RUMOUR OF PEACE IN THE EAST!—The European Intelligence, published in this day's sheet, is nothing later than that published in our last; nor does the additional accounts received, confirm, in the slightest degree, the important topic of discussion in all the Journals of the day, i. e. that a TREATY OF PEACE had been concluded in the East, between Russia and Turkey. Of one thing, however, we are certain—the RUSSIANS are in possession of ERETZUM and ADRIANOPLE, and no TURKISH ARMY is to be discovered, capable of disputing the advance of the conquerors. Thus, the incalculable weakness of the OTTOMAN EMPIRE is placed beyond a doubt; and, indeed, its helpless situation has been long no secret; so that there is now no alternative for Turkey, but to sue for PEACE—aye—and be glad to obtain it on almost any terms. And, we have no doubt, but this has been the case. The accounts, however, differ as to the projects entertained by the Sultan, and the opinions that prevail in the DIVAN. Some think that MAHMUD, alarmed at the personal danger which threatens him, and dreading the discontent of his subjects, has declined all kind of European mediation, placed himself altogether at the discretion of the RUSSIANS, and is looking for his salvation from the generosity of the EMPEROR NICHOLAS alone; while others assert, that an armistice has really been concluded, because such were the representations of the ENGLISH AMBASSADOR, that GENERAL DREITSCHER, would have found himself at war with ENGLAND upon his own responsibility, if he had advanced upon CONSTANTINOPLE. These two versions produce at this moment two parties, one of which represents an opinion, and the other a hope. One assigns to the RUSSIANS, the honor of cutting the knot in this great catastrophe; the other attributes this glory to the ENGLISH—but the truth is, the real situation of affairs in the East or Europe, is still enveloped in a profound mystery; and which nothing but time can develop.

With respect to the demands of the Czar, nothing definitive is yet known; but all the accounts concur in stating that they are moderate. This, we are somewhat inclined to doubt; for in the MANIFESTO, issued on the declaration of War, by the EMPEROR OF RUSSIA, it is declared—"That he will not sheath the sword till the Treaties of Kamardje, Jassy, Bucharest, and Ackerman, and the Commercial Treaty of 1738, are punctually fulfilled; till the inviolability of the Russian flag are recognised and personal safety secured to all Russian subjects, wherever they may be; till the trade of the Black Sea is declared free, and the Bosphorus open to all nations; till the independence of Greece is recognised on the basis of the TREATY OF LONDON; till amnesty is granted to the inhabitants of Servia, and Moldavia and Wallachia, placed under the protection of Russia, and till an indemnity is given for the expenses of the war, as well as for the losses sustained by Russian subjects." Such is the substance of the demands laid down by the EMPEROR, previous to the commencement of hostilities; but as the war has been protracted, and much additional expense incurred, on account of the obstinacy of the SULTAN, a question immediately arises in our mind, and that is, whether or not Russia will make any further demands of Turkey, than those contained in the above extract? Judging from her general character, and disposition for aggrandizement, we say, unhesitatingly, she will. It is stated, upon good authority, that the RUSSIANS require an indemnity of eight millions sterling; but that in consequence of the exhausted Treasury of the Porte, they are willing to receive it in merchandise, naval, or military stores, or in any other way that the Turks can manage it;—and that they require to take possession of only two towns in Asia, viz. Anapa and Poti.—Such, at least, is the language of a late number of the London Globe, and published, as coming from the most respectable sources of information.

By the convention of AKERMAN, which was agreed to about three years ago, the treaty of Bucharest was confirmed, and all preceding conventions, relating to WALLACHIA and MOLDAVIA. It was further stipulated, that the government of these two principalities should be entrusted to Wallachian and Moldavian Boyars; the governing Prince to be chosen by two Divans, and confirmed by the Porte. Stipulations were made relative to the duration of their government, and to the levy of taxes; and all taxes were to be remitted for two years. The frontiers of Asia were to remain as before. Stipulations were also made in favor of the Servians; fixed taxes and ground rents were to be established; they were to be allowed freedom of trade; to travel with their own passports; freedom of religion and of the administration of justice; the establishment of schools and printing offices, and the exclusion of the Turks from Servia, except garrisons in the fortresses. Indemnity was to be made to Russia for robberies of the Barbary Powers, and for other claims of Russian subjects; also to subjects of Turkey,—the sums to be liquidated by a mixed commission. The Porte agrees to fulfil all the obligations of the treaty of 1738, especially every thing which guarantees the free passage of ships under the Russian flag. He accepts the good offices of Russia, with respect to the admission of all flags into the Black Sea, that have hitherto been excluded from it. These are the principal stipulations of the convention of Akerman, by what we can learn, and as far as they have been published.

