TORY PLAN OF CAMPAIGN.

The keynote of the opposition party in the contest in New Brunswick, where Hon. Mr. Patterson has been nominated by the Liberals, is to be sectional, racial and religious. It seems incredible that this should be the case, but there is no mistaking the purpose of the party. On nomination day Mr. George Taylor, M. P., and Mr. W. F. McLellan, M. P., were among the speakers. Mr. Taylor was the Conservative whip in the House, and is in close touch with the leaders of his party. Mr. McLellan is prominent among the Conservatives who opposed the remedial bill, and who lately has been calling for the reorganization of the party. Mr. Taylor's speech, as reported in the government press, was principally devoted to proving that a vote for Mr. Patterson would mean a vote for the domination of Quebec. He complained that Quebec had too large a representation in the government; Ontario, he said, had not a single spending department of any importance. Mr. McLellan was even stronger in the expression of his views. After assuming that there has been a great revolution of feeling since the general election—of which he could, of course, not furnish the slightest evidence—he called on the electors to elect the province of Quebec that they cannot rule this country. He accused Quebec of the basest ingratitude in "bringing to grief" the party that had stood by them. There was more of this kind of talk, but enough to show that the Tories are bent on a campaign of the most improper tactics of the Conservative party. It is worth noting that Mr. Taylor said in his speech that Sir Charles Tupper had said word by word to the electors of New Brunswick that good feeling had now been restored between Sir Charles and Mr. Clark Wallace and the other anti-remedial Conservatives. The question naturally arises—Was Mr. Taylor, in starting the anti-Quebec crusade, acting under instructions from the leader of his party? Has Sir Charles now resolved on a new plan of campaign and determined to lead in a sectional and racial war? It is to be hoped that this is not Sir Charles Tupper's programme, but the proceedings at the North Grey convention are, to say the least, suspicious.

THE RESULT CERTAIN.

Nobody can doubt for a moment what will be the result of the election to be held in the constituency of Queens and Sunbury on the 25th instant, when the people of the united counties will decide whether they shall be represented by Hon. A. G. Blair or Mr. R. D. Wilmut. That the feeling in the country is strongly in favor of giving the Liberals at least a reasonable chance on taking over the administration of affairs is apparent from the return of so many cabinet ministers by acclamation. Probably the great majority of the Conservative party in Queens and Sunbury take the same view of the case, but the wire-pullers for reasons of their own have determined on a contest, and Mr. King, fighting in the opposition ranks, defeated Mr. Wilmut by one hundred and seventy-nine votes when the latter led a united party. With a diminished party behind him, a party of office, too, Mr. Wilmut stands in a changed position. Personally, Mr. Wilmut may deserve credit for his pluck in entering into an uphill contest of this kind, but his courage will not bring him the victory. Firmly convinced that sure defeat stares him in the face, the people of Queens have long shown their fealty to the Liberal party, and on this occasion Sunbury will join with them in securing the return of a colleague for Mr. Laurier.

A CANDID ADMISION.

Throughout the country, before the general election, the efforts of Conservative speakers and writers were devoted to showing the calamitous effects that would immediately follow the return to power of the Liberal party. Factories were to close, the avenues of commerce would be blocked, money would be scarce, and disaster generally would follow. No remedy for this direful condition of things could be found if Mr. Laurier was placed at the head of affairs in Canada. Fortunately utterances like these had less effect than they had on previous occasions. The Liberals are in power, and now we are glad to hear from that stalwart exponent of bluffness and blarney, Toronto World, that business prospects are very good at this moment. Hope has succeeded to temporary doubt; everything is lovely, and all is as busy as can be. Houses are filling up, new stores are opening, and in general trade there is no wanting evidence of improvement. This was made manifest, the World says, "by the settlements on the 4th and by the remarkable rush there has been this year of Canadian to Europe. Making the grant count costs money, but the ocean steamship people declare the volume of traffic was never greater. It may be that with the discovery of gold in British Columbia—gold is a great factor in lighting the burden either of individuals or of nations—depression has passed away and a spirit of truthfulness has set in; but whatever the cause, our own experience, as well as the testimony of those about us, convinces us that the time, if not absolutely good, is bright with hope." This is good to start with. It is something to get a Conservative paper of the World's class to admit that it is possible to have any degree of prosperity under Liberal administration.
