By Capt. MABEE, of the Barque Helen Grey, we have been politely favoured with Lloyd's List to June 19, and a London paper of the 17th. It furnishes, however, nothing of importance respecting the Turks and Russians in addition to what will be found in another part of our paper.

A Bulletin Extraordinary, dated Carthage, April 9, says, a Bogota despatch of the 21st of March contains the official account of the termination of the war in Peru. The preliminaries of peace were signed on the 27th February. They were ratified by Sucre and Lima, on the 1st of March, and confirmed by Bolivar the 22d of same month. Among the articles we cite the following:—The Columbian territory to extend as far as New Grenada did in August, 1825. The debt due by Peru to be paid within 18 months. Commissioners to be appointed to carry these two articles into effect, and any dispute as to the amount due, an American power shall decide.—Bolivar guaranteed the Pinchincha corvette to be restored by Peru, and 150,000 dollars paid for the attack on Guayaquil, which city is restored to Colombia: the Peruvian troops to retire south of Macara. The President of the United States of North America to be invited to be mediator.

Capt. MABEE had a London paper of the 20th June, but some friend having taken it without his knowledge, we are deprived of a perusal of it. It however contains nothing, of much importance.

NANTUCKET, July 18.—Capt. Coffin, of the Reaper, recently arrived, discovered in lat 9 55, S. long 152 40, an island not laid down on any chart he has seen, and which he named after his ship. It was low, covered with wood, uninhabited, apparently about 12 miles in circumference; and surrounded with a coral reef.

PORTUGAL.—The present State of Portugal, we are happy to perceive, by late English Papers, has at length been brought before Parliament. And we this day publish an abridgement of the lengthy and interesting Debates, which took place in the House of Commons, on the 1st of June, in relation to that subject. From an attentive perusal of them it appears, they originated from a motion, made by Sir JAMES MINTOSH, with respect to that part of the KING'S SPEECH in Parliament, concerning the relation of GREAT BRITAIN to PORTUGAL, which was entered and read. This being done, he addressed the Speaker at considerable length, reviewing the state of Portugal, and the horrors to which it had been subjected by the usurpation of DON MIGUEL. His object, was seen very clearly—to attach all blame to His Majesty's Government, for having in times past, appeared to favor the Constitution, and then abandoning it to its fate; while the supporters of it in Portugal, are now left to the mercy of the blood-thirsty Tyrant. Many on the opposition benches went a step farther than this; and in their over-heated discussions, actually attempted to insinuate, that at early the King's Ministers had not only supported the Constitutional Cause, but had actually favored the designs of Don Miguel. We shall not now enter into the truth or falsity of this bold statement—let the consciences of Ministers plead guilty, or not guilty, as the case may be. To us it appears impossible, for the BRITISH CABINET, either to have ever countenanced the barbarous measures of the inhuman monster, or still to cherish any feelings, except those of pity and disgust, towards him. And after reading the clear and able reply of Mr. PEREIRA, we have the charity, ourselves, to think that the insinuations to this important groundless. And in reference to this important subject, we hear the Editor of the New-York Advertiser, saying, with his usual clearness and comprehensiveness, on all political subjects: "It was most satisfactorily refuted—and in the refutation of this point even Mr. Huskisson coincided—that Sir Charles Stewart had any hand in making or framing the Constitution.—It was by mere accident that Sir Charles was the hearer of that instrument, and the late Mr. Canning wrote circulars to all the Courts of Europe to that effect.—The British army was sent to Portugal to repel a French invasion; and having checked by its presence that insidious project, forthwith returned to the bosom of that country, which had sent it forth. It was enjoined on an account to interfere with the party dissensions of the Portuguese themselves, but in all matters of a domestic nature to observe the strictest neutrality, unless the lives and persons of the Royal Family should be actually placed in danger, when it was to interfere for their protection only. The principle of this line of procedure is so clear, and without any doubt, that it seems in its general applicability not to be liable to a single dissenting voice; and if any doubts should arise as to the necessity of deviating from such a policy in the case of Portugal especially, they must be settled when it is recollected how large the majority is, and how clearly the public voice has been raised against the Constitution of Don Pedro. The Portuguese who were in arms for the support of the Constitution, however zealous and sincere they may have been in the cause of liberty, exhibited so much indecision and imbecility, not to say actual cowardice, that it was found impossible to assist them. They might have advanced upon Lisbon from Coimbra, and crushed the persecuted tyrant at the outset, but they did not. They might have maintained themselves in mountainous fastnesses near Oporto, but they ingloriously fled. They have rallied and concentrated themselves in the northern part of the kingdom, but they disbanded themselves and sought refuge in foreign countries. We dislike to say they exhibited a want of courage, but they certainly did display a culpable lack of confidence in themselves and in the glorious and sacred cause which they had undertaken to defend. As regards the unfortunate affair at Tereira, we can only regret that the conduct of the Portuguese Legion at Plymouth, rendered such a course of conduct necessary as the British Government deemed it proper to pursue. After all, the question remains still unanswered—whence the supineness and indifference of Don Pedro which so unaccountably continues till the present hour? And why should England be expected to do more than he does? Does he not see that the great mass of the Portuguese People prefer Don Miguel and his government, infamous as they both are, and therefore wisely leaves the disorder, which it sooner or later must do, to work its own cure." In these sentiments we are perfectly concurring; and they speak much for the good sense and political judgment of their author, being no less honorable to the heart, than the head of the individual, who conceived them.

