SUMMER TRAVEL.—The tide of summer travel continues unabated.

THE ARMY WORM.—A yellow fly has been discovered which spends its life in laying eggs on the back of army worms. The eggs hatch, and the young flies eat the army worms. The process is an interesting one, especially to the army worm, but as he is being devoured by the fly, the worm manages to consume something less than a square mile of crop, the advantage to the farmer is not inestimable.

RESOLUTIONS OF CONDOLENCE.—At the last regular meeting of the St. Dunstan's Society, of this city, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

MONUMENT TO THE LOYALISTS.—The St. John Common Council have consented to the erection of a memorial to the Loyalists on the site of the old bell tower on King's Square. However mistaken these pioneers of New Brunswick may have been as to their rights as Englishmen, and however out of sympathy with modern notions were their ideas of what loyalty required of a man, they had the courage to act upon their convictions and sacrificed much to what they considered to be the proper principle of Colonial Government. They are therefore entitled to respect and their heroism to be recognized by a suitable memorial, even if their extraordinary misconception of their constitutional rights is not to be imitated.

THE GENTLEMAN USHER OF THE BLACK ROD.—It is said that there are many applications for this office. The best use that can be made of the office is to abolish it. It is only a sinecure, and it could be dispensed with without loss of efficiency or dignity. In fact Black Rod is generally laughed at. The office and the performance the officer goes through are so utterly out of keeping with everything else, except the Sergeant-at-Arms, that it is impossible to regard it with anything else but ridicule. It does not cost very much to be sure, and the money is spent in Fredericton we know, but at the risk of being called destructive and of being charged with dismantling Fredericton, we suggest that the office should remain vacant for all time to come. It has been practically vacant for several sessions.

MEETING OF ST. PAUL'S CHURCH CONGREGATION.—A large number of the congregation of St. Paul's Church met Wednesday evening, to make arrangements for the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the church in this city, and to arrange for a picnic. In regard to the former, the only action taken was the appointment of a committee to consider the best means of holding a jubilee and take action to that effect. The following is the committee: Prof. Rivet, L. W. Johnston, Wm. Anderson, John Edwards, Mr. McKenzie, G. F. Gregory, S. Anderson, Jackson Adams, J. Flemming, Jas. Adams, Julius Inches and Dr. McAllister. It was also decided to hold a picnic at Mauger's Island on the 24th of this month. The picnicers will go down by the David Weston, and return by the Star. Concerning some business connected with the church it was resolved that hereafter two collections in the year would be taken up for the Schemes of the church, the date of which will be set by the Presbytery.

THE LATE RAILWAY TRANSFER.—The Capital is greatly exercised over the late railway transactions. It foresees no end of calamities for Fredericton because of it. Our contemporary thus laments over the situation.

It may mean that the river opposite the city is not to be bridged; that the Fredericton Railway is to remain as at present, merely a branch road; that the New Brunswick Railway between Gibson and Woodstock is also to remain as at present, practically a branch of the road; that St. Andrews is to be the ocean terminus of the road, and not St. John; and that our hope of seeing the river bridged here, and trains of the New Brunswick Railway go thundering through the town, bound for St. John, is not to be realized; but was merely the dream of an enthusiast who had great hopes of the city's future greatness, founded on a knowledge of its geographical position and other natural advantages.

We commend the following, from a city paper, to the Capital and it will probably cease to write such ill advised articles. We change the word HERALD for the word Capital:

We reply, that any community is injured when its own people and press cry it down and say it has lost trade. Such articles as the Capital has published are sufficient to prevent business men from embarking in enterprises here. They are also enough to make our own young men think that there will be any chance of doing anything here, and of influencing them to go away to make their living in a foreign country. Perhaps the Capital would not regard this as an injury.

One day recently Mrs. Ferguson, of Clinton, a lady 77 years of age, undertook to bind one side of a field of fall wheat, and accomplished it as easy as one of younger years would. She also stocked it. The work was done for pleasure alone.

AFFAIRS IN EGYPT.

Transports Iberia, with the Coldstream Guards, and the Batavia, sailed on the 8th for Alexandria, taking a battery of artillery.

Arabi has established a six gun battery near Esbet Kurshid, facing Fort Ecks and facing Ramleh towards Aboukir, as well as in our direct front. The enemy's earthworks are rising fast.

Zeky Pacha, the Governor, works harmoniously with the British. He has taken measures to restrain the importation of petroleum and influx of dangerous characters.

From arrangements which Capt. Foote, of the Ruby, has made, it is expected that there will shortly result a supply of fresh water to Suez. He has cleaned the reservoir and caulked the dock. When filled the reservoir will contain enough water to last several months.

Five transports with troops sailed for Egypt, on the 8th. Seven more started on the 9th. General Sir Herbert McPherson and staff start to-day on the Hydaspes.

The Royal Irish Dragoon Guards left Aldershot on the 8th by train for Southampton where they embark on steamers Greece and City of New York for Egypt.

The transport Canadian has sailed from Woolwich with 1,500 tons of railway plant for Egypt.

Osman Bey, the Khedive's master of horse, escaped from Cairo and arrived here via Tieluan. He stated that the rebels are fortifying Nefissa Junction, where the Suez, Ismailia and Cairo lines of railway meet. They have four guns and 2,000 infantry there.

Fred. Henderson, son of James Henderson, Front-road, Kingston, was accidentally shot and seriously wounded while running after sheep, gun in hand. He fell and received the contents of a fowling piece in his thigh.

A Bathurst correspondent notes that Messrs R A & J Stewart's mill, one day recently, sawed 81,240 superficial feet of lumber in 9 1/2 hours' work. This was done with one gang of saws.
