

At a meeting held at Mason Hall on Thursday evening last, agreeable to public notice, Mr. ASA BLAKESLEE, senior, was called to the Chair; when the following Resolves were moved and passed:

Resolved—As the opinion of this Meeting, that there are sufficient grounds of complaint of an unbecoming conduct on the part of the General Assembly for the County of Saint John, and therefore resolved, that a Committee be appointed to prepare a petition to the Honorable House of Assembly for that purpose.

Resolved—As the opinion of this Meeting, that there is good reason to believe, that STEPHEN HUMBERT, Esq., a majority of legal votes in his favor at the late General Election; and further resolved, that he be entitled to appear in taking legal measures to obtain an appeal to the Court of Sessions, upon the validity demanded at the close of the poll book, on which his name is entered as a Candidate for the County of Saint John.

A Committee was appointed to prepare a Petition on the first Resolves; and upwards of £32 paid in Cash towards the support of the purport of the several Resolves.

Resolved—That the thanks of this Meeting be given to Mr. Blakeslee, for his able conduct as the Chair.

Attempt to burn the Gaol.—On Sunday night, about 11 o'clock, previously to his going to bed, Mr. NOWLAN, the Gaoler, according to his usual custom, went into the Hall of the Gaol, to see that all was safe; when to his great surprise, he found it full of smoke, which greatly alarmed him. He immediately examined all the apartments above the ground floor, but found the smoke did not proceed from any of them. He then raised the trap door, leading down to the Malfeactor's cell, upon opening of which, a thick cloud of smoke obscured his sight, and as soon as he was able to see, he discovered the fire to be in the cell of Patrick Burgan, the prisoner under sentence of death. The smoke was so dense and suffocating that he had much difficulty in unlocking the door of the cell. It appeared upon examination, that the prisoner had put upon the fire at once, and the wood which had been given to keep him comfortable during the night, and when it was sufficiently ignited, he took all the fire of the hearth, which together with the burning wood, he placed against the door of his cell, and made a regular fire, which had taken considerable effect before it was discovered; intending, as he said, to burn a hole in the door, through which he might make his escape. Whether, indeed, he could have been so ignorant, as to overlook all the difficulties which he would have had to surmount, even had his design been so far accomplished, before he could effect his escape; or whether he intended to burn the building, and by dying in that way, to prevent the ignominious fate which awaits him, is difficult to determine. It was, however, providential, that the fire was discovered before it had made greater progress, otherwise the consequences might have been very serious.

The prisoner was himself nearly suffocated, when the fire was discovered.—City Gazette.

On Tuesday last, William Dickey, junior, was convicted before Alderman PETERS, for forestalling, and fined £5.—ibid.

MILITIA GENERAL ORDERS.

At a General Court Martial held at St. John on the 30th October, 1827. Major ROBERT SCOTT, Commanding 1st Battalion, Westmorland Militia, was arraigned upon the undermentioned Charges, viz:

First. For disobedience of Orders and neglect of duty, in refusing or neglecting to call out and assemble his corps for General Muster and Inspection by Divisions on the 23rd and 25th days of June last, as required by the General Order of the 7th of May last.

Second. For contemptuous and improper Conduct as a Commanding Officer of a Battalion, in neglecting to give the necessary directions for calling out his Battalion by Companies for the purpose of Drills and Inspections, in the month of August last, as required by the General Order of the 23rd of January last.

Upon which Charges the Court came to the following decision:—

The Court having maturely weighed and considered all that has been adduced in support of the prosecution, and there being no defence, are of opinion that the said Major Robert Scott is guilty of both the Charges preferred against him, in breach of the Militia Law, and his duty as an Officer commanding a Battalion in the Militia, and they do therefore adjudge him the said Major Robert Scott to be cashiered.

The Court having thus performed their duty pursuant to the orders of the Commander-in-Chief, in conformity to the Militia Law of this Province, which fixes the punishment and deprives them of all discretionary power, feel themselves called on, to express their unanimous opinion that the conduct of Major Scott, both while before this Court, and afterwards in leaving it as he did, has been highly improper, contemptuous, irregular, and unbecomingly—and is greatly in aggravation of the Charges preferred and proved against him.

His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor and Commander-in-Chief has been pleased to approve and confirm the finding and sentence of the Court. His Excellency directs that the foregoing Charges preferred against Major Robert Scott, together with the finding and sentence of the Court, and His Excellency's approval thereof, shall be entered in the General Order Book of every Battalion in the Province, and read at the head of each Battalion and Detachment at their next General Inspection.

