LOCAL NEWS.

WARD COMMITTEES.—The Liberal ward committees met on Saturday night. The reports are very favorable.

PERSONAL.—Dr. Black leave by the train this morning en route for California. He intends to be absent two or three months.

We notice Mr. Fraser's card posted in the Auditor General's office. Are we to conclude from that that Mr. Fraser is the candidate acceptable to the Local Government?

LIBERAL MEETING.—The St. Mary's Liberals had an excellent meeting on Friday night. They are doing grand work, and on polling day will roll up a vote which will astonish the Tories.

RUNAWAY.—A country horse took fright at the Tory flags on Saturday, and starting to run away broke the shafts of the wagon to which it was attached, and threw out the boys who were driving.

LOCAL RALLY.—The friends of Messrs. Colter and Wetmore are asked to meet in a room in the Reform Club building to-night. The locality of the room is left indefinite. There are rooms and rooms in that building.

CROWDED STREETS.—Queen and Regent Streets were crowded on Saturday night. It is a long time since they have been so full of people. The presence of a large number of lumbermen in town contributed largely to the stir.

MONOPOLY.—The Tories, through Sir Leonard Tilley, have secured a monopoly of the old Reform Club rooms. The lower flat is used as a business and smoking room; the upper flat is said to be devoted to spiritual refreshments.

SIGNIFICANT.—Scene: Opposite the Tory committee rooms.

Cruel Liberal on the sidewalk—"All the better emblem for your party."

A VERY disgraceful scene (made more so on account of the day and also by one of the participants) occurred yesterday on the corner of King and Regent streets. An expoliceman, forgetting perhaps that he is no longer an impersonification of the law, severely beat a young fellow who it appears was calling him names. This substituting self for the law too frequently occurs and should, if possible, be so dealt with that the occurrences would rapidly decrease.

ORDINATION.—An ordination service was held in the Cathedral yesterday at 11 o'clock, a. m., when John Smith and Charles H. Hatheway, A. B., were ordained Deacons, and H. B. Montgomery, A. B., and Fenwick W. Vroom, A. B., Priests. The service was conducted by the Metropolitan and Coadjutor Bishop, assisted by Rev. Mr. Weeks and Rev. Canon Medley. The last named gentleman occupied the pulpit, taking as his text the 1st and 2nd verses of the 5th chapter of the first Epistle General of Peter:—"The elders that are among you I exhort, who am also an elder, and a witness of the sufferings of Christ, and also a partaker of the glory that shall be revealed: Feed the flock of God which is among you, taking the oversight thereof, not by constraint but willingly; not for filthy lucre, but of a ready mind." He delivered an able, admonitive sermon.

Much Ado about Nothing

The *Capital* makes a very silly exhibition, even for it, over Mr. Burpee's card. It tells what it believes and what it doesn't believe, and talks about the advertisement being dropped and special editions of the *HERALD*, with consummate, but very characteristic, indifference to facts. The editor of the *HERALD* is not responsible to the editor of the *Capital* for errors in an advertisement. Mr. Burpee's card was not dropped from the *DAILY HERALD*, but was omitted because its publication had only been ordered for one issue, and as gladly as we would comply with our contemporary's request and publish the card again, we regret to say that, as our space is limited and we do not follow the distinguished example of a near neighbor and fill our columns with dead matter, we can only insert the card again on payment of the usual rates, namely \$1 per inch; but if our esteemed friend would like to read it as corrected, and will send one of his boys over to the *HERALD* office next Thursday, about nine o'clock, a. m., we will send him a copy of the *WEEKLY HERALD*, a newspaper which for independence of tone and general excellence of character stands unrivalled in the Maritime Provinces. If our friend wishes an explanation why no notice was taken of his impertinence in Friday's *HERALD*, we can assure him that the only reason was that the editor of the *HERALD* managed to exist over Thursday night without having read the *Capital's* editorials. We regret now that we did not notice its article in time to refer to it on Friday, because then our contemporary might have devoted two columns instead of over one to such an important matter.

