[The following Petition intended to be laid before the Legislature at its next meeting, is published by request.]
To His Excellency Major-General Sir HOWARD DOUGLAS, Bart. the Honourable His Majesty's Council, and the Honourable the House of Assembly, of the Province of New-Brunswick.
The PETITION of the undersigned, Merchants and Traders, residing in the City of Saint John, humbly sheweth, That your Petitioners consider themselves as part of the permanent population of the Province, deeply interested in its prosperity, and equally concerned in whatever affects the welfare of the Country, as well as the City.
Your Petitioners, therefore, feel under an imperative duty upon them, in bringing under your consideration, the present scarcity of circulating medium throughout the Province, and the distressed state of Trade in general, with a view that your united wisdom may devise and meet such Laws and Regulations, if practicable, as shall best remedy the evils complained of.
Your Petitioners are fully aware that various causes contribute towards these grounds of general complaint, but no one cause they verily believe and are firmly convinced, has a more direct and immediate tendency, than the present unlimited sale of Sales by Auction, whereby Foreigners and non-residents from Europe, and the United States, are enabled to pour into our Market, for the purpose of realizing Cash, and thereby drain away what little of the specie, makes its appearance amongst us.
Your Petitioners do not hesitate to assert upon principles of correct reasoning, that the system of auctioneering Goods of all descriptions, to the extent and in the manner in which it is now conducted in this City, is not only ruinous to all legitimate commerce, but is in reality destructive to the fair and regular trade of the Province at large, and sapping the foundation of the Country's independence and prosperity.
Your Petitioners are aware, that a Law of the Province at present exists, for the purpose of raising a Revenue, as well as to protect the resident Importer, and Trader, taxing sales at auction, with a duty of two and a half per cent.; but your Petitioners beg leave to represent, that the construction put upon that Law, enables the auctioneer to make sale of property consigned to him, by paying the Province, (we believe) less than one twentieth part of that duty, whereby not only the Public Revenue is greatly diminished, but Foreigners and non-residents are enabled to come into the Market with Goods, upon more favourable terms than the resident importer, the former being exempt from all local taxes, except the pitance paid into the Province under the present system, and the commission to the Auctioneer for selling—by this method of conducting trade, the Province pays away to strangers, not only the original price of the articles sold at auction, but in addition thereto, a profit which arises from the sale, even admitting that in some instances the articles sold do not pay costs and charges, the injury to the resident importer becomes thereby more apparent.—Your Petitioners need hardly remark, that nearly all the Goods sold at Auction, are the property of Foreigners and non-residents, and in most cases designed to be sold at Auction, and particularly manufactured and suited for such Sale.
Your Petitioners can prove that their prayer for redress and protection is not founded upon trivial grounds of complaint.—The System to which they object, threatens to overthrow the steady and progressive improvement of the community of which they are Members.—To demonstrate the magnitude of the evil, your Petitioners state, that from the best information they can acquire, one half of the Sales of Imported Goods made in the City for the present year, is effected by auctioneers, in behalf and for account of Foreigners and non-residents.—In fact, to such an extent has the system now arrived, that it supersedes all private Sales of any note, except on a long credit, or a barter Trade.—When your Petitioners, in looking over the Journals of the House of Assembly for last Session, see that the amount of auction duty paid into the Province Treasury, was only £399. 16s. 11d. for 1827, they cannot but express their opinion, that the present Law, respecting auction duties, needs amendment.—To check the evil some kind of, and to prevent foreigners and non-residents from being at an advantage over the resident Merchant and Trader.—Your Petitioners beg leave to recommend that the duty upon Goods sold at Auction be increased; and that, as all the Auctioneers, (especially in this City) are Commission Merchants also; a proper line of distinction may be drawn by the wisdom of the Legislature, pointing out plainly, what shall be considered a Sale at Auction, and what not; framing the oath to be taken by the Person making such Sales, in such a manner and form, that it cannot be misconstrued, as a favour or protection to the legitimate Trade of the Province, your Petition-

ers most humbly recommend, that a transient tax be levied upon all Property belonging to Foreigners and non-residents imported into the Province for sale and consumption in it, except such as are the growth and produce of our Sister Colonies in North America, including the West-Indies.
