MAY ERIC NEW EXPO. BUILDINGS

Exhibition Association May Build New Buildings and Go After the Dominion Fair Grant in 1909.

At a meeting of the exhibition executive yesterday afternoon a statement of the finances was submitted showing a slight deficit on the exhibition this year. The members of the committee, however, state that they are well satisfied with the result.

The annual meeting of the shareholders will be held on November 10. At the annual meeting it is expected that provision will be made to have extra efforts put forth in order to secure the grant for the Dominion exhibition in 1909.

The deficit was accounted for by the fact that \$2,500 more was paid out in prize money than formerly because which a number of improvements were made to the buildings.

The government steamer Aberdeen sailed Wednesday morning from Halifax to inspect the Eastern Shore buoys as far as Sydney. She carried on board C. E. Stewart, inspector of buoys, and Mr. McLellan, inspector of buoys for the coast of Nova Scotia.

The barkentine C. B. Whidden is loading at Annapolis Royal for Cuba.

The schooner Kalevala is discharging whalebone at the three mile house, Halifax. She has 72 tons guano and 38 1/2 tons whalebone. She is from Fanny Island, and is commanded by Capt. Fran.

The largest cargo of wheat ever brought into a lake port, and the opening of a new elevator at Port Colborne, were marked by the arrival and unloading of the Midland Prince with a cargo of 31,000 bushels of grain. The machinery in the elevator was constructed to handle 65,000 bushels an hour, and the test was successful in every way.

JUVENILE DELINQUENCY

(Chicago Record-Herald.) The juvenile court committee, to whose work reference has frequently been made here, seeks to prevent delinquency among children and to ameliorate the conditions that breed it. There would be many more cases for the juvenile court to try if the committee did not precede and anticipate it, as it were.

But its daily experience its trials and troubles, its successes and defeats, constantly point to new needs and new possibilities. It is hardly necessary to refer again to the effect of playgrounds and small parks on juvenile morals and manners, but among the unfamiliar things which the report to the committee mentions as imperative are: More day nurseries, more neighborhood clubs for boys and girls, better and properly regulated dance halls, inspection of rooming houses, boarding houses for girls in certain congested districts, a home for destitute mothers and their children.

The recommendations grow out of hard and painful contact with misery, with crime-breeding and vice-fostering conditions. The charitable organizations and settlements are doing all that their resources allow, but much of the ground is left uncovered. The juvenile court committee is engaged in valuable social reformation work and should receive generous support. It is efficiently and intelligently directed, and every addition to its "investment" is sure to bring rich moral and social returns.
