LOCAL NEWS.

DESPATCHES.—Our usual despatches did not come to hand last night.

DOING WELL.—Mr. George, who was injured at the Gibson fire, is doing very well.

GRAND FALLS HOTEL.—Mr. Olive takes charge of this favorite hotel this week.

ON THE SICK LIST.—Conductor Nase is laid up in St. John with the rheumatism.

NORTHUMBERLAND.—It is reported that Mr. E. Hutchison will contest Northumberland for the Commons.

THE MAILS.—On and after the first day of June the mails between this city and Hampstead will be carried by steamer.

IMPORTS.—The arrival of goods in the city is very large. Our daily report of imports gives only what is received from abroad.

THE SLEEPER TRADE is assuming immense proportions. Nearly every day we have to chronicle one or two shipments from this port to the United States.

CRICKET.—The News is authority for the statement that the return match between the St. John and Fredericton Clubs will be played in this city on July 1st.

DONATION.—His Honor the Lieutenant Governor was so much pleased with the sports held by the U. N. B. Athletic Club on Friday last, that he has donated \$10 to the club funds.

FISH.—T. P. Noble has opened a wholesale and retail fish store in the basement of the City Hall. Mr. Noble is a brother of the fish and lobster dealer of that name in Richibucto. He intends buying and exporting fish, and will keep constantly on hand for retailing a supply of all kinds of fresh fish.

MR. PICKARD'S MEETINGS.—On Saturday night a number of Mr. Pickard's friends from St. Mary's were obliged to leave before the Committee meeting had concluded, in order to catch the ferry. In order to prevent a recurrence of this the Gibson ferry will remain on this side to-night until 10 o'clock.

COMMITTEE MEETINGS.—In consequence of the rooms over the HERALD office being too small Mr. Pickard's committee will meet to-night, Tuesday, the 30th inst., at 8 o'clock, in Mr. J. Myhrall's office (late his auction room) adjoining the Queen Hotel, where all future meetings of the Committees will be held.

CHANGE OF TIME.—The New Brunswick Railway publish a new Time Table, which goes into effect on June 1st, after which date their will be a morning train from Woodstock and points above to Gibson, and an afternoon train from Gibson to Woodstock and all points above. Close connection will be made with the N. B. & C. R. at Woodstock, so that passengers from Bangor will reach Aroostook the same day.

SKIFF'S CALIFORNIA MINSTRELS were in the ascendant at the Windsor Theatre last evening, and had the satisfaction of opening their engagement with a crowded house. The first part was unusually good, among its especially meritorious items being the songs "Kitty King," by Mr. Macdonald, and "Sallie Hofer," by Mr. Winter. The olio was good throughout, the most prominent features being the witty diversion of Wally Gibbs, the songs and dances of Fox and Ward, who were compelled to repeat their act entire, the cornet duet of Cline and Lorrick, and the military act of Major Thomas, who achieved great success in a lightning Zouave drill. THE RAIN AND THE STREAMS.—The late heavy rain will no doubt prove of very great service to the lumbermen. Several of the drives on the Miramichi were at a stand still on account of the lowness of the water, and the latest advices from the upper St. John are not as favorable as could be desired. The lumber from the streams below Edmundston is all, or nearly all, out in the main river; but Connors' and Cunliffe's great drives were, when last heard from, still in the small streams. The rain, which extended over a large area, must give them a capital start. Immense quantities of logs have been running into the booms during the past week.

Mr. Lucy and the Land League.

To the Editor of the Herald.

SIR,—I was very much surprised to find in Saturday's Capital the statement that the deed given by me to a number of commercial travellers was "declared bogus." I would like the Capital to kindly inform the public who declared the deed bogus, and who had the authority to pronounce against it? Was it the Police Magistrate? If so, when did he become an authority in such matters. He may assume the right to try titles to land, but who ever before knew of a case where the titles to land were tried in a Magistrate's court. This is, in my opinion, where the bogus comes in. I last January sold a farm of land (not marsh land) situated in the Parish of Southampton to a number of persons. They paid me a fair price for it. I gave them a deed of the same, duly signed and sealed, before a Magistrate. I also notified the Assessors of that Parish that the property had passed out of my hands and in future to assess the real owners of the same. The assessors did so, and these gentlemen have thereby become ratepayers in the County of York. If they are liable to pay a commercial traveller's license for doing business in this city, then every other ratepayer in the County is also liable, as I know of no law making a distinction between ratepayers.