Throughout the negotiations arising out of the TREATY OF LONDON, and the diplomatic discussions incident to the war, which we regard as being now nearly at an end, ENGLAND and FRANCE have held steadily together, professing only one object, having only one wish—the welfare and tranquillity

of Europe generally. "It is a happy circumstance that, though Kings occasionally fancy they can gain something by war, they also know at the present day, that they may lose much."

The report is renewed of the Pacha of Egypt having formed the intention of declaring himself independent of the Porte. Among other things said upon this subject it is stated that the Commissioners sent by the Sultan to Egypt, to hasten the departure of the Pacha's fleet has been strangled. The fortifications constructing at Alexandria, give some weight to this conjecture.

GREECE.—Independent Greece is at present divided into thirteen departments; seven continental and six insular. The continental departments comprehend a surface of 6,429 square miles, and a population of 300,000 souls. In the best times of Greece the same space was occupied by not fewer than 205 cities and towns, and by a population of about 2,200,000 souls. The insular departments comprehend a surface of 1,389 square miles, and a population of 196,000 souls: making in the whole, a surface of 7,778 square miles, and a population of 496,000 souls.

In the session of 1828, there were printed, by order of the House of Commons, 1,579 petitions, and in the last session no less than 3,194—making a total of 4,773. The extent of the number can easily be accounted for by a reference to the two great questions—the Repeal of the Test and Corporation Acts, and the laws affecting the Roman Catholic.

Mr. SADLER, the Duke of New-Castle's member of Newark, has published a pamphlet against the system of Free Trade that seems to have occasioned much excitement.

BRITISH NAVY.—Extensive naval preparations were making at Portsmouth. Accounts from that place of the 19th Sept. say—The ships at present building in this Dock-yard are, Neptune, 120 guns; Indus, 80 guns; Acteon, 48; Hazard, 48; Electra, 18; Tergastant, 10; Buzzard, 10; Charybdis, 10; Lynx, 10. Those ordered to be built are, Royal Frederick, 120; Euphrates, 46; Spartan, 46; Theban, 46; Tiger, 46; and two sloops of 18. At Plymouth, the ships building are, the St. George, 120 guns; Nile, 92, on two decks; Hindostan, 80, on two decks (teak); Tigress (teak); Statira, and Prosperine, frigates Race Horse, corvette; Reindeer, and Rolla, 10 gun brigs. The Savage brig is to be laid down as soon as the Reindeer's ship is vacant, and the materials are getting ready.

A London paper states that the amount of imports into Great Britain in the year ending the 5th of January last, was £43,396,527, being an increase over the amount imported the preceding year of £7,357,576.

HIGHLY IMPORTANT NEWS—CONFIRMATION OF PEACE!!!

THE Land Mail from Halifax arrived, just when we were going to put our Paper to Press. We find in the Papers received, London dates down to the 13th of October, which are several days later than any received here. The great question of Peace or no Peace, is now substantially confirmed. Is there Peace in the East? We answer, there is. For how long? We cannot tell. Our time and limits will not allow us to say any thing further on the important subject; and precludes the possibility of giving our readers any thing more, in the present number, than the following few hasty extracts:—

LONDON, OCTOBER 13.
According to the private letters from Lisbon this morning it was expected Don Miguel would be recognised as king by the English Government. This appears to be generally current at Lisbon.