By order of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, GEORGE SHORE, Adjutant-General.

At the same Court Martial was arraigned Captain LEWIS BURNS, of the First Battalion of the Regiment of Saint John City Militia, upon the undermentioned Charges, viz:

First. For contemptuous and improper conduct, as an Officer, in refusing to receive the Muster Roll of No. 1, Battalion Company, on the first of September instant, which is charged against him by the Battalion by order of the Major Commanding. He said Lewis BURNS having been daily attached to the command of the said company by a previous order for that purpose duly issued.

Second. For neglect of duty, as an Officer, in not calling out his company for Drills and Inspections, in the present year, at the several days and times for that purpose duly named and appointed, under and by virtue of the said Militia Law.

Upon which Charges the Court came to the following decision:—

The Court having maturely weighed and considered all that has been adduced in support of the prosecution, as well as what has been brought forward in defence, are of opinion that the prisoner, Captain Lewis BURNS, is guilty of the first charge preferred against him.—And the Court do further find that the said prisoner, Captain Lewis BURNS is also guilty of the second charge preferred against him.—And the Court do further find that the said prisoner, Captain Lewis BURNS, is also guilty of the third charge preferred against him in breach of the Militia Law, and of his duty as a Militia Officer, and they do therefore adjudge him the said Captain Lewis BURNS to be cashiered.

The Court having thus performed their duty of awarding punishment in strict conformity to the Militia Law, which deprives them of all discretionary power, beg leave to observe, that although the conduct of Captain BURNS, on the first day before the Court, was highly contemptuous, irregular, and improper, yet since that period his conduct has been regular and correct, and the Court being of opinion that his fault has arisen more from error in judgment than from premeditated intent to disobey orders, beg leave to recommend him to the favourable consideration of His Excellency.

His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor and Commander-in-Chief has been pleased to approve and confirm the finding and sentence of the Court. His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor and Commander-in-Chief did not fail to take under his consideration, the recommendation which the President of His Excellency's favorable consideration.

Captain BURNS having availed himself of the adjourned opportunity afforded to him, of defending himself against the charges which have been preferred against him, the Commander-in-Chief in confirming the finding and sentence of the Court, might not have felt disposed to make any observation on Captain BURNS' conduct at the opening of the proceedings; but, brought before His Excellency as an object of mercy, His Excellency is for-

ced to revert to the highly contemptuous, irregular and improper manner in which Captain BURNS then conducted himself, as reasons which preclude the exercise of any merciful consideration. It cannot be imagined that Captain BURNS was ignorant of the rules and customs of Military Service, or under any misconception as to its forms and usages.—He is understood to have been trained in the ranks of the British Army, in a station in which he must have observed subordination, respect and due decorum; and in which he should have learnt about all things what is due to the dignity of a Tribunal such as that which he has foregoing.

His Excellency therefore directs that the foregoing charges preferred against Captain Lewis BURNS together with the finding and sentence of the Court and His Excellency's approval thereof, shall be entered in the General Order Book of every Battalion in the Province and read at the head of each Battalion and detachment at their next General Inspection.

Extract of a letter dated Bridgetown, N. S. January 29.—

On Monday, the 25th of October in the morning, a large copper fastened boat, the Jane 250 tons burthen, was driven on the Bay of Fundy shore, about 5 miles from this village. She is owned by a Mr. Addison, of Liverpool, Esq. Capt. Hargreaves, master, 15 hands on board. She left St. John, N. B. the day before, bound for Kingston, Jamaica, loaded with lumber, flour, &c. Soon after she cleared the Harbour of St. John, a stiff N. W. wind struck her, and as the snow was very thick, and the cold intense, the ice soon prevented the vessel from working, consequently she was driven to the mercy of the wind and waves, till she reached this shore. The brig is so injured that she will never get off again; but the load, it is hoped, will be shortly saved. Every person on board, except the Capt. and Mate, were most miserably frozen, and it is feared that some of the limbs of the sufferers will have to be amputated. Many of the inhabitants of Grandville, with the genuine spirit of humanity, crossed the mountains with sleds, and brought the sufferers to their houses, where they would be convenient to medical attendance. This seemed the more necessary, as the people on the Bay of Fundy shore, chiefly live in small log houses, and therefore have no near house-rooms, or means to receive the distressed invalids. A schooner of about 50 tons burthen also drove about 3 miles from the same place; but it is not materially injured. Last night we had a very heavy blizzard, and it is said I have heard of two buildings being blown down not far distant.—Halifax Journal.
