He is the son of Hon. Frank Woods, so widely and favorably known in the public life of the province a generation ago, and who represented the county of Queens in the legislative assembly through two parliaments, leaving the assembly to accept an appointment to a seat in the legislative council, a position which he filled until the council was abolished.

Early in his career, Hon. Frank Woods started a business at Welsford, and this since his death has been carried on and extended by his son. Mr. Woods is today extensively engaged in lumbering and milling, conducts a large farm and is a buyer and shipper of a large amount of produce. He also conducts a general store. In his various capacities he has always been a large employer of labor, and is universally respected and esteemed by his various employees. As a business previously mentioned and a popular throughout the province.

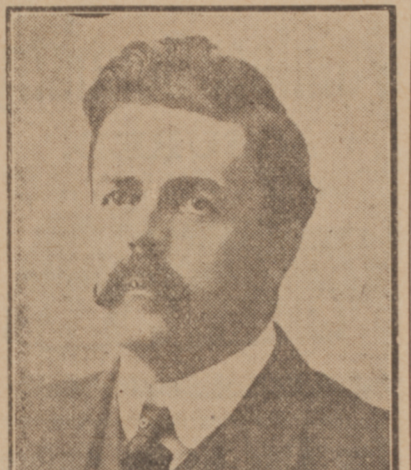
For a number of years Mr. Woods has taken a keen interest in the Independent Order of Foresters and rendered that association valuable services. He was twice elected high chief ranger for the province of New Brunswick, and in 1902 was selected as one of the delegates from this province to the supreme court held in Los Angeles (Cal.).

He has taken a leading part in municipal affairs since 1895. At that time as a young man he was urged into accepting nomination for the county council and ever since has continuously represented the Parish of Petrusville at the council board. For the last four years he has been the unanimous choice of the council for Warden.

Mr. Woods has always been a plucky fighter, and although never seeking political honors, has twice previously been brought forward by his friends and the Queens county opposition party in general as their standard bearer. In 1900 he was strongly urged by the Conservative party leaders to allow himself to be a candidate for the dominion parliament; but he then stated that he much preferred, should his services be required, to remain in the provincial field, and at that time gave hearty support to the nominee of the party, R. D. Wilnot.

Like his colleague, Mr. Woods is a family man. His wife was Miss Gorham of St. John, and they have an interesting little family in their hospitable home at Welsford.

In September, 1899, Mr. Slipp married Miss Elizabeth F. Logan, and they have now a growing family of three sons. Mr. Slipp has been for many years an ardent party worker, and as well as taking an interest in dominion and provincial politics, has occupied a prominent place in the civic affairs of Fredericton. He served a term as alderman of the city, during which year the city made one of the most favorable showings in its history.

As a lawyer, Mr. Slipp is appreciated by the other members of the profession, and is a member of the council of the Barristers' Society of New Brunswick.

Broad-minded, forceful, and always connected with the business of the day, the qualities which should insure his becoming an able and popular representative for any constituency. That he has been more or less in the public eye for some time is shown by the fact that upwards of a year ago, the "New Freeman" reviewing the provincial situation, and mentioning several possible candidates whose entry in the provincial arena would be a valuable addition to the legislature and an advantage to the province, not only included Mr. Slipp in the list, but mentioned him in the most complimentary terms.

In the person of Mr. Slipp the electors of Queens county have one of their own bright young men who has been closely advanced to the province, and a member of a family held in high esteem as progressive public spirited citizens of their locality.

PROPERTY IDENTIFIED

Much of the Stuff Stolen by Yul Thompson from City Hotels Has Been Recovered by the Police.

Through the efforts of the police a large amount of property stolen from various city hotels, and for the theft of which Yul Thompson is held on suspicion, has been identified. The prisoner who gave two names when arrested, says his proper name is Yul Thompson, that he belongs to Denmark. The police have not discovered where he stayed, but have come in contact with a number of persons who say they bought certain articles and identify the prisoner as the man from whom they purchased the goods.

The list of articles so far identified comprises five overcoats, one short coat, lady's gold watch, gentleman's gold chain, gentleman's beaver collar, three pipes, three razors, two pairs of kid gloves, a silk handkerchief and a number of smaller articles.

The police last night declined to give out the names of the owners or of those who bought the goods. They say, however, that the sales appear to have been made wherever the opportunity presented itself. Two of the overcoats were disposed of for \$5 each, while the lady's gold watch was given in trade for a cheaper time-piece and some money. When Thompson was arrested seventy cents in money was found on him besides which he was wearing a coat and vest believed to have been stolen from a hotel.

THE PROVINCIAL ELECTIONS

News and Opinions Concerning the Approaching Contest in This Province.