The Constitutional of Wednesday last, after enumerating the conditions upon which Russia has been pleased to conclude a peace with her unfortunate opponent, has the following remarks, which are worthy of notice not merely as emanating from the organ of the Russian government in France but from the facts, however unpalatable to us, which they convey:—
"Is it not current that a treaty on these bases puts Turkey in Europe at the mercy of Russia; the Principalities governed under the influence of the Czars; Servia itself, which forms a long stretch of the Austrian frontiers, subjected to the same regime; the fortresses of Wallachia and Moldavia, exempted from Turkish garrisons, and consequently at the disposal of the Muscovites. As a further security, the demolition of Giurgievo, the only fortress on the left bank of the Danube which could oppose any obstacle to another invasion from Russia. So much for Europe. According to these conditions, and admitting that they soon evacuated European Turkey, the Russians are enabled, at pleasure, and without striking a blow, to take possession of it anew. But it is not enough even to be masters of Turkey in Europe; the Russians have adjudged to themselves in Asia three portions at the foot of the Caucasus, which have the fourfold advantage of affording the means to have a hand-on one part of Turkey in Asia to keep in respect and to threaten Persia in case of need; to look over with a scrutinizing eye the English possessions in India; and to aggrandise their territory on the Asiatic sides of the Black Sea. Behold, in short, the Ottoman Empire at the discretion of Russia. "This is not all. The free passage of the Bosphorus and the Dardanelles is assured to vessels of every nation who are not at war with the Russians and the Turks, from which it clearly follows, that the Russians, and no longer the Turks, nor the English either, remain masters of the two Bosphoruses, and that British vessels shall no longer be permitted to enter the sea of Marmora, nor be allowed to penetrate the Black Sea but with the sanction of the Emperor of Russia. The vast projects of Catharine are they not now completely realized?"

The Journal of Odessa of the 15th of Sept. contains the following remarkable passage: "If the Sultan has sufficient sense to appreciate his true interest, he will seek the alliance of Russia, whose policy is to gain the affections of the Turks and thereby extend her commercial relations both with Persia and Turkey."

Despatches were this morning received at the Foreign Office, from Sir R. Gordon, dated Constantinople, Sept. 19. A copy of the Treaty of Peace, signed at Adrianople on the 14th, had reached the Turkish capital, and has we understand, been transmitted in Sir Robert's despatches. We are enabled to state, that the Treaty does not contain any such conditions as that mentioned in the French Papers, that the passage of the Bosphorus shall be open to the vessels of all nations at peace with Russia and the Porte. On that head, we understand, it merely stipulates that there shall be a free passage to the Black Sea, for the vessels of all nations at peace with the Porte, without making any reference to the relations which may at the time subsist between such nations and Russia. We believe that the despatches have been forwarded to the Earl of Aberdeen, who is at Windsor, where his Majesty holds a Council to-day.

ADRIANOPLE, Sept. 14.—Peace was signed this morning by the Russian and Turkish Plenipotentiaries; commissioners will immediately go to inform Count Paskewitch of this happy event. Orders will also be sent to the Turkish Commanders to cease hostilities. This news has not given pleasure to the inhabitants of Adrianople, who since the arrival of the Russians, have enjoyed tranquillity, and fear, probably with reason, that when they withdraw, some re-action may ensue. Many families, Mahomedan as well as Christian, are preparing to leave the City on the retreat of the Russians, and to fix their residence in the Principalities, for which they are said to have obtained the permission of the Russian General in Chief. All property belonging to the Ottoman Government is now sending away northwards to Ados and Silistria. In the course of the war, the Porte has lost above 2,000 cannon and 200,000 muskets. The Turks also have sustained a great loss in fine stallions and mares, which will be a valuable addition to the Russian studs. It is said that for some time past there has been a formal suspension of arms at Shumla, and that it depended solely on the will of General Krasowsky to make himself master of the place.—Allgemeine Zeitung, October 5.

GENTLEMEN.—The Officers employed in the Bay of Fundy this Summer, to ascertain the geographical position of certain points therein, have reported to me, that "the Latitude and Longitude of Head Harbour Light-House, were found, by a series of observations taken on the spot, with a Sextant, fixed on a stand, by Dollond, and artificial horizon of quicksilver, and with the Admiralty Chronometer, No. 257, made by Parkinson and Troughton, well regulated, the fixed Meridian of Halifax Naval Yard, to be Latitude 44° 56' 52". Longitude, 66° 56' 55".

I beg to make you acquainted therewith, observing in your notice to Mariners, respecting the above Light-House, to give me the Latitude, 45° 3' m.—Longitude, 66° 53' m.