We have much pleasure in laying before our readers, the following documents, transmitted by Rear Admiral Sir CHARLES OGLE, to the Chamber of Commerce of this City.—In our last, we inserted a paragraph under date St. John's, N. F. 10th July, on the same subject, but it appears from these documents, that the situation of the Virgin Rocks, as there stated is incorrect.—The following documents while they show the attention of the Admiralty to the Commercial interests of these Colonies, are entitled

to full credit, as they are given under his own hand.

SIR,—I have much pleasure in forwarding to you, herewith, for the information of the Mercantile Community of the Province of New-Brunswick, the position, and other particulars, of the Virgin Rocks, off the coast of Newfoundland; ascertained by Lieutenant BURNOR, of the Manly, Gun Brig, and Mr. ROSE, Master of His Majesty's Ship Tyne: which may be thoroughly depended on.

Report of observations made on the Virgin Rocks, in order to ascertain their Geographical position. Observed with a Circle (by Worthington and Allan) Admiralty Chronometer (by Grayhurst and Harvey, No. 89, and Chronometer by Barrard, No. 502.

VIRGIN ROCKS.  
Latitude, — 46, 26, 15, 3, N.  
Longitude from Greenwich, — 50, 56, 35, W.

"The above are the mean of a series of observations made during 48 hours: the Inspector lay at anchor two hundred yards N. E. of the shoal part of the Virgin Rocks: the horizon perfectly defined, and the weather every way favorable for determining their position.

"The Rocks extend in an irregular chain, or cluster, S. W. by W. and N. E. by E. 800 yards: the breadth varying from 200 to 300 yards: the least water on a white rock in 4 1/2 fathoms, with from 5 to 6 1/2 fathoms about one hundred yards all round it: the bottom distinctly visible. Towards the extremities of the shoal, the soundings are from 7 to 9 fathoms on detached rocks, with deep water between them; the current setting a mile an hour to the W. S. W. with a confused cross swell to the S. E., South, S. W. West, and W. N. W. of the shoal, the water deepens gradually to 30 fathoms, half a mile distant: to the N. W. North, and N. E. one third of a mile, and to E. N. E. East, and E. S. E. a mile."

"The bank upon which the Shoal is situated extends E. by N. and W. by S. four miles and a quarter; and two and three quarters miles across its broadest part, with regular soundings of, from 25, to 30 fathoms, until they suddenly deepen on its outer edge to 29, and 43 fathoms."

Extract of a Letter from Lieutenant Bishop, Commanding H. M. Gun Brig Manly, dated 9th July, 1829.

"The bottom was repeatedly seen by the Officers of the Ships, in from 7, to 14 fathoms, apparently of a very white chalk, with large patches of seaweed on the sand around them. In addition to this, on the morning of the 7th, about 2 o'clock A. M. when riding with a whole cable and a heavy sea, I observed such violent breakers near the Brig as to cause me to batten down the hatches, and I am of opinion that had there been a little more wind, no vessel could have passed over that spot, or remained there with safety."

