

question which has heretofore been amicably negotiated upon; and if there was any design of proceeding against the usurer Miguel, why should a measure like this be adopted, which would, in various ways, impede the operations of the Brazilians, and justly represented, it can hardly be if the case is seriously intended to interfere again in the affairs of Portugal, at least in conjunction with Don Pedro.

“RIO DE JANEIRO, April 22.

“The British Government having sent orders to make reprisal of Brazilian vessels to the amount claimed for captures during the war with Buenos Ayres, if this Government refuse immediate settlement, has caused some excitement. The vessels of war are now off the harbour, waiting the decision, which has been procrastinated for some days. The amount claimed is £442,000 sterling, for vessels condemned and detained. It does not appear likely a settlement will be made until after some vessels are taken. This is either policy on the part of the government, or hardihood.

At a public meeting of the British Medical-Botanical Society, held in London in April last, Mr. Barbour [the American Minister] spoke as follows:—

“He was requested to return thanks for his brother Ministers, the representatives of Foreign Courts, from no merit of his own, but from the circumstance of his speaking with facility the English language—a facility which he possessed from enjoying a common origin with Englishmen, [hear, hear.] Though distance might separate England from America—though the wide waste of waters rolled between them—yet it should be remembered they used the same language, and their origin was derived from the same source. In the language of adoption used by one of the most eloquent orators, he would say—“Our people are your people, and our God is your God.” [cheers.] He would further, in the same spirit say—“May riches set your right and your left hand; may your ways be the ways of pleasantness, and your paths be the paths of peace. These were his sentiments towards the English nation—sentiments which he had no doubt were fully shared by his countrymen. [Applause.] As to the Medical-Botanical Society, he had stated when he first became a member of it, that he thought his office might enable him to facilitate the discovery of some of the hidden merits of the various vegetable productions of his country. He was still impressed with the desire of being as useful as his opportunity would enable him to be, and in conclusion he would assure the Society that there was no person more impressed with the utility of the Society, or more desirous to promote its salutary objects, than was the individual, in whatever situation he might be placed, who now addressed them. [Applause.]”

THE LATE ARCHDEACON BEST.

On the 9th instant, we took notice of an account which had been received here by the May Mail, of the death of the Venerable Archdeacon Best; and although, in giving publicity to that statement, we did so from being entirely without any grounds whereon we might have rested a confident hope that such statement would prove to be erroneous; there were, nevertheless, on the other hand, many circumstances existing at that time, towards which the private feelings of friendship were strongly attracted, from the plausible aspect under which they then appeared. We conceive, however, that it would have been treating the venerable character of our lamented Rector with disrespect, if we had not acted as we did upon the very credible testimony and painful assurances which we were so unexpectedly furnished. That testimony and those assurances, we regret to say, have since received many additional evidences of their veracity, and one of them in particular, it is now our duty to mention.

Upon entering Christ's Church on Sunday last, we found that “House of Prayer,” dressed in the habiliments of deep mourning.—It forced conviction in a moment, that every rational hope had been entirely dissipated, and that those whose duty and inclination impelled them to exercise a circumspect forbearance on the receipt of the first intimation, had subsequently found it impossible to efface their reluctant assent by withholding any longer the last token of outward respect due to the dignified character, and sacred station of the departed.

We are aware that it falls not strictly within the general province of a Newspaper to enter into particular discussions about matters purely of a religious tendency; but circumstances will sometimes concur to render it unavoidable; and we believe that the present instance may justly be included among those occasional exceptions.

In the morning, the Rev. GEORGE McCRAW, A. M. delivered a discourse relating to this subject, that more especially by those who were so recently acquainted with the object of it, fully appreciated its worth. The style of that discourse was a striking illustration of the simplicity of truth; while the manner of its delivery told far more eloquently than words could express it, how much he loved him. He needed not, for himself, to have used that touching sentence, “We loved thee together as friends.” It was too evident to the tongue of friendship faltering under the performance of the last friendly office.

