Since the publication of our last number, we have been politely furnished, by Gentlemen arriving here during the week, from England, with several files of English and Scotch papers. Having, as we appear by our other columns, made copious extracts from them, regarding the principal subjects which at present occupy the attention of the political world, we shall, on this occasion, leave our readers to form their own opinions respecting the probable result of the present disturbances in Portugal, and with respect also to the differences at present existing between Russia and Turkey. Our own opinion, viewing circumstances in Europe as a whole, is, that a general war, in which the greater proportion of the European Powers will be one way or other interested, will soon take place.—When we receive further information on this subject, we shall give our opinion in reference to it.

Upwards of 400 Loaves of Bread, wanting from one and a half to four ounces of the regular weight, were seized this morning, from several of the Bakers, by the Deputy Clerk of the Market.

We have the satisfaction of informing our Agricultural friends, that in addition to the other means put in operation for the improvement of the Country, the Central Agricultural and Emigrant Society, are in expectation of receiving a valuable importation of SEEDS, of various descriptions, for field culture. These Seeds were shipped some time since, at Liverpool, on board the brig William, which vessel is now due. Farmers may therefore look for their immediate arrival, and have an opportunity of supplying themselves with various kinds of Seeds, for the present year's sowing. The seeds, we understand, were selected by Mr. WEDDERBURN, while in Britain, from specimens of their produce; and consist of Wheat; Oats; various Grasses; purple, yellow, and red Mangel Wurtzel; Albion Carrots; Kale Rabi; Turnips; Field Cabbage; Turnip-rooted cabbage; and other valuable esculent vegetables, well adapted to the climate, but never before introduced. Beginning thus at the very root of the business, by importing a variety of new and useful Seeds, we must, be assured an effectual way to ensure improvement and success in our husbandry; and we trust that our farmer will duly appreciate, and profit by this importation, and that those seeds will, as much as possible, be introduced into every part of the Province.

We have also to add, that the St. John Agricultural Society have lately received an assortment of Timothy Seed, Red and White Clover Seed, Mangel Wurtzel, Sugar Beet, and Ruta Baga.—City Gazette.

SAINT ANDREWS, May 5.
Volcanic Eruption.—The following is a statement of what was caused by the Report of a Volcanic Eruption on Clingman's Peak, on the 23rd ult. About 12 o'clock on that day, there was a loud explosion, which was heard by Mr. D. Smith, when suddenly, he heard a violent and alarming noise, like that of an earthquake, but not accompanied with any tremor of the earth; and immediately afterwards a large quantity of smoke (but not of fire) came pouring out from the mountain, probably half way up, and ascended about thirty feet, as Mr. Smith, the Dr. D. Smith (who was not at home) states, above the trees. Dr. D. Smith, scarcely had time to get up, when the smoke again came out, three times. They were both much alarmed, and did not think it prudent to go towards the spot from whence the smoke ascended. But since that time, a party of gentlemen from St. Andrews, have explicated mountain, but could find no trace to cause the belief that it was a volcanic eruption, but so strong is the impression on Dr. D. Smith's mind, that he is unable to shake it, and he says, "The day was calm and cloudless. Our own opinion is, that it was a volcanic eruption, and in this belief we are strengthened, from the circumstance, that on the same day, and near the same hour, about 200 barrels of weight of paper which was drying at Chamcook Mills, was carried into by a whirlwind, and dispersed in all directions; some of it fell on the top of the mountain, and it may be proper to add that in February last, Solomon Brown, his wife and George Greenleaf, and John Smith, were on the mountain, about a quarter of a mile from where Dr. D. Smith saw the smoke ascend, and that it was accompanied by a noise similar to what Dr. Smith has heard.—Herald.
