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BRITISH VESSEL BOUND FOR PARA TO LISBON.
The vessel was taken on a Sunday. The passengers, Captain and Crew were put in a boat Tuesday following, for the purpose of going to Lancelotti, one of the Canary Isles. They were then about two miles from the shore. The water was so smooth that the schooner had but little motion. The breeze of about 8 knots, but not sufficient to excite alarm. It is possible, but highly improbable, that the persons in the boat are lost. Witness confessed that he should not have liked to have been in the boat. There were 17 or 18 persons. They left Las Damas Argentina at night. When he last saw them they were about a quarter of a mile distant. They cried from the boat that she was leaving. Mr. Tallent and Mr. Pearson were the only passengers in the Caraboo. There were some articles of silver on board the Caraboo, which, being produced in Court, witness identified. They were marked P. Prisoner took them to himself. A sale was made of the baggage and the articles brought from the Caraboo. Prisoner purchased the plate at this sale. All purchases were charged in an account book, kept by witness, against the several purchasers.

The argument of Counsel for the Crown, and in defence of the Prisoner, being closed, the Jury retired, and in a few minutes returned with a verdict against the Prisoner of Guilty.
The Prisoner was remanded to prison, and brought up the next forenoon to receive the sentence of the law. He addressed the Court, in English, at some length, in extenuation of his crime. The sentence of death was pronounced, and he was ordered for execution on Tuesday.

The same day, Tuesday the 23d, the parties indicted with Josef Lazaro Buysan, were arraigned at the bar of the Court, and put upon their trial, as was also Josef Martinez and Manuel Gonzalez, parties concerned. The evidence with little variation, was a recapitulation of that adduced the previous day. The Jury, as in the former case, retired for a few minutes, when they returned a similar verdict against all of the parties but Honoro Jose, who was acquitted, it having been proved that he had been compelled to serve in Las Damas Argentina. Pepe Gonzalez, in consequence of his youth, was strongly recommended to the merciful consideration of the Court. Sentence of death was pronounced by the Court on the several criminals, who were ordered for execution the ten first named, for Saturday, between the hours of ten and four; and the remaining ten for Monday next, between the same hours.

On Wednesday, the 24th, the following persons implicated equally with those condemned the previous day, were brought before the Court, and arraigned—viz:
Alfred Cooper, William Ogle, Peter White, Neil McNeil, Daniel Holland, Thomas Hennessy, William Phillips, William Hanton, Joseph Fleming.

Though the evidence in the case of these prisoners elicited some redeeming circumstances, yet the fact of their being accomplices in the crime with which they were charged, was clearly established on the testimony adduced in the previous cases. The Jury, after an absence of a few minutes, returned a verdict of Guilty against the prisoners, recommending William Ogle, from his youth, to the mercy of the Court. Sentence of death was pronounced, to be carried into execution on Tuesday, the 20th instant.

On Monday, the criminals, part of the crew of Las Damas Argentina, who were convicted of the piracy capture of the Caraboo, and who, as we announced in our last, were ordered for execution on that day, suffered the sentence of the Law; so also did seven of those on Tuesday, on whom the judgment of the Court was pronounced on the previous Wednesday.
Neil McNeil, William Ogle, and Pepe Gonzalez, received the pardon of the Commander-in-Chief, on condition that they serve ten years in His Majesty's Navy.

There were five men taken in Las Damas Argentina, who were not present at the capture of the Caraboo; they, with the last named parties, and Harrison, one of the evidences for the Crown, embarked in His Majesty's Ship Victor on Tuesday.

The awful termination of the career of the unfortunate persons (twenty-eight in number) who, within the space of three short days, have been launched into eternity under the just sentence of the Law, is strongly illustrative of the inscrutable ways of Providence. They had feloniously made prize of the Caraboo. They sent her in this character, to the abettors of their nefarious course; and in a little while afterwards, eager to share the spoil, and ignorant of what was going forward in this quarter, they sailed down to their fearful destruction! They have suffered—suffered deservedly! Let us hope, as Christians, that the expiation of their crime earned with it that penitence and contrition by which alone Mercy is held out to the hardened sinner!

On the three occasions of execution, Elias Harry Merriam, Henry Harrison, William Ogle, and Pepe Gonzalez, were made to follow the carts which carried the prisoners, to the place of execution.

Throughout the period of their imprisonment, the unfortunate sufferers were attended by the Hon. and Rev. D. G. Davis, Rector of this Parish, the Rev. J. S. Clinkett, Curate; the Rev. Mr. Whitcomb, Missionary; and the Rev. Mr. Johnson, Missionary; and other Gentlemen of the Clergy and Missionary Establishments; and there is reason to hope that their sedulous exertions were productive of effect in impressing on the minds of some of the criminals, a just sense of the wretchedness of their state, and, consequently, of conveying to them the imperative necessity of a sincere though brief atonement of their offence.

apparent apathy in not interfering, either by force or influence, to stop the progress of the Autocrat. Some, prophesying, (aided as they think by divine revelation) the speedy downfall of the Ottoman Power, and a consequent general involving of the European Nations in a bloody struggle;—while a third party content themselves with calmly viewing the firm but cool and determined steps adopted by our Government; satisfied, that though its administration are in full possession both of the means and disposition to watch over the interests of the Country, both at home and abroad.—The conduct of the Duke of Wellington, in several recent instances, justifies the propriety of viewing things in this latter point of light.

