buried yesterday afternoon. His funeral
was attended by many of the citizens. Mr.
Biggs was 73 years of age. He was born in
this city in the house on the corner of George
and Regent streets in which he died.MUSIC.—It is quite evident that when

the inconvenience to the public will be very
serious. Someway or other the St. John &
Maine R.R. is allowed to do about as it
pleases. It is time the people endeavored to
see if they have any rights which that Cor-
poration is bound to respect.AT HIS OLD TRICKS.—The *Capital* falsely

them were enthusiastically received. Every
thing points to an Opposition victory in
Sunbury.THE COUNTY OFFICES.—The vault for the
new offices in the Court House is fast ap-
proaching completion. It is quite an ex-
tensive affair, being 41 feet long by 11 feet
wide and 9 feet high on the inside. It rests
upon a solid stone foundation eight feet
deep. The walls are double with an air
space between. The roof is arched and will
be two bricks thick with a heavy covering
of earth. The vault is divided by a brick
partition. The Registrar of Deeds will
occupy the end next the river which will be
lighted by a window. The County Treas-
urer will occupy the inner room. There
