

erifice of their religious sentiments, when interest requires it. It is astonishing to what great lengths this motive may carry the unfortunate victim, who happens to be under its secret influences. Under its magic power, the Papist becomes an Episcopalian—the Episcopalian a Papist—a man of the Dissenter a steady Churchman! In short, the labyrinths, into which it generally leads its votaries, are diversified, according to circumstances, and time and place. To enter upon a recital of them here, would take up more room than the narrow precincts of a weekly print would allow, or you would be willing to spare.

Closely allied with self-interest is hypocrisy. What a detestable principle, how unworthy the human character, and how devoid of honor and sincerity is the individual who possesses it. It is one of the meanest and basest traits of character a man can be possessed of. Hypocrisy renders him contemptible in the eyes of every man of honour; and makes him odious in the estimation of every candid and honest person. You cannot confide in a hypocrite; any professions which he may make to any thing will be doubted and discredited, because hypocrisy is known to be the prominent feature of his character—because it is known to characterise him in every thing he does—because it is known to sway his every movement, to actuate his every motive—and because he is known to sacrifice every sentiment of truth at its base and shrine. He will assume any character which shall accord with his interest, and beneath which he can win with the greatest security and safety. Sometimes, the better to cover his crimes, he puts on the mask of religion, and shows all those outward and ostensible signs of piety and devotion by which it would appear, that he was not a pretended and affected, but a real candid and practical Christian. Yet, under the sacred and holy mantle of religion which he has assumed, will be concealed principles and sentiments, as adverse to the true principles of Christianity, as the creed of the Pagan. Beneath that heavenly name will be secreted a heart at once false and depraved. Sometimes he even enters the sanctuary with his unhalloved feet, and clothes himself in his ministerial garb, the better to cover his real character, and the more effectually to hinder the world from seeing his bad propensities. He ascends that chair from which the Gospel truths should be delivered by one untainted with hypocrisy, with a sanctimonious and pious-looking countenance, with a reverent-like and apparently devout aspect, having all the outward marks and characteristics of a truly sincere and exemplary minister, and with that decorum, respect, and deference, as to impress upon the minds of his beholders, that there stood before them, a true and faithful servant of the Lord. He will there expatiate largely on the benefits resulting from Christian charity, moderation, and forbearance, and appear to be the friend of "unlimited toleration," and the various denominations of the religious world. Yes! and added to all this, he will speak of Charity as a heaven-attaining qualification, as one of the brightest and purest gems which can deck or adorn the character of a Christian—as the sure basis upon which the Christian can raise his hopes of salvation, and without which it is impossible to please God, whilst he is uncharitable himself, and has a heart as cold and callous as adamant. He will recommend Charity as a holy and heaven-born sentiment, whilst his own sentiments run as counter to her dictates, as vice does to virtue. Such, Mr. Printer, are a few of the acts of the hypocrite, particularly when veiled under the cloak of religion—thus he acts theoretically, and practically—thus he acts paradoxically, and with dissimulation. But here I wish to forbear for the present. Only allow me to ask your readers, is this an exaggerated description?—Brutus seemed to be a friend to Caesar, and Caesar thought he really was so—but he found that when he thought his friendship the warmest, it was the coldest: He discovered, when too late, that a dagger was in his smile, and a poniard lurked beneath the mantle of his friendship.

A few more words, and I have done: The paragraph which has given rise to the preceding observations, is already before the Public. Although such "petty attacks" are in themselves totally harmless, yet their authors should be exposed, and held up to public execration. We live in a land of true gospel light and liberty, and the benign laws of our country, allow every individual, (whether high or low, rich or poor,) to sit under his own vine and fig-tree, none daring to make him afraid, and to pay homage to his Maker, in that way which is most consistent with the dictates of his own conscience. This is the natural and indefeasible right of every British Subject—and it commences and closes the Christian Religion. This law should be written in letters of gold, and on a pillar of marble; and be valued and defended, in the spirit of meekness by every Englishman.—Let it be remembered, this is Eighteen Hundred and Twenty-nine, and we hope the "reign of terror" is not again about to be revived. If the newspaper Editor, in fault, think to gain the respect and approbation of his readers, by publishing his sarcastic remarks on the tenets or practice, of any body of professing Christians, he may happily find himself much disappointed. To conclude: When individuals are tenacious in speaking of, or pointing out (what they only imagine), the inconsistencies of others, they will most assuredly realize—like the viper who gnawed the file—however sweet it may be, for the moment, to their taste; yet it is, in reality, nothing less than their own blood!