Your Petitioners are aware, that upon first view of this subject, those who are residents in the interior of the Province, will consider the prayer of this Petition as favouring a principle of monopoly, and tending to keep up the prices of imported Goods.—But your Petitioners need scarcely remark, that the number of Importers and Merchants now residing in this community, and other Ports in the Province, are too many to permit of any combination of that nature.
Your supplicants find it impracticable to embody in this Petition, all the sound arguments that could be brought forward to shew the many pernicious tendencies of the leading evil complained of, to the true and permanent interests of the Province at large.—The individuals who are interested in upholding the System of Sales by Auction, hold out the specious doctrine, that by the facility which is given to Foreigners and non-residents by it, of forcing speedy Sales for their goods, that the consumer is enabled to purchase at a lower rate; so far the argument may hold good in some cases; but it should not be forgotten at the same time, that the surplus produce of the Country is all that can be brought into the Market in Exchange for Foreign Articles, or for the purpose of realizing Cash.—Now, it can be proved, that the Foreigner and Non-resident, who pour their Goods into this Market, to be sold at auction, do so for the express purpose of realizing Cash, and are not the persons who consume or find a Market for the surplus produce of the Country—and while the Farmer and Country Trader may please themselves by making at times, what they consider a cheap purchase at auction for ready Cash, they forget that they are aiding to drive out of the Country, the little specie which is in it, and disabling the resident Merchant and Citizen from purchasing with Cash, the only article which the Farmer or Country Trader has to bring into the Market for Sale.
Your Petitioners believe, that the grounds of their complaint, and subject of their prayer, requires only to be fairly understood, to receive from the proper authorities, whom they have the honor to address, such correction as the nature of the case demands. Your Petitioners, therefore, most humbly pray, that their case may receive the consideration which it so urgently demands, and that you will grant to them and the Province at large, such relief and protection as they stand in need of, and your Petitioners, as in duty bound, shall ever pray.
St. John, 25th Nov. 1828.
[Read at the last meeting of the Quarter Sessions the following Bill for the purpose of the same being brought before the Provincial Legislature.]
An ACT for the early trial and discharge of Persons committing criminal offences in the City or County of St. John, under the Degree of Grand Larceny.
I. BE IT ENACTED, by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council, and Assembly, that so much of the Act, passed by the twenty-sixth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, entitled, "An Act for the speedy punishment and redress of such persons as shall commit criminal offences under the degree of Grand Larceny," as relates to the City and County of St. John, be, and the same is hereby repealed.
II. And be it further enacted, That if any Person or persons, shall, hereafter, in the City or County of St. John, commit any breach of the Peace, or other criminal offence, under the degree of Grand Larceny, and being committed to Gaol, shall not within twenty-four hours after such commitment, give sufficient Bail for his appearance, at the next General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, for the said City and County, then and there to answer for the same, it shall and may be lawful for any two Magistrates of the aforesaid City and County, together with the Mayor or Recorder of the said City for the time being, forthwith to hear and determine the offence committed by such offender or offenders as aforesaid, and on conviction by confession, or the oath of one or more credible witness or witnesses, the said Magistrates are hereby authorised to give judgment against such offender or offenders, by fine or to have, and receive such punishment, by fine or imprisonment, or by fine and imprisonment, by labor on the streets or highways, and upon other public works, or by such corporal punishment, (not extending to life or limb) as they in their discretion shall think fit, after which punishment, said criminal or criminals, if an inhabitant or inhabitants of the said City and County, shall immediately be discharged, without paying any Fees, if not an inhabitant or inhabitants thereof, he, she, or they, shall immediately be ordered out of the said City and County to the place of his, her, or their former settlement, or place of abode, or out of the Province.—And if any person or persons have been so ordered out of the said City and County, shall remain therein for the space of five days, or return thereto within twelve months after such order, the Person or Persons, so remaining or returning, shall be forthwith apprehended, and again receive such sentence of fine, imprisonment, public labor, or corporal punishment, as a like Court of Magistrates, shall, in its discretion, order and direct, (not extending to life or limb) as aforesaid.
