THE METAL STOCKS
Almost 100 Per Cent. Advance
In Average of Prices in the
Last Year--Contrast With the
Railroad Shares--The Proposed
Southern Iron Merger and
a Warning.

In view of the importance of the
projected combination of Southern iron
properties in recent Wall Street movements,
an opinion from the South on the great
rise in shares affected is interesting. Ham-
belton & Co., bankers of Baltimore,
strongly advise sales of these stocks, ob-
serving: "It is quite possible that should
such a consolidation take place, the ad-
vance in the market value of these stocks
already may have constituted an advant-
age to be derived from such a combina-
tion, and should an amalgamation be ef-
fected there would be unquestionably a
larger increase in value than is now
also quite possible that in the course of
time such a merger would have to con-
front the same condition which so disas-
trously affected the United States Steel
stocks when the preferred sold down to
about 50 and the common to less than
10 our share of the strain is Alabama
Coal & Iron coming as a case in
point, that stock having risen from 10
to 85. The situation of United States
Steel's experience as a warning against
too much confidence in Southern iron
stocks at current high prices is timely
and deserving of serious consideration
between the two companies, an adequate
supply of coal.

"The Dominion Iron & Steel Co. have
invested many millions of dollars in their
manufacturing plant, the operation of
which I am glad to say is giving fairly
satisfactory results," said Frederic Ni-
cholls, vice-president, when seen by The
Toronto News-Recorder last week. "The
issue of the balance of the second mort-
gage bonds of \$1,000,000 and he added:

ing additional rolling stock, etc., to
handle the additional output was con-