Important Movement to Secure Clean Election in Carleton Co.—Successful Opposition Meeting in Collina—Opposition Rally in Moncton.

Pure Elections in Carleton Co.

Woodstock, N. B., Feb. 11.—In response to the call issued by the Woodstock clergymen, ministers and delegates from all parts of the county completely filled the town council chamber this afternoon to perfect an organization which has for its object the securing of an honest election and the elimination of bribery and corruption.

Rev. G. D. Ireland was chairman, and Rev. Mr. Bolt secretary. After the chairman explained the object of the meeting and addresses were delivered by many of the clergy, including ministers of every denomination, Rev. Mr. Keirstead moved and Rev. G. D. Ireland seconded the following resolutions:

"That this convention views the political bribery and corruption that has obtained in the past in this county, both in federal and local politics, as a most dangerous enemy of good government and political morality. That the elimination of this evil in our public life is the most fundamental issue in the present election."

"That we unite in an effort to secure the elimination in the coming election of bribery and corruption and to secure the free expression of the people according to law."

The following committee was appointed to draw up resolutions on the subject: Revs. R. G. Fulton, Dr. W. C. Keirstead and H. D. Stevens, of Woodstock; Lee Raymond, of Lower Woodstock, and Jas. Goodwin, of Carleton Place, were chosen as the six candidates to present in the coming election. Rev. Mr. Keirstead moved and Rev. G. D. Ireland seconded the following resolutions:

"That the candidates who are named by the opposition party and vice versa. Should any of the six candidates refuse to sign the resolution the convention will support the candidates who will sign. Should all the candidates refuse, the delegates will establish vigilante committees to prosecute all violators of the election law. The report of the committee was accepted as a whole, with but one dissenting vote."

A public meeting was held in the classroom of the United Baptist church tonight and stirring speeches in favor of a pure election were made by several clergymen. So thoroughly in earnest are the clergymen that one delegate advocated the nomination of three candidates by the convention should all six refuse to agree to a pure election.

The Rev. Mr. Ireland said that he was informed that from \$7,000 to \$10,000 was spent in the last local election in this county, and \$50,000 was spent for corrupt purposes in the federal fight, an average of \$10 for each vote in the county.

Big Meeting at Collina

Sussex, N. B., Feb. 11.—(Special)—A rousing opposition meeting was held at Collina Corner tonight and showed that the vote from the parish of Studholm will be a sweeping one for the opposition. There were ringing speeches by J. A. Murray and George B. Jones, two of the winning trio in Kings county, and also by the Councilor John E. McAuley, of Studholm.

The hall was crowded, there was much enthusiasm and the many points scored against the government were noted with hearty applause. George R. Pearson, of English Settlement, was chairman.

E. H. Allen Sworn In

Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 11.—At a meeting of the local government this evening, Premier Robinson resigned the portfolio of provincial secretary and was succeeded by Hon. E. H. Allen, who is contesting York in the government interest. The latter was sworn in to office by Governor Tweedie, assisted by J. Howe Dickson and R. W. L. Tibbits. Premier Robinson will continue as president of the executive council. A meeting of the government was afterwards held at which considerable routine business was transacted. All the members, except Allen, leave for St. John by the 10 o'clock train tomorrow.

Rally in Moncton

Moncton, N. B., Feb. 11.—The opposition held a smoker this evening and it proved a rousing rally. The hall was crowded and there was great enthusiasm. F. W. Sumner made his first appearance in the rooms since his recent illness, and was given an enthusiastic reception. Although still weak, he addressed the meeting, and stated he hoped in a few days to be in the midst of the fight in the different sections of the county.

The feature of the rally was a communication from Premier Whitney and the education department directed to J. W. Y. Smith on the school book question. The letter read by Mr. Smith squarely contradicted the statements being made by the government press and the candidates in reference to school book prices in Ontario. The minister of education stated that cheaper school books in Ontario was brought about by putting the printing of the books up to public competition and not on account of any cut rate on a special lot. Premier Whitney's reply was as follows: "No, there was no cut rate. Tenders were advertised for a number of weeks. A number of tenders were sent in and the lowest tender accepted. Instead of increased price in new issue of school books in Ontario, the government confidently hoped that reduction in price of other books will result from the extension of the policy adopted."

The speakers during the evening were J. W. Y. Smith, F. W. Sumner, D. I. Welch, G. B. Jones, R. W. Hewson, A. P. Legere, who spoke in French and English; J. E. Masters, D. B. McDonald. The speeches were interspersed with songs and recitations by R. A. March, T. W. Stenhouse and D. B. McDonald.

The smoker was practically the opening of the opposition organization work, and the large number of workers present included quite a number of former government supporters. The outlook is that Moncton will do much better for the opposition than in the last election.