WE have no later intelligence from Europe to lay before our readers this week, than that published in our last. But this deficiency is more than amply made up, by receiving the MESSAGE of the PRESIDENT of the UNITED STATES. Copious extracts therefrom will be found to occupy a very prominent situation in this day's paper. Nor do we unwillingly devote our columns to the publication of the most interesting parts of this lengthy document; and we hope, the reader will enjoy that degree of pleasure in perusing it, which we experience in giving it publicity. We flatter ourselves, that the Public generally, will be highly gratified with the substance of this SPEECH—not merely on account of the ability and common sense displayed in its composition, but also, the moderate and pacific sentiments it contains and breathes forth. To give our opinion without any reserve; seldom, indeed, have documents of this description, given greater satisfaction generally, or called forth more universal expressions of commendation, than the first MESSAGE of GENERAL JACKSON.

In another column, we have inserted an article from the *John Bull*, which, as it involves a subject connected with our national greatness, cannot fail to be interesting. We confess, we had always considered the question therein renewed, as long since set at rest; and that the undivided merit was universally acknowledged to belong to the learned and venerable Scottish Judge, JOHN CLERK, Esq. of Eldon. We trust, therefore, we need offer no apology, while we give a place to this article, for accompanying it with copious extracts from the Review of his Essay on Naval Tactics, a work not within the reach of many; in order that our readers may perceive the ground of our opinion, and be enabled to form a correct judgment for themselves, on the question now before the Public.

**THE WELLAND CANAL.**—It affords us great satisfaction to learn, from a late Canadian Paper, and to announce this piece of information to the Public,—that agreeably to the arrangements of a Committee, appointed for that purpose, at a Meeting lately held in the village of St. Catharine, (U. C.) on the 12th ult. the grand celebration of the event of opening the Welland Canal for navigation, and the passage of the first vessel, through all the locks from Port Dalhousie, on Lake Ontario, to Buffalo, on Lake Erie, via the rivers Welland and Niagara, was to have taken place on the 24th of last month, in a style, worthy of this most important and beneficial epoch in the History of Canada.

**GALE.**—On Saturday night last, we were visited with a violent gale of wind from the South. In consequence thereof, a newly-erected Racket Court was raised to the ground, and the tops of the two stone pinnacles, secured with iron cramps, on the tower of St. John's Church, were also removed, one of which fell on the roof of the building, and descended from thence to the gallery, that did much injury to the Organ, and several of the Pews. In reference to this gale, it affords us much pleasure to say that no injury was done here to any of the vessels then in port; but we regret to learn from the St. Andrews Herald, of last date, that considerable havoc, to the shipping in that quarter, had been done by its extreme violence. See Marine Journal.

Agreeably to Public Notice, the Rev. Dr. BURNS delivered an appropriate Sermon on Sunday evening last, to a large and respectable audience, from II. Cor. ix. 6, when the amount collected, (including a few sums since received), was £13 : 1 : 3, to be applied for the benefit of the Church in Horton, N. S. in connection with the National Establishment of Scotland.

**FREDERICTON, DEC. 15.**  
We consider it our duty to forbear any allusion to the question respecting the appointment of an ARCHDEACON for this PROVINCE, while that question remained undecided, and appeared to have given occasion to an unpleasant collision between conflicting claims. Now however that the matter is settled, and settled as right required that it should be, we no longer feel any difficulty in acquainting the public with the facts of the case, as far as they have come to our knowledge.

When the much lamented death of our late Archdeacon took place in England, His Majesty's Government at home regarded the vacancy as one which it was their office to fill; and after due consultation with those who were best informed of the state of affairs in this Province, a despatch was sent hither, directing the Institution, "unless the Bishop of the Diocese should see reason to object to it," of a Clergyman, who, whether we regard his age and experience, the station which he occupies in the Province, or the high character which he sustains among both Clergy and Laity, might justly be thought superior to any exception.

It happened however that the Government laboured under an unfortunate misapprehension. The nomination of the Archdeacon which was originally vested in the crown, had been by Royal Patent transferred to the Bishop, subject only to His Majesty's approbation of the individual who might be nominated. When therefore the despatch which had been received here was communicated to his Lordship, he naturally remonstrated against the inversion of the order established by the Patent; and proceeded to assert his right by the nomination of the Person selected by himself for the vacant Archdeaconry.

This nomination, as we have already officially announced, His Majesty has graciously confirmed by his approbation. It was impossible for that sanction to be withheld; since it appeared that the Bishop had merely exercised a clear and certain right, and no objection could be made to a Gentleman of such established respectability as the ARCHDEACON of NEWFOUNDLAND.

In dismissing the subject we may be allowed to observe that, while we sincerely regret, in common with all who know the exemplary character of the RECTOR of SAINT JOHN, the painful disappointment to which he has been subjected, we are confident, as we have already officially announced, in the rightful exercise and necessary confirmation of the Diocesan's indubitable privilege. Should the inhabitants of the Province feel themselves aggrieved that an Archdeacon has not been selected out of their own Clergy, we would remind them that the Bishop's choice can scarcely be expected to be confined within such limits, as long as New Brunswick forms only a part of a more extensive Diocese.
