Methodist Conference.

The annual Conference of New Brunswick
and Prince Edward's Island opened its regu-
lar session in this city yesterday at 9 a. m.,
the President, Rev. D. Chapman, in the
chair. After the reading of the Scriptures
by the Secretary, and the singing of hymn
753, prayer was offered by the Rev. H. Jost
and Rev. Dr. Stewart. After roll call the
Conference proceeded to elect its President,
and the Rev. J. S. Phinney was chosen.
The Rev. R. Weddall was elected Secretary,
and the Rev. R. Wilson Journal Secretary,
with Rev. G. W. Fisher and W. R. Baker,
Assistants.It was moved by the Rev. Mr. McKeown,
and seconded by Rev. Mr. Wilson, that the
Missionary meeting be deferred until Tues-
day evening, until Rev. Dr. Douglas and
others could be present and take part therein.
After some discussion the order of the day
was moved and carried, and the foregoing
resolution negatived.The Rev. Mr. Duncan called attention to
the transfer of Rev. Mr. Chappel to the To-
ronto Conference, and of the Rev. Mr. Pascoe
from the Newfoundland Conference to this
Conference. A letter was read and some
discussion ensued, in which Revs. Dr. Pope
and Messrs. Evans, Chapman, Read, Bur-
wash and Daniel took part. The matter
then dropped. The hours of meeting of
Conference were fixed at 9 a. m. to noon and
2 p. m. to 5.30 p. m.It was moved by Rev. Dr. Sprague that
the Conference proceed to elect the Contin-
gent Fund Committee. In amendment it
was moved that the President do nominate
the committee. The amendment was carried
and the President named Revs. Messrs.
Smallwood, Wilson, Ackman, Shenton,
Comben, Marshall, and Dr. Pickard as such
committee.Rev. Mr. Marshall gave a notice of motion
in reference to the appointment of the nomi-
nating committee by the different districts.
The President notified the committees to
meet at 2.30 p. m.The Sabbath School Committee was ap-
pointed, namely, Revs. S. James, R. S.
Crisp, R. W. Weddall, G. W. Fisher, Lucas,
and L. C. Brewer.The Conference then adjourned until 4 p.
m. Immediately after adjournment the Con-

Sunbury Declaration.

Declaration Day in Sunbury County called
out a round of speeches and some lively
talk. The successful candidates for the
Local House made very short speeches. Mr.
Burpee, M. P., spoke at some length, thank-
ing the electors for their support, and prom-
ising that he would endeavor to secure a full
acknowledgment of the rights of Sunbury
County. Mr. Glasier spoke briefly, return-
ing thanks for his handsome vote, and say-
ing that he would be to the front ever the
country needed his services. W. W. Perley
and J. S. White created quite a commotion.
The former made a furious onslaught on his
opponents. He said he had been defeated by
money and had never spent a dollar himself,
which notion seemed unanimously to tickle
the audience, which knew about how much
truth there was in it. He said he would
never be a candidate again. Mr. White dis-
tinguished himself. He said the Glasiers,
Harrisons and Burpees had bought the people
of Sunbury like sheep, and that he had never
spent a cent of money. In this last proposi-
tion Mr. Taylor, one of his supporters, ob-
jected. Mr. White wanted Mr. Sterling to
resign and run him a single-handed contest,
but Mr. Sterling declined unless Mr. Perley
would resign too, and then they would will-
ingly fight the battle over again. There was
a great flutter over W. D. Perley's letter
about the \$5 Irishmen. He denied he had
ever written any such letter and defied any
one to prove it. Unfortunately for Mr. Per-
ley this is just what the gentlemen who has
the letter would like to have an opportunity
of doing.Mr. White gave notice of a protest; but he
is only bluffing. He does not mean busi-
ness, even although he has been promised
the money necessary to carry it on. The
threat of a protest against Mr. Perley alarms
him.

CANADIAN NEWS.

There is a boom in Colonization Com-
panies.About four months ago a lad named
Claire was arrested for stealing in Frede-
ricton, and sentenced to four years in
the Dorchester Penitentiary. The prisoner
since his confinement has been quite
attentive to the duties assigned him; so
much so that he was entrusted to work
about the stables. Yesterday an op-
portunity afforded, and he took his leave
of the institution. Some time afterwards
a woman noticed the fugitive crossing
the fields rather hurriedly, and she at
once communicated the fact to the chief
keeper, who speedily despatched all his
available subordinates in various direc-
tions. No clue of the prisoner was ob-
tained up to midnight.—*Trancecript.*A serious fire occurred at Portland,
St. John, on Tuesday afternoon.The County Court Judge has declared
the Hon. Mr. Mills elected.It is reported that the Pacific Railway
Company propose to buy the Intercolon-
ial Railway.The temperance people of Moncton
have waited on the liquor dealers and
