

poison, and its recall was barely in time for the... Without the Black Sea, the army, beyond the Balkan, could not be supplied. These circumstances accounting for the hasty conclusion of peace in 1810, the writer shows how widely different from them are present circumstances. Russia is at peace with Great Britain; she commands the navigation of the Black Sea, by means of which she is able to convey her heavy artillery, baggage and supplies by water, to the Gulf of Bourgas, and to land reinforcements on the coast. Between the gulph of Bourgas and Constantinople, there appears no obstacle to the march of an invading army, flanked by the Russian army is, by a friendly shore, washed by a sea, contributing every necessary element to the success of the enterprise. The next important town, at the mouth of the Danube, is, in the writer's opinion, it will not be necessary to capture.

The face of the Country from Kirki-Killisa to Constantinople is undulating, but without wood, or fence, or scarcely a ditch. The country is badly watered and little cultivated, and the Russians, though they have an open field for their operations, will, if those operations are protracted, be exposed, especially in the sultry season, to hunger and thirst. Their success depends much therefore, upon the celerity of their movements. If the Turks have time to collect their forces in the plain, a desperate battle must be fought in a country peculiarly favourable to the Turkish Cavalry. If the Russians can approach Constantinople, without hazarding all they have gained in a general battle, with an enemy driven to desperation, the fall of the city seems unavoidable.

The writer then takes a view of the present resources of Turkey, which he represents as feeble in comparison to what they formerly were. The largest portion of the Navy of the Grand Signior was destroyed at the Battle of Navarino, and the Greek sailors are alienated. The corps of Janissaries, whose valour, though undisciplined, would, in this crisis, be of essential service, has been slaughtered, by the orders of their own sovereign. Thousands of those who, from their birth, were enrolled among the members of this sacred corps, now rejoice in the misfortune of one who has so nearly annihilated their order. The supplies formerly received from impositions on the Greeks are cut off. The Trade of Turkey is entirely at a stand, and the credit of the government can hardly be said to have an existence. The Turks are also deprived, by the war between France and Algiers, of the aid which that barbarous power might have afforded to them.

Taking this change of circumstances into view, concludes the writer, it must be evident, that the peace of 1810 affords no reason for expecting a similar issue to the present campaign. On the contrary, if there be no interference of any of the other powers of Europe, in favour of the Turks, it will appear somewhat miraculous, if the pending contest between Russia and the Porte do not terminate in a decisive blow, indicative of the speedy destruction of the Ottoman Empire in Europe.

NEW PUBLICATION.—An Association of Physicians in Philadelphia, have commenced a periodical paper called the "Journal of Health." It is to appear twice a month, in numbers of sixteen pages, price \$1 25 per annum. The plan of the work is explained in the following extract from the Prospectus:

"Deeply impressed with the belief that mankind might be saved a large amount of suffering and disease, by a suitable knowledge of the natural laws to which the human frame is subjected, they propose laying down plain precepts, in easy style and familiar language, for the regulation of all the physical agencies necessary to health, and to point out under what circumstances of excess or misapplication they become injurious or fatal.

The properties of the air, in its several states of coldness, dryness, moisture, and electricity; the relative effects of the different articles of solid and liquid aliment; the manner in which the locomotive organs, senses, and brain, are most beneficially exercised, and how, and under what circumstances, morbidly impressed; clothing, for protection against the atmospheric vicissitudes, and a cause of disease, when under the direction of absurd fashions; bathing and frictions, and the use of mineral waters—shall be prominent topics for inquiry and investigation in this journal.

The modifying influence of climate and localities; legislation, national, and corporate, on health; a course of study usually designated by the term Medical Police, will furnish subjects fraught with instruction, not less than amusing and curious research.

"The value of dietetic rules shall be continually enforced, and the blessings of temperance dwell on with emphasis proportionate to their high importance and deplorable neglect. Physical education—so momentous a question for the lives of children, and happiness of their parents—shall be discussed in a spirit of impartiality, and with the aid of all the data which have been furnished by enlightened experience.

The Journal of Health will, on all occasions, be found in opposition to empiricism; whether it be in the sale of mercury, or in the recommendation of nostrum makers and vendors, or recommendations of even scientifically compounded prescriptions, without the special direction of a physician—the only competent judge, in the individual case of disease under his care.

The prevention of diseases incidentally arising out of the practice of the different professions, arts, and trades, will be laid down with clearness and precision, nor shall the situation of those engaged in naval and military life, be overlooked in this branch of the subject."

PROGRESSIVE POPULATION AND EXTENT OF RUSSIA.—In the year 1476, Ivan the Third, the last Grand Duke of Moscow, succeeded to paternal estates of— Geo. sq. miles. We may throw in another two millions at least for the natural increase of the Russian population, conjointly with the forced increase of subjects pilfered from the Persian crown during the three years of modest pretensions preferred by the present Autocrat. To this plain statement we may add Babi's recent estimate of the actual state of the Muscovite empire.

TURKEY.—The extent of the Ottoman dominions is estimated at 47,444 square miles, of which 10,000 are in Europe; but its European population has been variously computed; Babi assuming it at 9,500,000; Hassel at 10,183,000; and other writers at 10,600,000. Of these there are not more than 2,271,000 Turks; the remainder being composed of a motley mass of Pagans, Jews, and Christians, 300,000 Jews, and 80,000 Armenians. The whole population of the empire, in Europe, Asia, and Africa, is 23,650,000. The revenues of this empire are about 2,500,000 annually; and the expenditure disbursed by the state does not exceed 2,275,000. The national debt is between seven and eight millions sterling.
