LOCAL NEWS.

MR. PICKARD'S City Committee held a business meeting last night.

CANTY'S CASE stands adjourned until Monday, when judgment will be delivered.

LUMBER DRIVE.—Gilman & Brown's lumber drive came safely down the Taxes on Tuesday into the South-west Miramichi, and the men arrived in Fredericton on Wednesday.

UNFORTUNATE.—Messrs. Thos. W. Smith & Son have had the misfortune to have another of their new plate glass windows cracked. It is thought to have been caused by the setting of the building.

MORE LIGHT.—Two new street lamps have been placed in position, one on the corner of Brunswick and Northumberland streets, and the other on the corner of Westmorland and George streets. They will prove a welcome addition to the city lights.

THE UPPER MIRAMICHI.—All the drives are about out of the small streams along the South-west branch of the river. The Corporation drive, however, in charge of Mr. Chas. Smith, has not yet started, owing to the height of the water and the subsequent danger of breaking the boom.

THE Cotswold ram of the late Government importation, purchased by Mr. B. N. Goodspeed of St. Mary's, has wintered in excellent condition and is a very fine sheep, has sheared thirteen pounds clean washed wool. His lambs are very strong and large, some of them weighing 12 lbs. when lambed.

THE CITY WATERWORKS.—Gillmor Brown, Esq., C. E., has been engaged by Messrs. Crafts & Forbes to assist them in their preliminary survey for the City water works. Their operations to-day covered Brunswick street from Smythe to the water, and Regent street from the Railway crossing to the river bank.

A SIGN OF THE TIMES.—An individual, evidently an anti-Scott Act young man, gently meandered up Queen street last evening oblivious of all external surroundings. With hat on the back of his head and coat thrown widely open, he boldly held his way as though prohibition were a myth, a folly, and an illusion.

IN HOT WATER.—The Rev O Pelham Mulvany, well known here, has got himself into decidedly hot water in Toronto by writing a letter in which he approves of the action of the white letter carriers of that city in refusing to hold intercourse with one of their number, who was a colored man. Their only objection was to his color.

THE LAND LEAGUE CASE.—The second land league case was before the Police Court yesterday. The occasion was somewhat exciting. During the progress of the proceedings matters became so warm that the Police Magistrate felt under the necessity of sending Mr. McManus, who appeared for the defendant, out of the Court in charge of the Marshal. After a time, however, the judicial air subsided and Mr. McManus will appear again for his client when the case is resumed to-morrow.

LIBERAL MEETING.—A meeting of the Liberal party at Gibson was held on Wednesday night in the Railway Station. A large and influential body of the electors were in attendance. Mr. Lucy and the "Capital."

To the Editor of the Herald:

SIR—The *Capital*, on Saturday last, charged me with having given a bogus title to a number of commercial travellers. In my letter to you this morning I stated that the title was not bogus, but was a bona fide one, giving a fair consideration for the money paid, and regularly acknowledged before a proper person. This the *Capital* dare not deny. Yet it had not the manliness to retract its statement, but in order to make good its charge against me, states that my deed was illegal because it was not recorded. Nine years ago I sold a farm in Kingsclear. One of our best conveyancers wrote the deed and took my acknowledgment. The purchaser paid me for the farm, and he has not yet taken the trouble to record his deed. He has always since the date of transfer been assessed for the property and pays his taxes on it. According to the law laid down by the *Capital* the deed I gave him was illegal, because I did not get it recorded. Surely such nonsense has not been written by any person having his proper senses. I believe it prudent and advisable for a purchaser of real estate to have his deed recorded. But if he has implicit confidence in the person from whom he purchases, he may be in no hurry in recording his deed. I have no doubt but these gentlemen will record theirs when it suits their own convenience, and that is their business and not Mr. Cropley's or any other person.

The other charges in the *Capital* are so contemptible that I feel it my duty to pass them over as unworthy of my notice, and regret that after a close and friendly acquaintance, extending over a period of thirty years, Mr. Cropley should, without any just cause, charge me in the public press, with giving a bogus deed for a paltry sum, in order to cheat the city out of her just dues.

It is well for the cause of truth and justice that there is a Court of Appeal, which will be sure to do justice to all, whether they are commercial travellers or not, and treat them with justice and fair play, which apparently is denied them in some of our inferior courts. STOCKHOLM, June 1.

The poor-house in the town of Oesthaumer was burned. Twenty persons were burned to death.

FORT WAYNE, Ind., June 1.

Three hundred workmen were discharged from the shops of the Pittsburg, Fort Wayne and Chicago company.

ST. LOUIS, June 1.

The Laclede Rolling Mill, the Hilbacker Forge and Harrison Wire Works in this place have shut down. The Nut and Bolt Company's works have closed.

PITTSBURG, June 1.

Thirty-six mills in this vicinity will put out their fires, and 18,500 men will be thrown out. Secretary Martin of the Amalgamated Association, reports that five mills in this district have signed the scale.

WHEELING, W. Va., June 1.

The iron and nail mills in this city and vicinity have been shut down for an indefinite period, the proprietors having refused to sign the new scale. 5,000 men are thrown out.

CINCINNATI, June 1.

Three of the five iron mills in Newport, Ky., were shut down this morning, the manufacturers refusing to sign the demand of boiler-makers for advances.