We can also assure our absurd friend that no special edition of the *HERALD* has been published; but that the only circulation which Mr. Burpee's card received in Sunbury was through the copies of the paper mailed regularly to subscribers in that County, which number over five hundred, or somewhat more, we believe, than three times the entire circulation of the *Weekly Capital*. If our friend wishes any other information in reference to the internal management of the office we should prefer to have him call and get it in person. The public don't care about reading such things.

We have no desire to say anything harsh; but really our friend must have taken leave of his senses to make such a fuss about a mistake in the mechanical department of our office.

A number of the drives on the Alagash only expected to bring a portion of their lumber down, but the late rains and heavy freshets, no doubt, will bring every stick to market.

Methodist Church.

The Rev. Mr. Brewer yesterday evening preached a very able sermon in the Methodist church in this city from the emphatic words of Paul in his first epistle to Timothy, "Fight the good fight of faith. Lay hold on eternal life." The reverend gentleman began his remarks by representing that all that was worth having in this life lay beyond a battle-field, and with this as the salient idea of his discourse, illustrated the lesson of his text by reference to the achievements of mankind in philosophy, and in the acts and resources of civilization, gradually leading his hearers up to the consideration of the grand moral battle-field, in which all men are struggling, exhorting them to efforts to achieve the great victories which await those who endure unto the end. Nature, he said, gives men capacity, but we depend for our development upon ourselves. The eternal decree had come down from Heaven that men should labor that they might enjoy, and this was not to be taken as a consequence of Adam's transgression, for he had been placed in Eden to till it. The greatest happiness was not in possession but in acquisition, was equally true of the moral and physical world. Heaven itself would be a realm of progress, not of stagnation, and its great and eternal happiness would consist in the boundless possibilities which lay before man's untrammelled soul. He closed by an eloquent appeal to his hearers to accept the invitation of the text and "lay hold on eternal life." Christ, he said, would nerve the arm and make its grasp firm.

Queen's County Election.

To the Editor of the Herald:

SIR.—The campaign has opened in Queen's. Mr. King is on the move, holding meetings in the different parishes, and meeting with that success which his manly and independent course in Parliament fully entitles him to receive at the hands of an honest constituency. Mr. King has opposed the handling over of "Our North West" to the tender mercies of a Syndicate. He opposes the Land Policy of the Government and "condemns the subservient truckling of political expediency, the chicanery and fraud which would permit the taking away from the people their sacred heritage in the public domain." He condemns the Government—

"1. Because its policy is dictated by speculators and because it has forgotten that Canada is a free and democratic land.

"2. Because it gives immense tracks of choice agricultural lands to speculators at half price.

"3. Because its policy is calculated to create in Canada great landed estates.

"4. Because it seeks to introduce that tenant system which is the curse of the British Islands.

"5. Because it would compel the *bona fide* tiller of the soil to pay vastly more for his acres than the Government receives.

"6. Because it loses sight of the future and the millions, and barter priceless inheritances and great issues for the benefit of camp-followers and gamblers."

He is opposed to the great exemptions granted to the Syndicate, while the laboring man of the North West and those of our own Province are compelled to pay taxes to make up the loss occasioned by those very exemptions. As the farmers' friend he is unwilling to compel them to pay unnecessary taxes to support a sham policy, and get nothing in return. As a practical lumberman, he knows by experience that the National Policy is inimical to that interest. He is, therefore, unwilling to cripple that industry by adding to the cost of its production. He has assiduously labored to procure a subsidy for the Central Railway. His request for that purpose was backed by 120 members of the House of Commons. The aid was refused, while subsidies were granted to other and less deserving lines. The enormous increase in expenditure by the present Government is sufficient to cause surprise, may we not say alarm. Mr. King believes that much of said increase is without excuse and has opposed the same. All who read know that Sir Leonard Tilley's \$22,500,000 which he said in 1878 was sufficient to run the Government, has already increased to upwards of 28 millions and yet more is wanted. In your interests Mr. King cannot understand such consistency. Such, therefore, being Mr. King's course, it is not to be wondered at that the people of Queen's will feel it a pride to again elect him as their representative. There is no doubt about his election, and the majority will be pleasing to his friends. 'Twill not be small. The Liberals of Queen's will loyally stand by their leader, Blake, knowing quite well that when on the 20th June they poll their votes for Mr. King they are electing a man who will give his voice and votes "for freedom and justice, for retrenchment and reform, for fair play and equal rights, for real progress and true national development."

