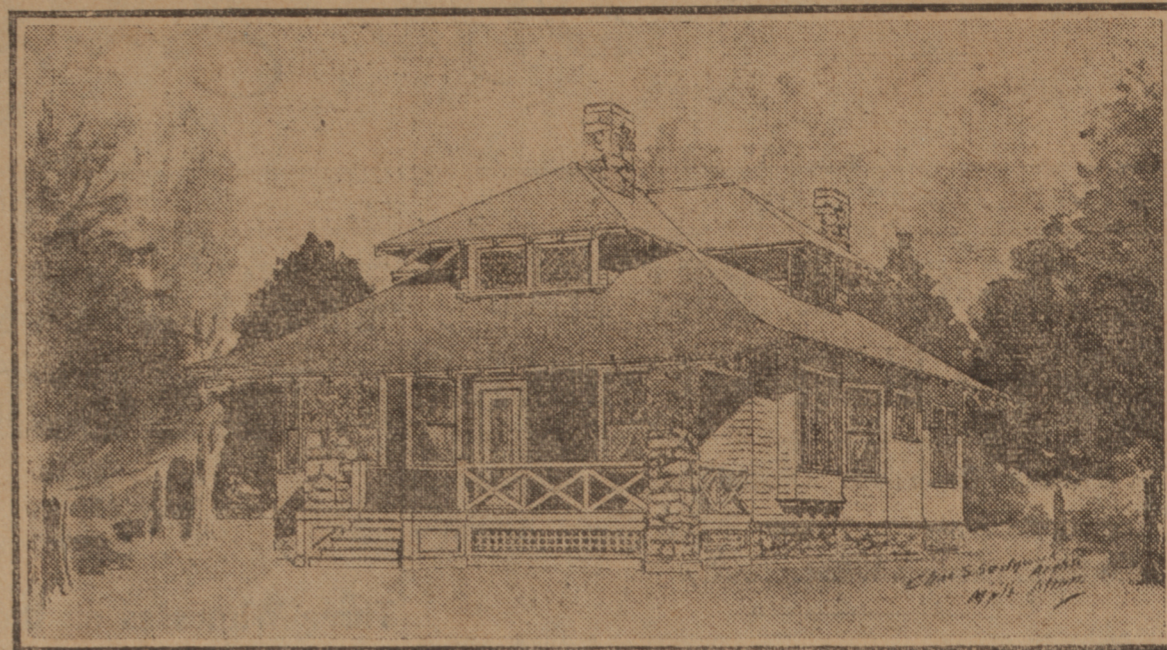


A Cottage Bungalow, Estimated Cost, \$3,000

The width of this "cottage bungalow" is 22 feet and depth 46 feet. It is estimated that it can be built in a complete and satisfactory manner for about \$3,000.

There are six good rooms on the main floor, comprising living-room, dining-room, den, two bedrooms, kitchen, and bathroom.

The treatment of the exterior is with extra wide projected eaves, and the timber rafters showing on the underside, the windows are ample size, with the upper sash divided into small lights.

The treatment of the interior is with natural pine, ceiling beams showing in the first floor. All doors and casings of pine and varnished. The floors of hard pine. The walls throughout and ceilings of second story are plastered and neatly tinted.

BASEBALL MAGNATE SENDS A BULLET THROUGH HIS BRAIN

Harry C. Pulliam President of the National League Attempted Suicide in New York Last Night and Will Probably Die—No One Seems to Know the Reason for the Rash Deed.

New York, July 28.—Harry C. Pulliam, president of the National League Baseball Club, attempted suicide tonight in his rooms on the third floor of the New York Athletic Club.

Standing in the centre of the room, Mr. Pulliam held a revolver to his right temple. He fired only one shot. It went in at the right temple and came out seven inches away on the left hand-side of the head.

It is not believed that Mr. Pulliam can recover, although he continued conscious for some time after the shooting.

The sound of the pistol shot was not heard in any part of the clubhouse, but Mr. Pulliam, in falling to the floor, apparently dislodged the receiver of a telephone, which was standing on a table nearby.

The operator on the ground floor answering the signal, got no reply and sent a bellboy to Mr. Pulliam's room to find out what was the matter.

Lying on the floor half clad, lay the baseball magnate. The bellboy hurried down stairs and gave the alarm.

Mr. Pulliam, although still conscious and able to speak, appeared to be too confused to answer the physician's questions coherently. The wounds were carefully dressed but the physician had little hopes of saving Mr. Pulliam's life.

Coroner's physician Shradly, who arrived about half an hour after the shooting, assisted Dr. Higgins in attending to the wounded man's needs.

AN ILLICIT STILL FOUND IN CELLAR

Toronto, July 28.—Firemen responding to an alarm of fire at a vacant house on Dorset street, discovered in the cellar an illicit still for the manufacture of liquor.

The matter was reported to the police and officers visited the place. They found eight large barrels of unfermented liquor and two small barrels of the finished product, while in the boiler of the still where it had been left when the "moonshiners" made a hurried departure, were about eighty gallons of liquor.

The physicians decided that any further questioning was likely to endanger Pulliam's slim chances of recovery.

Although Mr. Pulliam's act at this time was entirely unexpected, some of his friends said that at the time of his recent illness it was known that he was subject to severe attacks of melancholia.

The discovery of the still was a pure accident, for the inland revenue department, although acquainted with the fact that an illicit still was in operation somewhere in the city, had no idea of its whereabouts.
