company. Mr. Gregory is the well-known civil engineer—brother of George F. Gregory, Esq., of Fredericton. The action was brought for the recovery of \$80,000.

Almost a Drowning Accident.

There was very nearly a serious drowning accident on the other side of the river, just above the Gibson ferry landing, yesterday afternoon between five and six o'clock. Two little boys—aged about eight and ten years respectively—children of Mr. Nelson of Gibson, were playing on some logs floating in the water in the gully above the ferry landing. While running about on them, the children accidentally slipped between the logs and fell into the water, which is pretty deep at that spot. Mr. Nelson was near at the time and hearing their cries ran to help them. He jumped into the water, which was over his head, to effect their rescue, but being unable to swim or float could not do much. All three—the father and two sons—were thus struggling about helplessly in the water, and had it not been that help was near at hand the probabilities are that all of them would have been drowned. The ferry boat "Forest Queen" had landed but a short distance below the gully and some of the men on and around her, ran to the rescue and extricated the father and sons from their perilous predicament. The youngest boy had a very narrow escape from being drowned as he was pretty far gone when taken out of the water. Mr. Nelson and the other lad were also much exhausted with their struggles.

Address to G. F. Atherton.

Mr. J. S. Spurden, Vice-President, then presented to Mr. Atherton a life membership in the Association, accompanying it with suitable remarks, which was acknowledged in fitting terms.

Harmony mills gates were thrown open to-day, but not one operative entered. There has been one week's idleness, and \$25,000 were lost in wages. There are no signs of a compromise.

Hanlan again Victorious.

LONDON, May 1.

The race between Hanlan and Trickett came off to-day on the Thames over the course from Putney to Mortlake, for £1,000, and Hanlan won with ease.

Hanlan rowed in his new boat, which weighs 29 pounds. The tow path was lined with people, many ladies being among the spectators. A sharp shower occurred at 11.40 o'clock. Trickett wore no shirt. Hanlan had on his usual costume.

Both oarsmen took short preparatory spins and comparison of their styles was incomparably in favor of Hanlan. The Canadian oarsman had the Middlesex side of the river, and they started twenty-eight minutes after twelve. The start was a good one. Hanlan had slightly the best of Trickett, and took the lead immediately afterwards. The steamer which followed the rowers was loaded with people. Many embarked in their boats half an hour before the race was started. Both oarsmen were much applauded.

Trickett just before the start appeared to be somewhat anxious. The final betting was 5 to 1 on Hanlan.

Hanlan was carried around the city on the shoulders of admirers for over an hour. Hanlan came in one minute and five seconds ahead.

Provincial Synod.

MONTREAL, May 1.

The Provincial Synod of the Church of England continued its session here on Saturday. At the request of the Lower House the Bishops withdrew their message postponing the appointment of a Bishop to the Missionary Diocese of Algoma, and nominated the Rev. Dr. Sullivan, Rector of St. George's church here, to fill the vacant See. The Synod unanimously endorsed the nomination. A motion was passed in the Synod before the nomination, making the salary \$4,000 per annum; but after Dr. Sullivan decided to accept the appointment, it was proposed to raise the stipend to \$5,000. The Bishop elect requested that the motion would not be put to the meeting.

The nomination of Dr. Sullivan took every one by surprise as he had not been mentioned or thought of before hand. He will make a

sacrifice of income in leaving St. George's. A short time ago he was offered the rectorship of one of the largest churches in New York, with nearly double the income he had here, but declined to move. He is a deserved favorite in Montreal, and his removal will cause the deepest regret throughout the city.
