LOCAL NEWS.

POLICE NEWS.—Yesterday morning Wm. Kerr, St. John, drunk and disorderly, was fined \$2.

PICNIC.—The St. Vincent de Paul Society, of this town, are contemplating holding a picnic soon.

ABELL'S INSTITUTION.—Contributions are being solicited in this city, in aid of Abell's Deaf and Dumb Institution.

TENDERS FOR THE WHARF.—Tenders are being asked for the repairing of the wharf near the West End saw mill.

MINIATURE MOONLIGHT EXCURSION.—The young folks of Douglas, had a moonlight excursion on the river Tuesday evening, in the Nashwaakiss ferry boat.

ORGAN RECITAL.—The admission to the organ recital in the Methodist church this evening is only 20 cents with a reduced rate for children. Every one should attend as the entertainment will be of a high order.

PICTURESQUE CANADA.—Mr C G D Roberts, M. A., of this town, has been employed to furnish the literary part of Picturesque Canada with respect to New Brunswick. Mr. Roberts is now travelling over the Province.

CATHEDRAL ORGAN.—The Cathedral organ is being re-voiced and otherwise improved by Mr. Thomas Cadwallader. The work will be completed this week, when Prof. Cadwallader says he will have the finest organ in the Dominion.

WATER WORKS.—The public will be glad to learn that no difficulty need be anticipated in reference to the money needed for the introduction of water works. An offer has been made by the Maritime Bank to supply the money on advantageous terms.

PROMPT SETTLEMENT.—Yesterday Messrs. John Richards & Son handed the city a check for one thousand dollars for loss in Citizens Fire Insurance Policy on Exhibition Building; also a check to Mr. Samuel Cook, for damages to his building under a policy from same Company.

BUILDING NOTES.—The stone foundation for the Church of England Hall is nearly completed.

The foundation for the new Baptist Church is also nearly done. Masons are at work upon the tower of the Cathedral pointing the stonework with cement.

NIISI PRIUS SITTINGS.—The case of Stewart vs. Snowball was withdrawn from the consideration of the jury and settled.

The case of Thomas L. Atherton vs. William C. Watson, an action of assumpsit, was taken up yesterday afternoon. Messrs. Vanwart and Fraser are for the plaintiff, Mr. Gregory for the defendant.

DEATH OF A FREDERICTON BOY.—On Tuesday evening Mr. J. Meagher, of this city, received a letter, stating that Thomas Kavanagh, a nephew of his, had lately been drowned. Thomas was a son of John Kavanagh, who lived in this city until two years ago, when he moved to Rockland, Mass. Thomas was lame, and while in swimming was drowned. He was seventeen years of age.

NEW BAPTIST CHURCH.—Work is progressing on the new Baptist church. Nearly all the foundation has been laid. The building will be back further than the old. It will be about twenty feet from Brunswick street and about ten feet from York street. The corner stone will be laid with ceremony. There are about twelve hands at work now, which number will be immediately increased.

SCHOOL HOUSES FOR INDIANS.—Mr. Fisher, Indian Agent, asks for tenders until the 9th of September for the erection of school houses on the Indian Reserves of Kingsclear and St. Mary's. Such steps as these, beyond a doubt, indicate an improvement in the condition of the Indians of New Brunswick. To better their condition no agent has done more than Mr. Fisher, who has always displayed great zeal in bringing about anything that would tend to their moral, physical or intellectual improvement.

LEFT IN A LURCH.—During the Harmony picnic, a woman named Fitzgerald, who lives on Regent street, met a friend of hers, and asked her to stay with her a few days. This person, whose name we did not ascertain, accepted the offer and went to the house on Regent street. On waking yesterday morning she was surprised that she was the sole occupant of the house. The woman Fitzgerald, it appears, putting on her friend's clothes, had quietly departed during the night. Yesterday morning a complaint was laid, but no clue to her whereabouts has yet been received.

The entertainments by Bennett & Moulton's Comic Opera Company Wednesday afternoon and evening were a grand success both musically and in point of attendance. At the matinee over 1200 were present, and in the evening there was also a very large attendance. The performance throughout was first-class in every respect and the entire Company acquitted themselves finely, noticeably so Miss Annie Liebsch who has a splendid voice, her solos receiving triple encore. Martin's Preliminary Examination.

The examination of James Martin, charged with perjury, was held before Mr. Anderson yesterday. Mr. Wetmore appeared for the prosecution, Mr. Belyea for the defence. It was necessary to go to the gaol to take the evidence of Thompson, who is in custody on a charge of perjury. The magistrate will give his judgment to-day at 11 o'clock. The evidence is as follows:

Charles Buckingham, sworn—I know Thompson; I live at Fredericton Junction, 22 miles from here; I recollect the 30th June last; I saw Thomas Thompson that day at my place at Fredericton Junction; I am sure of date; it came on Friday, and Saturday was the 1st of July; he left my place Monday after 30th; he came on the Tuesday evening before 30th, about 4 o'clock; he was at my place all day on the 30th.

Cross-examined—The 30th June was a warm day, a fine day; he left my place Monday, July 3rd; I cannot fix the day by any other circumstance except that Saturday was Dominion day; Dominion day was a nice, warm, pleasant day at the Junction; Thompson and I were home in the house most of the day; he left my place a fortnight ago last Monday.

Re-examined—I think it was a fortnight ago last Monday he left my place, but I think it was July 3rd.

By Belyea—It was the Tuesday of the following week after the Monday he left my place he came back.

