LOCAL NEWS.

EXCURSION.—See the Harmony Society Excursion advertised in another column.

NEW HAY.—New hay appeared for the first time this summer in the market yesterday.

TRAVELLING.—The "David Weston" brought up a large number of passengers yesterday.

PERSONAL.—Hon. Isaac Burpee, was in town yesterday. He went up the New Brunswick Railway.

YORK COUNTY ELECTION.—Yesterday was the last day for filing petitions against the members elect for the Local Legislature, and no petitions were filed.

METHODIST CHURCH.—The new organ in the Methodist church in this city will be tested to-day. On Sunday Prof. Sterne of Marysville will act as organist at both services.

MR. AND MRS. T. C. ALLEN arrived from St. John yesterday by the "David Weston," bringing with them for interment here the body of their infant daughter, who died in St. John on Thursday.

BASE BALL.—The Telegraph says that the Our Boys' Base Ball Club of St. John will play a match game with the Fredericton club on Tuesday. Where are our base ballists? We have neither seen nor heard of them yet.

ARRESTED.—James Martin was arrested for perjury yesterday afternoon. A *habeas corpus* has been taken out by Mr. Lugin and Belyea who are acting as his counsel and the case will be argued before the Chief Justice at 10.30 to-day.

POLICE NEWS.—The examination of Sheldon McNally for setting fires was concluded yesterday. McNally was sent to jail to await trial in the County Court. Bail was granted. McNally's father and uncle becoming sureties.

DISAPPEARANCE.—John Huff, for some time past hostler of Mr. Miles, of St. Marys, disappeared on Saturday night, 15th, and has not been seen nor heard of since. He had a sore eye for some time and said he was coming over to see Dr. Currie. Dr. Currie, however, saw nothing of him, nor as far as Mr. Miles, can learn has any other person in town.

STRAWBERRY FESTIVAL AT BELMONT.—The strawberry festival at Belmont passed off satisfactorily to all persons attending it. The delightful grounds where it was held afford shelter from the sun and hence the afternoon's enjoyment was not marred by the heat. The attendance was good and a fair sum of money was raised. Quite a number of persons went down from town.

FLOWERS.—The number of pots of flowers sold by H. G. Wetmore now exceeds fifteen hundred, which number is being daily increased. He has found a market for all of Mr. Bebbington's flowers, together with some consignments from Boston. Mr. Lemont is the only other person who has done anything in this line this summer. He has disposed of quite a number of pots, the product of a St. John hothouse.

AN EXCITING SCENE.—On Thursday evening Isabella Cochrane and James Martin were arrested on a charge of perjury by Jacob Barker. They were brought yesterday before Andrew Anderson, the Justice of the Peace, before whom the complaint was made. At the door of the Court they were met by Mr. Lugin, counsel for the prisoners, who asked Barker by what right he held the party in custody. Barker replied that he was a constable of the County of York. Mr. Lugin told him he was not, and told the prisoners that Barker had no right to detain them in custody. The prisoners thereupon went away. Barker at once went to Mr. Wetmore, who was acting for the prosecution, and asked him what he should do. Mr. Wetmore said he would decline to mix himself up in any arrest. William Russell then came along and said to Barker, "Come along; I will stand between you and all harm." They then went down after the late prisoners, whom they overtook opposite the Queen Hotel. A scuffle ensued between Mrs. Cochrane and Martin, on the one part, and Barker and Russell on the other. Before it was over Mr. Lugin again came upon the scene, and told Barker to produce his papers if he was going to make an arrest. Barker said he had no papers here. In the meantime he and Russell had let their prisoners go, who went quietly to their homes. For a time there was considerable excitement on the street.

The abducted child of Melvin Smyth, the wealthy American resident, was left on door stoop of Mr. Henry J. Shaw, a well known Montreal auctioneer, on the night of the 19th. Half a postcard tied to its waist bore his father's address. He was attired in hastily made clothing of brown serge, was crying bitterly and was greatly bewildered. As he is only just commencing to talk he could say nothing further than that a man and a woman took charge of him. Detectives are of opinion that Smyth is the victim of pecuniary acquaintances. The child was abducted on the 18th.

While one of Molson's brewers were delivering beer at the house of Mr. Thos. Murphy, upper St. Urbain street, Montreal, the five year old son of the former jumped on to the footboard. He was not perceived by the brewer who commenced to drive away, when the boy jumped and was dashed against and crushed by the wheel. He expired shortly after.

CITY COUNCIL.

According to notice, a special meeting of the City Council was held last evening. The Mayor read the different objects for which the meeting was convened.

A petition of Bond & Milden to allow persons to come to the city to work on Baptist church, by his paying \$50, without their paying taxes, was granted.

During the discussion a dispute arose whether the City Marshal had the right to claim his 25 per cent. The City Marshal asked leave to say a few words; but Ald. Farrell objected.

On motion the Report of the Water Committee was taken up section by section. The first section recommended the introduction of the direct pumping system.

Ald. Farrell was somewhat undecided as to the system to be adopted.

Ald. Hall favored the Holly System.

Ald. Wilson in an apparently conclusive process of reasoning showed the system recommended by the committee to be the best one by all odds.

Ald. Burchill said he fully agreed with what Ald. Wilson said. He read an extract from a report which showed that the Gravitation System often fails to furnish a necessary supply.