The Reverend Gentleman's very appropriate text was taken from the 13th Heb. v. 7, 8.—Remember them who have the rule over you, whose voice speaks unto you the word of God, whose faith follows, considering the end of their conversation: Jesus Christ the same yesterday, to-day, and forever. From those words he preached a sermon whose every syllable was listened to with deep and profound attention. It was a condensed history of the late Pastor's ministerial and domestic life, from the period of his residence in the Sister Province, down to his departure from this but a few short months ago; his bland and unassuming deportment; his charge of the various and important duties of arduous situation; his unceasing labours in the

vineyard of his Great Master; his love for the people of God, and his paternal and constant watchfulness over the best interests of the flock committed to his charge; his affection for the rising generation around him, exemplified in the provision he made for their religious instruction; and his anxiety in succouring the distressed and indigent on all occasions. He also truly said, in substance, that the Church, he had lost, in him, a zealous and a faithful Servant; and the Clergy of his Archdeaconry, an affectionate brother. We have used the word “truly” on our own personal knowledge; and this is not the time when we should refuse to add, upon the same unquestionable evidence, that in him, the fatherless found a father, and the stranger a rare and an invaluable friend.

We have said this much, from an irresistible sense of duty, and for the satisfaction of those friends of the deceased who could not have had the opportunity of hearing the gratifying and honorable tribute of esteem which was so eloquently and feelingly paid to his memory, at the time above mentioned.

In the afternoon the same Reverend Gentleman again officiated, and preached a most instructive Sermon from the 24th Chapter of St. Matt. v. 48. Therefore be ye also ready, for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of Man cometh. Not forgetting to put the flock, with good judgment, in remembrance of those mournful things, which he had more fully expatiated upon in the morning day, while at the same time he laboured to establish their admittance and saving influence in the hearts of all: and thus closing the solemn and impressive services of the day.

The following Letter and Affidavit relate to a very distressing shipwreck, which has recently occurred at the Island of Anticosti. We hope the marks enumerated will lead to the discovery of the name and destination of the vessel, and the number of hands on board. The affidavit will afford matter for close, and we trust, successful investigation, on the part of the proper authorities:—

PICTOU, JUNE 12, 1829.

Dear Sir,—I take the liberty of sending you the enclosed affidavit for publication, showing the melancholy fate of a number of human beings, (supposed to be 16 or 18 in all.) I have just returned from the Magdalen Islands, where I saw a number of articles belonging to the unfortunate sufferers, but not one of the ship's papers, or any other thing to show distinctly what she was, or where she was owned. By publishing the annexed marks, which appear on some of the articles, the parties concerned will be able to ascertain what vessel she was.

I cannot close this account without noticing the circumstance of the occupiers of the Post on Anticosti being absent. I have been informed that this and two other Posts, have been kept up for a number of years during the winter by the Government of Lower Canada, for the purpose of affording aid in many cases of shipwreck, which happen on the Island; and they also posted up, at a certain distance along the coasts, signal posts, with suitable labels, directing the reader in what direction the houses were, the distance, &c.

It remains to be shown for what reason these houses were abandoned by their keepers, without notice being given publicly; and I trust it will point out most forcibly the necessity of having them in future well supplied and attended.

Marks on part of the Property.—A table cloth A B 8, a pair of stockings R M, a cotton shirt I N, a ladies pocket A B, a trunk made by M. A. Broholm, Soho, London, a pair of stockings I F H, some silver tea spoons J S, two Quebec papers, latest date 23d October, Gazette; a shirt P. Vaughan, one do. Wm. Nash No. 8, September 17, 1827, a finger ring engraved inside “married J. S. to A. S. 16th April, 1822.” On a blank leaf in Blum's American coasting pilot, was written “J. Stickney, Esq.” J. S. Campbell, Esq. Quebec,” on another leaf of the same book, was written, “Ship Granicus, Cook,” &c. On the African Coast Pilot and two other nautical books, appears “Robert Martin, Barnmouth, by Aytton, near Berwick, N. B.” below two lines of poetry in the seamen's daily assistant “Adam Willis.”

The Frenchmen have a deal of other property in their custody, belonging to these unfortunate people, part of which I did not see; among them were 3 Quadrants, 4 Watches, £25 sterling in cash, 20 packs Cords, a number of ladies dresses, such silk and poplin gowns, lace caps, &c. Also some very neat dresses for boys and girls, of the age apparently of from 3 to 6 years. All the ships Nautical Books and instruments, a boat which I saw, but could trace no name on her, I think she is Colonial built.