It is now put beyond a question, that the Admiralty arrangements are placed upon the same footing, as they were, previous to His Royal Highness the Duke of Clarence's taking office.—The Board will consist of five Lords, with Lord Melbourne at its head.

The accounts from Portugal continue to present a most distressing picture of the situation of affairs in that country.—Confiscations and imprisonments are daily taking place, while in many instances, the victims themselves are totally ignorant of the cause of their being devoted to suffer, suspicion amounts to condemnation.—Those who have the means, and opportunity of leaving the country, are doing so.—Many of these refugees have already arrived in England.

The state of things in Portugal proves another fruitful source of conjecture as to the line of conduct likely to be adopted by England.—It appears, however, that the Premier is as capable of keeping Cabinet Council secrets, as he ever was, those of a Council of War. It is not likely that much will transpire upon this subject until the return of Lord Strangford from Brazil.

The circumstance of Grapes, the produce of this Province, having been sent to the City, as we noticed last week, has led to our making further inquiry respecting the extent to which the cultivation of the Vine has been attended to, in order to ascertain whether or not, practical experiment will bear us out in asserting that our climate is suitable for it.—The enquiry has even exceeded our expectation.—The Wild Grapes abound in various districts of the Province, particularly in Sandy soil, and several Gentlemen have, during last year, made transplantations of the Vine, with the view of improving the fruit, and of bringing it to an early state of perfection.—A Farmer from Grand Lake states that his attention had been for several years past, strongly drawn to the importance of the subject, from seeing this fruit in its wild state produce, on particular parts of his farm:—he has now appropriated part of his Garden as a Vineyard, and furnished it with a sufficient quantity of soil in which he observed the wild plants to thrive.—We entertain no doubt of the success of the experiment; it is deserving, however, of public notice, in order that others, similarly situated, may be induced to follow the example.

We are informed also that, both last year and the very fine Grapes have been produced at St. Andrews, in the open air, in the Garden of Christopher Scott, Esq.—The Public Press, both in Nova-Scotia, and likewise in this Province, without doubt, done much for the advancement of their agricultural concerns; we should like much now to see it exert itself in forwarding their horticultural interests.—While it has been usefully employed in rousing the community to the belief, that we can be independent of foreigners for a Supply of the necessities of life, let it not be backward in showing, both by the adducement of facts and the publication of practical information, that our situation on the globe furnishes us with the means of being independent of them for many of its luxuries.—Indeed, from the enquiries we have made, and the information received from distant quarters of the Province, we are perfectly convinced that nothing but inveterate obstinacy and determined sluggishness, stand in the way of our not being abundantly supplied from the interior, with many descriptions of apples, pears, plums, cherries, currants and gooseberries.—If to this variety be added our wild fruits, say raspberries and strawberries which are no where produced in greater abundance than in this Province; who can say that the comforts of life are not entirely within our own reach?

It is gratifying to learn that the planting of Orchards is yearly becoming an object of increasing interest among our farmers; and the day is not far distant when our market will be plentifully supplied with the article of CYDER, both for exportation and home consumption.—Mrs. Clarke at the Grand Lake will gather this year about 2000 bushels of apples, and a gentleman in this City, will have by the month of June next, 1000 fruit trees planted on his farm near this City. When it is considered that this fruit can be so plentifully produced, with scarcely any injury to a surface crop, it is rather matter of surprise than any thing else, that the subject has been so long neglected by our Agriculturalists.—The different modes of manufacturing cider both in Nova-Scotia and in the United States, we shall take an early opportunity of noticing.

Arrived by the Steam Boat St. John, on Thursday last, from Amnapolis, the REV. MR. HUNTER, on his way to Scotland.—Mr. H. will perform Divine Service in St. Andrews Church, tomorrow.

Loss of the Schooner Grampus, and two Children.—In consequence of the strong Sutherland gale of Tuesday, the schooner Grampus, Dorsey, from Little River, Digby Neck, bound to Eastport, had to bear up for this port. While attempting to come in, about eleven o'clock that night, the schooner struck on the foul ground, and directly the sea made a break over her. The Captain and another man, the only men on board, took the punt, a very small one, and the only boat belonging to the vessel, to come on shore for assistance; leaving behind them, Mrs. NOWLIN, the wife of Mr. John Nowlin, and her four children. When they went off again, the schooner could not be found. The next morning it was ascertained, that the schooner was driven by the wind and sea into a cove, between Red Head and Little River, where the schr. struck the shore and her two young children, jumped out of the vessel with her two youngest children, and in getting them situated on shore; but when she went to bring the other two children from the vessel, they were not to be found. On Wednesday morning the bodies of both were found.—City Gazette.