Mary E. Thompson, sworn: Thos Thompson is my son; I recollect 30th June last; I reside in Fredericton; Thomas makes his home with me; he was not home on June 30; I was home; He left on Tuesday before June 30th, to go to his grandmother's at Fredericton Junction; I did not see him again until Monday after 30th, and June 30th Henry McDonald was at my place late in the afternoon, and inquired for Thomas.

Cross examined I only know it was the 30th of June, because my little girl told me; I don't know whether it was fine or raining; I can't tell if it was a week or fortnight from the time he came from the Junction till he went out again; I don't think it was a fortnight; I don't know how long ago it was since he came from the Junction.

Russell came to me to day to go as a witness; He did not tell me anything.

George W. McKillips: I know Thompson; I live at F'ton Junction; I recollect June 30th last; it was on Friday; I saw Thompson that day in Chas Beckingham's house in the afternoon about one o'clock. I was in his company from 1 till 10 p. m.; Henry McDonald was not there; I do not know him; I saw him the Tuesday before at the Junction on the road; I was not talking to him; it was about 9 o'clock in the morning when I saw him on Tuesday.

Cross-examined—I know it was Friday; I won't swear it was not Saturday; I saw him; I won't swear it was not July 7th I saw him; I know nothing by which I can fix that day as June 30th; I don't know how many weeks ago it was since I saw Thompson; I don't think it has been 4 weeks since I saw him; I was not asked to come here; I got on train to come to F'ton; I saw Buckingham; He told me to come and give evidence that I saw Thompson in his house on Friday June 30th.

Re-examined—Buckingham told me Thompson was in a scrape here, and he told me he wanted me to give evidence as to when I saw him.

Thomas Thompson, sworn—I live in Fredericton; I recollect June 30th last; I was not in Henry McDonald's company that day; on June 30th I was at Fredericton Junction; I went Tuesday before I returned the Monday following.

Re-examined—I think it will be four weeks next Tuesday since I went to the Junction; I have no education and keep dates very well; I think I went out on Monday and returned the second time, and came back on Thursday a week ago to-morrow; I don't think I was here over a week between my coming in and going out again; I heard my grand-mother say, it was the last day of the month; I can't tell the day of the month, from the calendar George McKillips came in about 20 minutes before I went to bed—about eight or a little after; He did not see me, I think; I had no conversation with him; I am positive of that; I was arrested Friday last by Vandine for perjury; I said a person was liable to make a mistake about dates at any time; I drove a heifer for Mr. P from Jewett's; It was the week before I went to the Junction; I am positive it was before I went out; the money he paid me I went to the Junction with; Jonett was not at home.

Re-examined—I did not see McKillips in the afternoon of that day; I remember the day of the excursion to Woodstock; I heard of the day before; I think it was here in the city.

5TH AVENUE THEATRE COMPANY COMING.—The above company now playing to crowded houses at Exhibition Building, St. John, will pay a visit to this city giving two performances in one day. They will be here Wednesday, August 2nd and play at St. Dunstan's Hall, Regent street. Owing to a misunderstanding August 2nd being taken at the City Hall, and that day the only one this company can play here, St. Dunstan's Hall, with stage room fully as large as that of City Hall, has been engaged. No doubt they will be well received.

ONE FARE TO ST. JOHN.—Tickets will be issued, good to return Saturday, on the Railway to-morrow for one fare to give persons in Fredericton a chance to see the Fifth Avenue company's performance in the Exhibition Building Friday evening.

PERSONAL.—Mr. Robert Campbell, formerly a dry goods clerk in this city, but at present carrying on that business in Kansas City, is on a visit to his friends here.

Hoegg & Co.'s Canning Factory

As we stated a few days ago, Messrs Hoegg & Co have commenced work in their canning establishment. The building used by them is situated on George street, and is what is known as the old school house.

The work at present is confined to making cans; the canning will be commenced in a few days. The cans are made as follows:—For the body of the can the tin is cut in strips, the width of which equals the distance around the can. These strips are cut into pieces by a machine for the purpose.

The tops and bottoms of the cans are cut by the same machine. This is a large circular iron tube, and is easily worked by a handle. For cutting the tops another tube is screwed in the larger one. The shape is given to the can by being run between rollers, six being put through at a time.

The cans are then soldered together; two are done at once. The tops and bottoms are then floated on. The top is floated first, for which a larger sized cobbler is used than for the bottom. The can is then ready for use. At present there are four making cans, and these put up 1,200 per day. When the canning begins the factory will give employment to about thirty-five hands. Messrs. Hoegg & Co. expect to put up two thousand cans of corn a day. Last year corn was the only article canned; this year in addition to corn they will can tomatoes and blueberries. At present there are two boilers, and although these are 7x4 feet each the firm expects to put in one or two more. When the canning is under way we will give our readers an idea of the work. The reporter was informed that a market has been found for all the goods canned by this firm this year.

Who Rules Our City.

To the Editor of the Herald:

DEAR SIR.—It is well known that His Honor Chief Justice Allen, some time since, decided that a person who was a rate payer in the County of York could not be legally compelled to pay a license for doing business in the city of Fredericton. His decision was plain, so that anybody could understand it. Notwithstanding this our City Marshal has been dogging the steps of these men who are rate payers, around our hotels and streets, for moneys which the city cannot legally collect. The Chief Justice says that these men are not liable, our City Marshal Woodward says they are liable and must pay, rate payer or no ratepayer, and he goes to our worthy and impartial Police Magistrate who forthwith issues his summons to appear before him or go to limbo. To my mind this is not very creditable. Chief Justice Allen's opinion ought to receive more consideration at the hands of city functionaries. This black mailing ought to be stopped at once. Surely the city can exist without recourse to such disreputable means.