The property is now divided among the Salvors but P. F. Colbeck, Esq. Collector, authorised me to say, that he would try to get the valuable part of it collected together, and keep it in trust for the owners, until property be proved, and salvage, and expense of interment paid.

On a small piece of paper found with some money was written the percell.

COPY OF AFFIDAVIT.

To all whom it may concern, be it known, that Jacques Bourgeois, Joseph Boudroit, Joseph Bourgeois, and John Chesson, all of the shallop Victoria, of the Magdalen Islands, have personally appeared before me, P. F. Colbeck, Esq. one of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace, for the district of Gaspe, and made oath, that on Tuesday, the 12th May, inst. they landed on the North side of the Island of Anticosti, about six leagues from the East point, and visited a fur station there which they had previously known, that they found the door of the house shut and tied inside with a rope, that on forcing the door, they perceived the carcasses of 4 human beings with the heads, legs, and arms cut off, and the bowels extracted, hanging by the thighs in the room, and two others on the floor cut up in the same manner, that they found a human body in a hammock, who appeared to have died there: the body was bited like a sailor, that there were two trunks in the room with human flesh in them cut up in small pieces, there was also a piece of human flesh in it, round the house pieces of human flesh and bones strewn about, there was no appearance of bread, flour, or animal food in the house. Two brands of fire were in the fire place and some ashes, in the house were two axes and an adze, on the shore was a Jolly boat, but the name was defaced. From the clothing there appeared to have been both women and children of the party. The Frenchmen interred the bodies,

He passed through Fredericton, (on his way, as is supposed, to the States,) where he was recognised by the Postman, who, thinking he might not be the MAN, very judiciously declined mentioning the circumstance, lest being a HARE, the good folks of Fredericton might think him fair game, and hunt him accordingly.—Colonist.

Edmund Burke, one of the most celebrated characters in the Province, has lately been set at liberty, upon condition of leaving the country for ever. He was under sentence of death for having violated a conditional pardon by which he was saved from the gallows. We doubt whether the man will find it an easier task now to quit his old associates and favorite haunts than in 1816, the period we believe at which his pardon was granted. He is a fine well made muscular fellow, with much intelligence and spirit in his countenance, and could be cured of his unfortunate propensities for appropriation, and learn a little more respect for the distinctions of *meum and tuum*, he might in a country where his name is not known, still aspire to an honest reputation, and hope to be no longer considered a curse to society. However he is one of that class of men, whom we should not be very anxious to retain among us, from any anticipation of future reformation.—Montreal Gazette.

As the two Outlaws spoken of in the above paragraphs, are now at large about the country, it is not unlikely that we may have a visit from one or both of them in this quarter, very shortly; but as they will not be very desirable visitors, we would advise the members of this community to be on the look out for them.—Should HARE be once caught by our City Hounds, we fear he will not escape without dissection.—The hemp, no doubt, has long since been sown, and it is to be feared, that both will soon reap its benefits.

NEW POST-OFFICE.—We are glad to announce that a Post Office has been established at the Portage, Magaguadavic, and that Mr. GIDEON KNIGHT has been appointed Post Master. The great necessity there existed for a public place of deposit for letters and papers at Magaguadavic, has long been severely felt by all persons transacting business with the settlers on the banks of that extensive and important river.—St. Andrews Herald.

Melancholy accident.—On Sunday the 5th instant, while some children were amusing themselves near the bank of the Magaguadavic River, a little below the lower bridge, one of them fell over, and struck on the rocks beneath—a distance of twenty-five feet. He is supposed to have been instantly killed, as he was taken out of the river some hours after with a shattered skull.

A brig supposed the Joseph, of Whitehaven, from Liverpool or London, bound to Quebec or Montreal, went ashore, and was abandoned on the Bird Islands, early in May last. She had a full cargo of assorted Goods, which, together with the materials of the shers belonging to the Magdalen Islands. Chetecamp, in Cape Breton, St. Peters, Miquelon, &c. &c. Some of the property has been sold for the benefit of all concerned; but the largest part has been converted to private use by the salvors.
