## GEORGE W. ALLEN DIED YESTERDAY

He Succumbed to Self-Inflicted Injuries Yesterday Afternoon—His Career.

FREDERICTON, Dec. 15—George Winthrop Allen, who, while suffering from despondency brought on by continued ill health, shot himself in the head this morning at his home, died at five o'clock this afternoon from the effects of his self-inflicted wound.

George Winthrop Allen, K. C., M. P. P., was the second youngest son of the late Sir John C. Allen, chief justice of New Brunswick, and was born in this city forty-nine years ago. His early education was received in the public schools here, and in 1877, when only eighteen years of age, he completed a course at the U. N. B., graduating at the head of his class. He taught school at Canterbury a short time. After taking the M. A. degree from his alma mater, he went to the old country and completed a course of studies at the Universities of London and Edinburgh.

Upon the elevation of Hon. F. P. Thompson to the senate, Mr. Allen was, in February, 1901, elected to the legislature for York by acclamation. At the general election in 1903 he was re-elected along with his ticket. His extensive knowledge of law made him a most useful member of the legislature and he was called upon to draft many important bills. For five years he had been chairman of the municipalities committee and also held the office of deputy speaker during that period. Although he ranked high as an orator, Mr. Allen, on account of the delicate state of his health, took very little part in debates in the legislature, but when he did take the floor his utterances always commanded the close attention of the house. It has often been said of Mr. Allen that he was the best informed lawyer of his time in New Brunswick, and few who knew him will dispute that assertion. His advice was frequently sought after and freely given to the younger members of the profession. For a number of years he had been an examiner for the Barristers' Society of New Brunswick. Not only did he rank high in his profession, but as a classical scholar he had few superiors in Canada. His death is a loss to the legislature, to the bar of the province, and to Fredericton.

Mr. Allen was a cultured gentleman of gentle manner and was personally very much esteemed by his friends. He was married in 1884 to Miss Edith Hazen,