III. And be it further enacted, That the charge of punishing such offender or offenders, shall be raised, levied, and paid in like manner, and at the same time that money is raised in the same City and County of St. John, for paying the contingencies of the same, so as the whole charge for prosecuting and punishing such offenders, shall not for each, exceed the sum of Fifteen Shillings currency of this Province.
POSTSCRIPT.
HALIFAX, December 2.
The Chebucto arrived last Saturday morning about 8 o'clock, but the weather being extremely hazy, that vessel had anchored, and His Excellency Sir PETER PEREGRINE MAITLAND had landed in a private manner, before his arrival was generally known. His Excellency immediately assumed the command of the garrison, and on Saturday afternoon about 4 o'clock, he proceeded in state to the council chamber, where the usual oaths were administered to him as Lieutenant-Governor, by Sir ROBERT D. GEORGE, Secretary of the Province; after which the Hon. M. WALLACE resigned the Government to His Excellency, under a salute from Fort George. In the Chebucto also came Lady SARAH MAITLAND and family, and the Hon. ROBERT BOYLE, accompanied Sir Peregrine as his aid-de-camp.
From Papers brought by the Ship Ann.
LONDON, Oct. 27.
The Corfu Gazette, announces that Baron Sermet, one of the commissaries of the French army in the Morea, has arrived in the Ionian Islands, to make contracts with several mercantile houses for the supply of the troops. The sum, as we have already stated, is 700,000 francs per month!—It seems, however, from a letter quoted by the Austrian Observer, that Baron Sermet, seeing that Corfu had but few resources for the supply of an army, intended to apply elsewhere.
On the 29th Sept. all the transports which were at Corfu had been invited to go to Navarino to take on board and convey to Egypt, upon advantageous terms, Ibrahim Pacha and the remains of his army. The expedition fitted out by the Greek Government against Prevesa, which consisted of about 40 gun-boats, under Colonel Passano, and 6000 land troops, under Gen. Church, seems to have wholly failed.
The German Papers have no news from the theatre of war later than the bulletins from Shumla, of September 27, and from Varna, of October 1. At Odessa, on Oct. 3d, there was a vague report of the defeat of Grand Vizier, and the taking of Varna, but there was no account at Odessa late as the 1st October.

Exclusive of the bridges over the Danube which the Turks possess at Giurgevo and Silistria, they have likewise other passages, near Semnitz and elsewhere, where they fortify themselves without any opposition. It is, therefore, to be feared, that as the Russian army has not a single point of retreat near Isakletka, the Turks will push into the principalities upon several points and lay that country waste, in such a manner as to render it impossible, or at least very hazardous, to seek winter quarters in the principalities.
BUCHAREST, Oct. 5.
We have no news from Little Wallachia, since the victory of General Ciobanu.
The two main Russian armies are still before Shumla and Varna, and the earlier statements of a retreat of the first towards the Danube, are not confirmed. It is natural that the retreat from Shumla, announced by the Russians themselves as near at hand, should increase the general alarm that had prevailed here for some months, respecting the military operations, and that this gave rise to exaggerations, which may be easily excused under these circumstances.
TOULON, Oct. 18.
According to the last accounts from the Morea, it appears that the troops are distributed as follows—2000 at the camp of Petaldi, seven or eight thousand men about Navarino, a half brigade at the Isthmus of Lepanto. This last corps was gone to favour the expedition under Admiral De Greig, who is going to cannonade the Forts of Lepanto and Patras. The number of sick are augmenting among the troops which are before Navarino.
We understand that the Mexican Packet brings about \$130,000 for merchants' account, and 150,000 more have arrived at the Havannah in the Aurora. Trade was very dull at Vera Cruz.
His Majesty, we are happy to state, is now perfectly restored to health.
