The Times Ottawa correspondent today intimates that there is an excellent prospect of having the Empress steamers come direct to St. John this winter, thus testing this port as a mail as well as a freight port.

England also has outfitted the steamer Cambroman of the Dominion line for a voyage of twelve months around the world, principally in the British possessions.

FOR HIGHER EDUCATION

The effort to establish a school for higher commercial studies in connection with Laval University, Montreal, to which reference has already been made in this paper, is taking practical shape.

Although the Massachusetts Democrats yesterday nominated John B. Moran for governor without any trouble the convention split over the endorsement of Bryan for the presidency and of Hearst as a great exponent of Democratic principles.

The Globe does not relish the suggestion that the tariff preference should only apply to goods brought direct to Canadian ports. This course is approved by Canadian boards of trade, including men of all shades of political opinion.

The Conservatives have drawn first blood in the series of federal by-elections now attracting attention. But they have simply held a constituency which they had held before.

It would be a serious matter if at this season of the year the city council found it necessary to continue its new water main from the Marsh Bridge nearer to the source of supply, but present conditions certainly suggest its possibility.

Before the grain commission in Montreal yesterday it was urged that the Bay of Fundy be provided with more lights and aids to navigation. The increasing traffic to St. John warrants such action.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson's statement that no dredging is needed at the I. C. R. steamship berths is good news, and simplifies the problem of preparation for the winter business.
