Mr J Bridges, of Sunbury, a "dark horse," distinguished himself in the sports and carried off the belt. Mrs. Wilmot's cup was awarded to Mr Teed. Mr Wilmot has given another handsome piece of plate to the club, to be retained in the University. The following is a description of it:—The cup, which is very handsome and beautifully executed in hammered silver, with gold finish, is the workmanship of the Meridan Silver Plate Company, from an original design prepared especially for Mr Wilmot, and under his directions. On the pedestal is seated the figure of a boy, in old silver, with a pair of dumb-bells, and supporting the cup on his hand and shoulder. Around the base of the cup is a gold band embossed, with allegorical figures representing games and combats. There are two handsome scroll and bar handles; the inside of the cup is gold lined, the cover is ornamented by three base ball bats, crossed at the handles, with a ball at the apex, and on the ball stands perched a wide-awake owl in oxidized silver and gilt. On one side of the cup is an oval wreath, in gold, enclosing a well executed engraving of the University Coat of Arms and motto "Sapere Aude," with the inscription, "Universitas Novi Brunsvici, 1860." On the other side, enclosed in a similar gold wreath, are engraved the Wilmot crest and motto, "Fide et Amore," and the inscription, "Athletic Club U N B. Presented by E H Wilmot, Registrar, 1859-1882."

After the consolation race the various prizes were distributed to the respective winners, and every one departed feeling that they had spent a pleasant afternoon. The prizes were very handsome and varied. The cup given by Mrs E H Wilmot for the best general athlete is very beautiful. Mrs Wilmot also presented the prizes.

Deliberate Murder in Montreal.

MONTREAL, May 26.

A horrible murder was perpetrated here last night in a second class hotel known as the "Californian," by a Swede named John Oliffson on a fellow countryman named Johannes Jacobson. The two were stopping in the same room and Oliffson was about to leave the hotel when the landlord suspected something wrong and immediately ran to the room where he found Jacobson lying on the bed dead, the murder having been accomplished by the aid of a beer bottle. The deceased's throat was cut and several deep gashes were in his throat. The murderer was instantly arrested, when two watches, five sovereigns and several other articles belonging to his victim were found. An inquest has been opened this morning. The prisoner is a laborer and is over fifty years of age.

General News.

LEADVILLE, May 26.

The Grant Company's smelting works were burned yesterday. Loss from three hundred to four hundred thousand dollars. These works were the largest of the kind in the world. Over 300 men are thrown out here, and quite a number at Omaha where the refining works of this company are located.

TOMBSTONE, May 26.

A fire on Thursday destroyed a large number of buildings here. The portion of the town destroyed comprises all the entire busi-

ness part of the place. Three principal hotels were burned, and the office of the "Daily Nugget" was destroyed and the "Daily Epitaph" office was heavily damaged. The Western Union Telegraph office was also destroyed. Loss probably half million dollars. Insurance quarter of a million.

PITTSBURG, PA., May 26.

At a meeting of the iron manufacturers yesterday it was unanimously decided to resist all demands of amalgamated associations for increased wages. The 50,000 workmen in the Western Iron Mills will, therefore, strike June 1st.

LONDON, May 26.

Steamer "Sarmatian," which sailed from Liverpool yesterday for Quebec and Montreal, has 120 Herefordshire farmers sent out by James Rankin, member of Parliament, to settle on his Canadian estates.

BANGOR, WALES, May 26.

Davitt passed through yesterday by express train for London. He met Egan here. The latter remains at Penryn.

MADRID, May 26.

The favorable reports of the authorities on the state of the crops after the last nine days rain fall decided the ministers to adjourn the proposed suspension of import duties on corn. The Captain Generals of Catalonia and Basque Provinces report the agitation not spreading much. A Cuban deputy has presented a motion for the immediate abolition of slavery. The veteran liberals, democrats and republicans will vote for the motion, but the Cabinet declines to modify the law fixing abolition for 1880.
