

Government would show paternal and liberal regard to a recommendation made under such circumstances.—The Lieutenant-Governor is persuaded that the House of Assembly, will learn with gratitude, this fresh instance of the Royal disposition to devote these funds to purposes of utility in the Province, and has no doubt that this particular application of them will afford very general satisfaction, and be productive of much benefit.

"The Lieutenant-Governor with a lively consideration, to interrupt as little as possible the industrious and laborious pursuits and occupations of the people, and desirous of promoting the gradual improvement which he contemplates, the least inconvenience to the people, with the least possible interference to the Militia Act does not give to the Commander-in-Chief discretionary power to remit the whole or such portion of the attendance, required by Law, for exercise, and inspection, as might occasionally be dispensed with, under special circumstances, without much detriment or disadvantage to the Militia service."

"If such a discretionary power were vested in the Commander-in-Chief, by an Act of the Legislature, in this way, as to grant, or so afford great relief to the people.—This would be done upon reports and recommendations from the Officers commanding Battalions, and the Inspecting Field Officers, submitting the fitness and expediency of granting such indulgences, in alternation of Companies or Divisions; and these recommendations being made by Officers of much distinction, and subject to the sanction of the Commander-in-Chief, would be so regulated, as never to be a means of promoting a requisite degree of efficiency, considerable portions of the Militia Forces, particularly in the more important quarters, dense settlements, and Military points of the Province."

In thisly dispositive to the people, and in the determination of what would result from such a power of alternate selections and exemptions. Mr. Secretary Odell, by command of His Excellency, laid before the House a copy of a Dispatch from one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, with its inclosures, to the Lieut. Governor, recommending that in any Bill to be passed by the Legislature of New Brunswick, imposing Colonial duties upon the importation of certain goods, a clause should be introduced exempting goods intended to be warehoused from the payment of Colonial Duties upon the first entry thereof.

Our intelligence from England is only one day later than that which we were in possession of when we were in our last number.—It is, from London, of the 11th of January. We are pained to find that the rumours which were about respecting a change of Ministry are now confirmed.—Lord GODERICH has resigned the Premiership. The article relative to this circumstance will be found in another part of our paper.—The cause assigned for his conduct on this occasion would appear to us to be of rather a trivial nature, and to have originated more from the excitement of personal feelings than from any thing else.

After the sudden departure and changes of persons appointed to offices of high trust which have lately occurred in the British Cabinet, and after the public mind appeared to be restored to tranquility and evident satisfaction at the late Ministerial arrangements under Lord GODERICH, as Premier, we cannot help sympathizing with our fellow subjects on the present deranged state of matters in the Cabinet.—Changes of Ministerial appointments, we are aware, must frequently occur from various causes; but it is to be lamented that they should happen so suddenly and so extensively as they have done.

We are sorry we have it not yet in our power to give our readers a list of the new appointments.—We give the rumours that are published and leave them to form their own judgment as to the probable results.

One report states that little doubt exists as to Mr. PEEL being appointed successor to Lord GODERICH.—Were we to consult our feelings in this case, we must say from what is made known to us of Mr. PEEL's abilities and industry in public matters, we should wish to hear of this report's being confirmed.

We are particularly interested in the appointment of the Secretary for the Colonies; and whatever party at home it may gratify to find Lord BATHURST re-instated in that capacity, we are much deceived if this arrangement meet the approbation of those who reside in the Colonies generally.—Indeed, we are positive, it will not be satisfactory to the inhabitants of this Province.—Nothing is more certain than that during the time he had the situation, Petitions have been forwarded from the Colonies, even from Public Bodies repeatedly, without having even been taken notice of. Whether this neglect originated with his Lordship, or with the under Secretary is a matter to us of comparatively little importance.—As Principal Secretary, we could address no other than him when we had grievances to be redressed, or representations to make—and we are sorry to add, we have seldom applied with any hope of success.

This season be objected to. Among the rest, are the usual Grants made to Grammar Schools, the usual Grant to the Solicitor-General, the payment of Inspecting Field Officers of the Militia, and the sum at present allowed for attending the Light House on Partridge Island.—On these subjects, however, we shall make no remarks till they are discussed before the House.

A local nature and contested Election appears, as yet, to have occupied principally the attention and time of the House.

We have perused with much pleasure in the last Royal Gazette, an Address given by the Rev. Dr. Somerville, President of the College of New Brunswick, on the occasion of the Degree of Bachelor of Arts being conferred on Messrs. Samuel Denny Lee Street, and Daniel Hales Smith.

This is the first ceremony of the kind which ever occurred in this Province, and appears to have excited much interest among the various classes of the community. Had our limits permitted our copying the Address, we should have had much pleasure in giving it a place in the Courier—we may say, however, avail ourselves of an opportunity of doing so.—It will be read with interest at a time by those who are concerned for the education and morals of the rising generation.—In a word, it does much credit both to the head and the heart of the learned Gentleman who delivered it.

We are happy at the same time to notice that the New College Building is rapidly going forward.—It is one of the most substantial pieces of Architecture.—Its accommodations are on a very extensive scale, and accords well with the warmth of feeling lately excited on the subject of general education, and with the increasing population and wealth of the Province. It is needless here to enlarge on the exertions which have been made by our excellent Lieutenant-Governor, in behalf of this Institution.—Its charter provisions, on a more liberal footing than Establishments of a similar description in the neighbouring Provinces. We intend to publish the Charter for the information of our readers generally in some of our early future numbers.

On Monday last, Captain DOUGLAS, arrived in this City from Washington, by the way of Saint Andrews.

There seems to be no possibility of the truth of the report which has been in circulation for a few days, respecting the dangerous illness of the King.—New-York Albion, March 1.

Numerous Petitions having been presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, setting forth that many persons who had obtained Minutes of Council for Lands, for which, owing to the particularly distressed state of the Country, they have been hitherto unable to take out their Grants, and praying for further time;

His Excellency, with the advice of His Majesty's Council, has been pleased to extend the time within which persons who have obtained minutes of Council for allotments of Land may apply for their Grants, until the first day of January next: And all such persons as shall neglect so to apply within the time limited, will be considered as having forfeited their allotments.

The James Linnes left at Demerara, brig Gambia, Faculty, Charles Dimes, and Profusgar, Holmes of this port, and a schooner from Halifax.

The brig Ann Maria, of and from New-York, with flour, corn, &c. bound to St. John, was cast away on the 19th ult. on a ledge called Ruggedads, about 4 miles from Matinicus Island. John Smith, an Englishman, and two others, were washed overboard by the first sea after she struck. Smith was thrown upon a high point of the ledge, and was saved. The next sea stove the vessel in pieces, and all on board (ten) perished. Smith was taken from the ledge after having remained there thirty hours; the waves dashed so furiously upon the ledge that they were prevented from approaching within several yards.—They adopted the expedient of tying a piece of rigging to an oar, and letting it float towards the ledge, which being seized by Smith, he was dragged through the foaming waves to the boat, and thus rescued from his perilous situation.

The bodies of the mate, steward, and cook have been picked up and decently interred on Matinicus. Nothing was saved from the vessel except part of the rigging, cables and anchors, much damaged. A contribution was taken at the Baptist Meeting House for the relief of the survivor.—Portland Mercury.