DEBATES IN PARLIAMENT ON CANADA.—To-day, we publish the Debates, which took place in the House of Commons, on the motion of Mr. LABOUCHERE, in relation to Canada. Although nothing of signal importance was involved in the discussion; yet it must afford much gratification to the people of that Country, as the COLONIAL SECRETARY has stated, that their interests, feelings, and wishes, should be constantly kept in view by the Mother Country. The Papers moved for, having been granted, was no doubt soon after laid on the table of the House; but we think little or nothing can be done respecting them (this should we not say the last) Session, which has probably long ere this terminated. To every lover of his country, it must be pleasing to observe, that MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT, are now becoming more acquainted with the actual state of things, in our own hemisphere. For our parts, when we read so many conflicting statements, running to and fro throughout the earth, in the Journals of the day; and hear so many strange expressions drop from the mouths of Ministers, in the Parliament of the Empire, we are not at all surprised, when we consider how many impure sources of information there are, from whence they derive their partial knowledge of the general interests of the North American Colonies. We do sincerely hope, that proper representations will be made, particularly by those in the Provinces, holding high and official situations. Thus, the knowledge of Ministers will continue to increase; and the northern dominions of His Majesty, will be represented by them in the manner their importance demands.

NEW CHURCHES.—We understand, two NEW EPISCOPAL CHURCHES have lately been erected at Loch Lomond, 10 miles distant from each other—one on Mr. VAN HORNE'S Farm, about five miles on the Road, from the head of the Lake; and the other on Lands belonging to His WORSHIP THE MAYOR, at the lower end.—The dimensions of them are 32 by 45 feet. The frames are good, and the Buildings are in a fair way of being speedily finished. The one below is so situated, that it can be seen from the Upper Lake. Prospects, most pleasing to the benevolent mind, have thus opened in a District, comparatively destitute of religious instruction; and hopes are entertained, that they will be confirmed by the induction soon of a faithful Pastor over it.

The EPISCOPAL CHURCH, at Portland, now nearly completed, affords another indication of a determination to provide and disseminate the privileges and blessings of a Public Ministry in our destitute vicinity.

ROBBERIES DISCOVERED.—We rejoice to learn, that the perpetrators of the late Robberies, particularised in our last, have lately been safely apprehended. It appears that, on Tuesday evening last, information being given to Mr. REID, (brother to the one robbed), he in company with a proper officer, proceeded to the house of Mr. BOWMAN, Tavern-keeper in Duke-street, where they happily discovered two men, busily engaged in raffling dry goods, and other articles, which were immediately, on the spot, identified by Mr. REID, as those having been stolen. This, of course, broke up the game for that evening; and the robbers were taken into custody, and sent to Kingston, (the Old Bailey of this Province), where they will await their trial. In connection with this affair, we have heard also, that a hired man, has been implicated by the thieves themselves: he has been reunited with his former companions, and will probably obtain the same REWARD, being equally engaged in the good work. Besides this cheering information, to the lovers of peace and good order, we learn, the three Tinkers, who entered the houses of Messrs. PRATMAN, BULEA, and LAWSON, have all shared the same fate, as their associates above. The stolen Watches, were taken

from them. Not being accustomed to close confinement, they appeared somewhat restless at first—so much so, as to make them strive hard to regain their former liberty, by endeavoring to make a hole in the stone wall of their cage, and picking out the lime with a large spike. They did not, however, effect this desirable object, being very timely detected. And in order to their spending the time in a more profitable manner, the Sheriff has taken the precaution to handcuff them. Only let those in authority be watchful and vigilant, and the country will soon be cleared of those deprecators, who, under the darkness of night, violate and put at defiance, the Laws of the Land.

ALARM OF FIRE!—Nothing of this kind, has been heard of for some time past in our city, until yesterday morning, when the cry of "FIRE" was heard. It was discovered to have originated on the roof of a house in Church-street, in the occupation of several families; but, fortunately, through the unremitting exertions of those, collected on the spot, the element was stopped, without making any progress of consequence.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—On Sunday morning last, a young Man of the name of FELIX M'CLASKEY, very recently from Ireland, went in to bathe at the Breakwater, and was unfortunately drowned. He went out but a little way, and whether he was taken with cramp or was unskilful in swimming, is unknown. His sinking first excited the attention of a young man who was in the water at the same time, but at some distance; and although the young man made several efforts to save M'Claskey, at the imminent risk of his own life, unhappily they were unsuccessful. We learn he was unmarried, and has left three affectionate sisters in this place to lament his untimely fate. The body was soon found, and an Inquest held upon it.—Verdict, accidentally drowned.—OBSERVER.

THUNDER STORM.—This morning we had a most violent Thunder Storm, which lasted nearly two hours. We may now look for a clear atmosphere.
