LOCAL NEWS.

Too much honored.—Only ten notices of the Herald in yesterday's Capital.

A CORRECTION.—It was Daniel Canty who was fined \$50 for selling liquor and not James Canty, as appeared in yesterday's Herald.

OBITUARY.—We regret to learn of the death of Miss Eliza Clark, daughter of Mr. E. Clark of this city, which occurred on Monday night.

TRANSPARENCY.—A fine photograph transparency of Mr. Pickard was exhibited in the window above the Liberal Committee Room last evening and attracted much attention.

POLICE NEWS.—In the Land League case, yesterday, the Police Magistrate fined Archibald \$20.

There was but one case of drunkenness—Angus McInnis. He was fined \$4 or 10 days' jail.

LIBERAL MEETING.—Mr. Pickard's committee will meet at their Committee Room, adjoining the Queen Hotel, this (Wednesday) evening at 8 o'clock, when the Ward Committees are expected to report from their several wards.

THE LUMBER DRIVES.—All the Aroostook and Tobique drives are in. There is now about 80,000,000 feet of lumber in the Douglas booms and about 20,000,000 feet in the booms below the city. When Connors' and Cunliffe & Stevens' drives are in the total amount of lumber to be taken care of by the Boom Company will reach 130,000 feet or about the same as last year.

Now if Mr. Burpee is an owner of the HERALD and ordered his advertisement for more than one issue it is likely that it would not have appeared? It calls the statement of the HERALD that it is mailed regularly to subscribers only in Sunbury, a falsehood, because it says all papers issue special editions at election times. Do they? Well the HERALD does not. It prints a regular weekly and six daily editions each week and has never printed "a special edition," and it has not mailed a paper to an individual in Sunbury County, whose name has not been handed in to go upon the regular subscription list.

The School Book Question.

To the Electors of New Brunswick.

GENTLEMEN,—On the 22nd day of the present month you will be called upon to select representatives to serve you in the General Assembly of this Province for the next four years; we, therefore, deem the present a fit and proper time to address you on a subject which we feel satisfied will commend itself to every New Brunswicker. It is the School Book Printing Question; and, while it has never come directly before you at the polls, the question has been frequently discussed by the press of the Province, and most of you are therefore, to some extent, familiar with it. Before the coming into effect of the Common Schools Act of 1871, many of the books in use in the schools were printed in this Province, but after that act came into force they were "thrown overboard" and other books authorized, and the sole right to print them given to publishers outside of the Province, at a much higher rate than they can be produced here. Every intelligent elector will scarcely fail to perceive the great injustice being done to the people of this Province generally, and to the publishers, printers and bookbinders particularly. The sum of \$247,650.24 is annually paid by the people of this Province for school books, nearly all of which amount is sent out of the country, and our workmen forced to seek employment elsewhere.

The Board of Education have power to prescribe whatever books they like, and we claim that they can use that power in a more judicious way by opening to our own publishers the printing of these books, or placing them out at public competition in the Province. We, therefore, appeal to you in the name of justice and common rights to see that every man you vote for will pledge his support to aid us in our object.

CITY COUNCIL.

A meeting of the City Council was held last evening in the Council Chamber. In the absence of the Mayor Ald. Simmons was chosen Chairman. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. All the Aldermen were present, including Ald. Vandine, who took his seat for the first time, except Alds. Wilson and Moore.

The eighth Report of the City Auditor was laid on the table. The report was as follows:—

Expenditure on Roads and Streets, \$442 04
Expenditure on Public Works, 439 07
Expenditure on Fire Department, 66 31
Contingencies, 317 96
City Hall, 46 75

Total expenditures, \$1312 13

Among the contingencies was a bill of Beckwith & Jordan's, for \$231.45. A short discussion took place on this. It was accepted.

