Lansdowne Is Indignant. London, April 20.—Foreign Secretary Lansdowne has taken occasion formally to deny to the Russian government the statement of the Novoe Vremya in regard to the British cruiser Iphigenia, which vessel the newspaper said had transmitted by wireless telegraphy the information that she had passed Admiral Rojstevsky's squadron 140 miles from Saigon.

GERMANY WANTS MOROCCAN TREATY.