Mr. King spoke last evening at Upper Gagetown, and will spend the remainder of the week at Petersville. Next week he will visit Canning, Waterborough, Johnston and Wickham, speaking once at Newcastle, once in Waterborough, twice in Johnston and twice in Wickham. Time will not permit

of a personal canvass, and perhaps some of the Parishes not even reached by addresses. If such is the case 'tis hoped and believed that not only in such localities but elsewhere and everywhere in the County the Liberals will do everything in their power to assist in the campaign, and thus make success doubly sure. We are hard to work and will surely win.

THE ANNIVERSARY EXERCISES.

WOLFVILLE, N. S., June 1.

The exercises in connexion with the anniversaries of the Institutions at Wolfville were, this year, attended with marked success and attracted a large crowd of spectators. On Tuesday evening a meeting was held, at which a report of the work done in the Theological department during the year was read by Dr. Crawley. Addresses were delivered by Rev. Dr. Welton, Dr. Schurman, Rev. D. A. Steele, and Rev. H. Cross.

On Wednesday morning public examinations were held in the Academy. In the afternoon literary and musical exercises in connexion with the close of the Ladies' Seminary were held in the College hall, and attended by large audiences. The exercises consisted of essays, instrumental and vocal music and conferring of diplomas upon the following named ladies:—Ida Jones, Emma Locke, Cassie Masters, Alice Hamilton, Julia Clinch. Addresses were delivered by several reverend gentlemen highly complimentary to teachers and pupils.

In the evening a Memorial service in honor of the late Dr. Cramp was held in the Baptist church. A large audience attended. Prof. G. H. Porter, of Halifax, presided at the organ, and a choir of sixteen voices furnished splendid music. The following orations were delivered:—

"Dr. Cramp as a Preacher," by Rev. Dr. Bill.

"Dr. Cramp as a Teacher," by Dr. Rand.

"Dr. Cramp as a Temperance Advocate," by Avard Longley, M. P.

Yesterday morning crowds of people flocked to the College to witness the exercises of the graduating class. At 11 o'clock a procession in the following order entered the hall:—Faculty of the College, the Governors, Alumni and Undergraduates. After prayer by the Rev. Dr. Armstrong, six of the eight graduates delivered orations. They were E. A. Corey, S. P. Cook, F. L. Shafner, A. G. Troop, H. W. Moore and F. H. Schofield, Messrs. R. W. Dodge and A. L. Calhoun were excused.

After orations the degree of Bachelor of Arts was conferred on the above-named young men. Dr. Sawyer also announced that the Governors had conferred the degree of D. D. on the Rev. E. M. Saunders; D. C. L. on Sir Charles Tupper and Hon. Dr. McN. Parker; Ph. D. on Prof. D. F. Higgins; M. A. on C. W. Roscoe.

The following Honor certificates were conferred:—Senior Class—H. W. Moore in classics and history; F. H. Schofield in philosophy; A. L. Calhoun, philosophy. Junior Class—O. C. S. Wallace, classics and philosophy; S. Whitman, history and political economy; H. R. Welton, political economy. Sophomore Class—Clara B. Marshall, history. Freshman Class—W. B. Hutchinson, classics and essay prize; W. M. Kelly, S. Gourley, prize; M. F. Kelly.

After addresses by several of the gentlemen present the exercises were brought to a close.

LONDON, June 3.

Brennan, Secretary of the Land League, after his release from prison yesterday, addressed a large assemblage in Kilkenny. The reason alleged is that Otero died a Freemason. The members of the Masonic order, assisted by an Episcopal clergyman, conducted the funeral services.

TUCSON, June 3.

A special from Fort Thomas says: Orders have been despatched to all troops in the field to concentrate at once at San Carlos, as trouble is anticipated. It is stated that orders for disarming the Indians have been received at the agency, which causes the anticipated trouble. The forces on Ash Creek have been increased by four companies. This is the pass Indians generally go through when leaving the reservation.