Ald. Farrell craved the indulgence of the Council for a few minutes longer. In an eloquent speech in which he took the position of the peoples' champion. He advanced arguments why this matter should not be decided by the Council, and accordingly he moved as an amendment that a meeting of the citizens be called to express their opinion as to the means to be adopted.

Ald. Thomas seconded the amendment.

Ald. Simmons favored the Holly System.

Ald. Thomas said he was in favor of the Gravitation System.

The original motion was carried.

The second section, that the committee proceed to inquire into matter of procedure, was passed without discussion.

The report of the Wharf Committee was read. The committee recommended the wharf to be repaired at an expense of about \$470. If this be done Messrs. Hill & Berry will lease the wharf for a number of years at \$70 per year. The report was adopted and the committee ordered to ask for tenders.

The Administration of Justice Committee submitted report which was adopted. Adjourned.

Preliminary Examination.

The preliminary examination of Thomas Thompson, charged with perjury on the complaint of Mary Jane McDonald, was heard yesterday afternoon before Geo. A. Perley, Esq. The following witnesses were examined:—

DOW VANDINE.

I am a policeman of the City of Fredericton; I know the prisoner; I arrested him to-day; I told him he was arrested for perjury in the Russell case; he said he gave evidence he thought wrong; he made a mistake in dates; he thought the dates he gave in the Magistrate's Court were wrong, and he could tell by referring to Mr. Peppers' books; he said persons are liable to make mistakes; he said he was sorry he came into town at all; that he had walked 21 miles; he did not know until he came in what they wanted of him, and it would have been better for Russell to have settled the thing himself.

MARY JANE McDONALD.

I am wife of Henry McDonald and reside in Fredericton; I know Thomas Thompson; on the 30th of June last I was in the house where I lived, on King street in this city; I saw the prisoner that day; he was into my place about two or three o'clock; he was in about an hour and a half; this was a week before my husband was arrested; he was arrested a fortnight ago to-day; Thompson was into my place on the Sunday after the day I have spoken of; he was into my place three different times.

JAMES MARTIN.

I live in Fredericton; I am a laborer; remember the last day of last June; I know prisoner; did not see him that day; I saw him on Sunday, July 2d, in Henry McDonald's house in this city; it was a wet Sunday; he was talking to Henry about going away to work at Millville, peeling bark; I did not see him again till the 11th July; I was arrested last night by a man named Jacob Barker; he and Russell told me on the way to Anderson's that it would be better for us and Russell and Thompson if I would not stick to the date I gave in at Marsh's Court; I said whatever I said I will stick to; I will speak the truth if I die by it; Barker repeated the same thing to me in gaol this morning and also on the way to Anderson's office this morning; I am positive about the 2d of July; Mrs. Cochrane, Mrs. McDonald and her husband were also there.

ISABEL COCHRANE.

I live in Fredericton apart from my husband; I remember the 30th of June; I know Thos. Thompson; I saw him on the afternoon of June 30th; at Henry McDonald's house, in this city; I saw him on Sunday, July 2nd, in Henry McDonald's house; I am sure about these dates.

ANDREW ANDERSON.

I am a Justice of the Peace I have been a Justice of the Peace for a number of years; There was an examination held before me on Friday July 14th; The examination of Henry McDonald on a charge of perjury; Thomas Thompson was a witness; the prisoner was sworn upon the Holy Evangelists, upon that occasion prisoner swore: I was at Fredericton Junction last Friday fortnight; I went there on the Tuesday before the thirtieth, and remained until Monday last; I was visiting at my uncle's Charles Buckingham; I was not

in town at all on the 30th of June; a complaint was made before me, upon which this examination was founded; I have the complaint in my custody; it was made by Wm. Russell.

The prisoner was committed in default of Bail.

SCOTT ACT.—Cumberland County delegation of temperance people agreed to try the Canada Temperance Act.

N. B. AND CANADA RAILWAY.—Rumors fly thick and fast through town in reference to the New Brunswick and Canada Railroad. It is asserted by some that a sale of the road to the Maine Central Railway has actually taken place; others state that there is a competition between the company above named and the Syndicate who own and operate the New Brunswick Railway, for possession of the N. B. & C. R. The facts, as near as we can ascertain, are that the Maine Central Co. have made an offer for the purchase of the N. B. & C. R., which is under the consideration of the directors, and that unless the Syndicate are prepared in a fixed time to give a higher price the N. B. & C. R. will pass into the hands of the Maine Central. The employees of the N. B. & C. R. are busily engaged in taking account of stock—*St. Andrews Pilot*.

L'Evenement, the chief Ministerial organ in Montreal publishes the following programme of Ministerial changes as highly probable: Mr. Chapleau enters the Dominion Cabinet. Mr. Mosseau withdraws from the Federal Ministry, and will be called upon to form a new Government for Quebec. In this event Mr. Chapleau will postpone his trip to Europe. The new Quebec Premier, it is said, will have a choice between two combinations, one recalling Hon. Dr. Ross to his Cabinet, and the other inviting Mr. Mercier, Liberal, to form a coalition. To avoid useless elections there will be an exchange of counties, Mr. Mosseau standing for Terrebonne and Mr. Chapleau for Bagot. It is reported that Provincial Secretary Paquet has accepted the office of Sheriff of Quebec, and that the present incumbent, Charles Allyn, is to be superannuated.
