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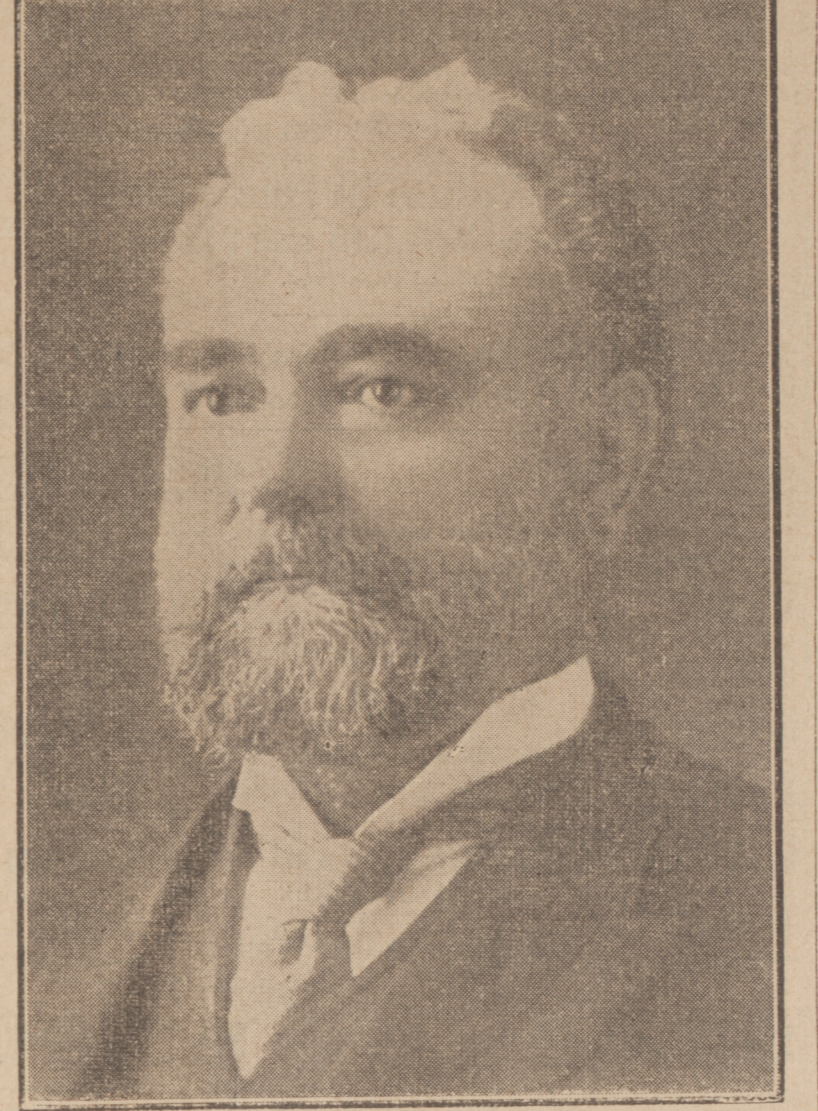
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DR. PUGSLEY'S COMPLETE SHATTERING OF CHARGES IS OTTAWA'S CHIEF TOPIC

Balance of purchase price Central Railway, improperly deducted by commission, making the \$180,000—\$30,500.

Interest on \$80,000 paid on account purchase of Central Railway from 1st January, 1903 to 1st July 1905, average of 6 per cent, 2 years and six months, \$9,000.

Interest on \$100,000, balance of purchase price of Central Railway from 6th August, 1903 to 1st July 1905, average of 5 per cent, say 2 years, \$12,000.

Interest on \$60,000 expended for improvements between August, 1902 and December 31st, 1904, given on page 68 of synoptic report of legislative assembly 1st July 1905, this amount forming part of item of \$77,611.82 shown on page 74 of commissioners' report, say two years at 5 per cent, \$6,000.

Interest on loss on operation from August 1902 to 31st December, 1904, \$17,500, say one year at average of 6 per cent, \$1,050.

Interest on cost of construction of the 15-mile section and branches, from completion of main line 1st January, 1904, follows: Evans' statement, \$316,620.33. Add interest during construction as per Shann's report, \$28,224. Total \$344,840.33.

Deduct advances by I. C. R. in rails and iron as per statement page 73, 639,485. Total \$305,355.33.

Interest on this amount of \$305,355.33 from 1st January, 1904, to 1st July 1905, at 6 per cent, \$11,197.25.

Additional new rolling stock, amount given in auditor general's report of 1907, page 228, \$30,779.88—\$6,720.

BOLD ROBBERY IN A HOUSE AT MCADAM

Word reached the city at noon today from McAdam that the home of David Treacartin, a C. P. R. driver, had been robbed, and \$480 stolen.

The break was of a most daring nature, being made in broad daylight, and from the method adopted and chances taken, to procure the booty, it would indicate that the work is that of an expert.

David Treacartin, his wife and three children, all small, two boys and a girl, live about a mile from the C. P. R. station. The thief or thieves evidently were pretty well posted as to the movements of Mr. Treacartin, for the robbery took place immediately after he had left the house for work, about 5 o'clock in the morning.

The money was in one of the drawers in the bureau in Mr. and Mrs. Treacartin's bedroom, and Mrs. Treacartin was in bed at the time the money was taken. She states that she heard some one enter while she was half asleep, and go to the bureau drawer, but thought it was her husband returning for something.

Mr. Treacartin, when he got up to go to work, had occasion to go to the drawer in which the money was kept, and took the money out at the time, and counted it, and found it all there. When some distance from the house he had occasion to go back for something that he had forgotten, and on opening the same drawer, was amazed to find money and cheques gone.

He at once apprized Mrs. Treacartin of the loss, and it was then that she told of hearing some one enter the room, and open the bureau drawer. But she told, she thought it was her husband, and thought nothing of it. On examination being made, about the time that Treacartin had left the house and his return, about 9 o'clock this morning, Constable Little arrested a tramp by the name of Wm. Forsythe, formerly from St. John, but as nothing was found on him, he was later released.

HOW THEY DO IT IN AUSTRALIA

Toronto, Ont., May 6th—(Special)—Frank Fox, a member of the Australian National Defence League at the Normal School hall last night, gave an address on national defence.

Mr. Fox began by telling of the development of Australia on national defence lines, especially since the federation of the various states. Every class from the laborer to the millionaire, he declared, was an enthusiast on the subject of national defence.

Mr. Fox repudiated the idea of the United States protecting Canada in the time of threatened danger or invasion, and Canada pursued the policy of neglecting national defence, which he believed she was doing, he declared she would find in the United States if war came, a friend whose aid would cost her dear.

Mr. P. Board, director of education in Australia, following explained the Australian system of organizing schools. The teachers of the classes were officers, and every boy over a certain age was equipped with a rifle and physical training went along with school training.