The Water Committee submitted the following Report:—

"That after careful and full inquiry by letter and otherwise your committee, after consulting with the members of the Council, employed Messrs. Crofts & Forbes, Hydraulic and Civil Engineers, of Boston, Mass., to report upon the best system of water works and sewerage to be adopted by the city, and agreed to pay the sum of \$25 per day to the said firm, together with expenses of visit to Fredericton. Both the above named gentlemen are now in the city, and strenuously devoting all their professional skill towards the obtaining data and materials for the forming of an intelligent and full report on the matter submitted to them.

Your committee have been compelled under the provisions of the Act by which they are appointed, to make some expenditures, and will, no doubt, make further outlay before our terms can be received from the sale of water debentures, and would therefore respectfully suggest that the sum of \$500 be temporarily loaned from ordinary revenue to Water Committee, and a water and survey account be forthwith opened by the City Treasurer. Any advances to be refunded to contingent fund out of proceeds of sale of first debentures.

A short discussion took place as to the propriety of adopting the latter part of the report.

Ald. Farrell said he did not see why such a course was necessary. Any bills that were incurred could be paid by City Treasurer.

Ald. Hall thought the matter could be left over till next meeting.

Ald. Macpherson said he thought that some of the gentlemen were trying to burk this matter; that Alds. Hall and Farrell were trying to place the committee in a straight place.

On motion the report was received and adopted.

A check was ordered for \$10.70, for hay for city team.

Ald. Farrell presented a bill of John Woodward's for \$11.26, for nine days' work. He said the committee considered the bill too much, and recommended that the sum of \$6.75 be paid. Carried.

Ald. Farrell presented another bill of John Woodward's, for taking care of Police Station from May 1st, 1880, to present, amounting to \$60.

Moved by Ald. Leigh, seconded by Ald. Burchill, that the bill be paid.

Ald. Farrell did not like to legislate on one individual as much as he had of late. He considered the bill the most unjust that could be produced. If arrangements had been made with Mr. Woodward concerning the keeping of the police station, why was there not some record to show for it? If that appointment was on the 1st of May, 1880, strange the bills did not come up before. The bill has been, in his opinion suitably remunerated.

The bill was put it was lost.

Ald. Farrell read a letter to the effect that Paul Phillips and Zebulon Wright, who had gone on the police force 1st May and Dow Vandine 10th May, have performed their duties well to present time.

On motion, resolved that the communication be placed on file.

Moved by Ald. Farrell, seconded by Ald. Hall, that the Police Committee be empowered to procure a suit of police clothes for each of the men on the force.—Carried.

On motion, resolved that the Public Works Committee be empowered to increase the wages of such persons as the Committee deem necessary, none however to exceed \$1.25 per day.

On motion, resolved that the question of the Smyth Street sewer be postponed till next meeting.

On motion, resolved that a check to the amount of \$27.50 be drawn in favor of Sergeant Vandine for police duty. Checks were also ordered in favor of Policemen Phillips and Wright for \$38.75 for the same service.

A check to the amount of \$33.33 to the city teamster was ordered.

Ald. Thomas presented the petition of Mary Kelly to be relieved from taxes.—Referred to Assessment Appeal Committee.

The following parties presented petitions praying to be relieved from taxes: Michael Slaven, Chas. A. Smith and Michael McGlinchey.—Referred to Assessment Appeal Committee.

Ald. Farrell called the attention of the Council to the condition of the sidewalk near the corner of King and York streets, and moved that the Road Master be instructed to lay down wooden sidewalks. On explanation of Ald. Burchill the motion was withdrawn.

During the meeting Mr. Forbes, one of the gentlemen in the service of the Water Committee, entered, and was presented to the Council by Ald. Burchill.

Adjourned.

Vanwart appearing for the plaintiff and Chas. W. Beckwith for the city. The action is brought to recover fees for "Sitting Magistrate" at the Police Court, in the absence of the Police Magistrate. Mr. Richards has been paid on two occasions, we believe, for such services; but the present Council declined to pay "for any further demand of the kind, unless compelled to do so by law. The City Clerk not being of opinion that the law made payment obligatory, so advised the Council. Mr. Richards thereupon brought this action.