St. PETERSBURG, Oct. 11.
The sums received from Persia begin to arrive here; the silver will come partly by water and partly by land. Among the gold are several medals of uncommon size and weight.
JASSY, Oct. 4.
The latest accounts from the theatre of war say, that the Russian army of the left wing still remains in the position before Shumla, notwithstanding the declaration in its own bulletins what it was intended to leave it. Fierce actions however, daily took place.
It seems that a report had been spread that the English Admiral, Sir P. Malcolm, was not to act in concert with the other Admirals and that the reports had relaxed the preparations of Ibrahim for the evacuation of the Morea. But Sir P. Malcolm declared to the Pacha, in the most formal manner, that he was resolved to execute, in concert with the other Admirals, the convention of Alexandria, and the treaty of the 6th July.

Ship, William, Cape for Liverpool, 14 days out was spoken for at 10. 28. 10. 28.
The ship, which Capt. Sylvester Allen, sailed from Gottenburg September 25, of and bound to Warren, R. I. October 23, while lying to, in a tremendous gale, from S. E. at 4 A. M. was struck with a heavy sea, which carried away the head, head rails, bulwarks, &c. and caused her to leak badly, but were able to keep her free with one pump, until the morning of the 5th inst. when the leak suddenly increased, and both pumps were worked for three days. At the time the leak still increasing, and the crew nearly exhausted, it was resolved to abandon her, as soon as a vessel was in sight, or in the boats at the last extremity. On the 7th, lat. 33, 30, long. 68, 80, it blowing a heavy gale from the N. W. finding it impossible to keep her afloat another day, having already thrown over 70 tons of iron, hove to, under close reefed topsails, and while the crew were expecting a speedy termination of their sufferings, at 4 P. M. providentially discovered a sail, and at 5 o'clock up with the boomers, Captain Sylvester Allen, to under her foresail. Immediately foresail the pumps, and after great difficulty succeeded in getting out the boat, in which they embarked at 7, without being able to save even their clothes. After a narrow escape from foundering in the boat there being a heavy sea, succeeded in getting on board, where they were kindly received and most humanely treated by Capt. S. who had himself been sometime out, and was already short of water and provisions. Augmenting his short allowance, until the 10th, when they were supplied with a barrel of bread, 100 lbs. of provisions, and a barrel of water, by the brig Constitution, from Philadelphia for Laguna. On the 12th they were taken on board the British brig Retrench, Cooper, from Greenock, for Charleston, where they were very hospitably treated until the 16th. They were then transferred to the brig Mordecai, capt. Fisher, which arrived at New York on Saturday. A CARD.—Sylvester Allen, late Master of the ship William, of Warren, together with his officers and crew, beg leave through the medium of the public Journals to tender their sincere thanks and unfeigned gratitude to Capt. Sheffield, of the Schooner Eagle of Canning, (N. B.) for his exertions in rescuing them from a watery grave, and for his kindness and attention while on board, rendering their situation in all respects as comfortable as the nature of the case would possibly admit. It is said that the British ship Argyle (300 tons) recently abandoned near Machias, and afterwards picked up by some Americans, and on board a new suit of sails and rigging for a large ship, and that her commander offered about \$1000 to have her released which was refused.
Batavia, June 13.—The Bonavista, (Br.) Towns, from Sydney to the Mauritius, struck on the Kins reef, in latitude 21, S. longitude 156 E. on the 18th of March and immediately became a wreck. The crew remained on the reef for eight weeks, and consumed a cutter out of the materials, and loaded her with the cargo, when the Argyle (British ship) from Sydney to Singapore, hove in sight, and took the vessel in tow, but she upset, and the master, passengers and crew (except 3 men drowned) were with difficulty saved. £1400 in specie had been put on board the A. (which arrived in our roads on the 11th inst.) the evening before the accident.

tons; that she put to sea, and was picked up by the Asia; that the ship having bore away a full struck the former, when she immediately sunk, and nothing was saved from her but a small keg of Dollars.]
