

appears to have laboured under the delusion of an extraordinary revelation being committed to him, telling his friends it was his lot to fast for forty days. At the expiration of that time, it was expected that persuasion might induce him to eat; but he persisted in saying he had no divine command to eat, but wonders would yet be wrought by him. &c. In this way he continued, till fasting rendered his speech quite inarticulate, and his remaining faculties gradually failed.

QUEBEC AND BOSTON.—When General Craig was Governor of Canada, he caused a road to be made from Quebec to the lines, in the direction to Boston, the enterprising citizens of Vermont and New-Hampshire made roads in their States to promote the object—and a stage was established to run directly from the capital of New-England to the Capital of the British Provinces. The stage ran for some months and the papers and letters were conveyed by this route; but the population was too sparse to support it. Governor Craig was recalled—it had no aid from the different governments—and was discontinued. Since then the road has been neglected, and trees have grown again and encumbered it. But Governor Kempf, the present patriotic ruler in Canada, has turned his attention to it—the obstructions are to be removed, and the British Government has ordered that emigrants shall be encouraged to settle on its sides. Many lots have been laid out for them, and great numbers have gone thither. This circumstance may revive travel on this route. Maj. Starks once endeavored to form a company to make a Turnpike road from Boston to the Canada Line, and obtained the necessary surveys and drafts. Quebec lies nearly north of Boston—and the distance is only 270 miles.—*Boston Palladium.*

The Rhine is to be connected with the Danube by a Canal. Then a vessel can go from London to Constantinople, by inland navigation, (after crossing the N. Ocean.)—canat the Black Sea and Mediterranean—visit Smyrna, Egypt, &c.—and, when the canal from the Nile to the Red Sea is re-opened, proceed on to Calcutta, &c.

To make Corn Soup.—Cut the corn from the cob and boil it in water until it is sufficiently done; then pour in new milk, with salt, pepper, and one or two eggs; continue the boiling, and stir in flour in order to thicken a little. This soup will be superior to the best turtle soup ever made.

LATE FROM ENGLAND.—By the politeness of E. BARLOW, Jun. Esq. of this City, who came on board the ship *Francis Peabody*, which sailed from Liverpool on the 12th ult. we were last evening furnished with London papers to the 5th, and Liverpool to the 12th, inclusive. Although the dates thus received, are a fortnight later than those we were in possession of last week, yet they do not furnish us with any news whatever. Such articles, however, as seemed to possess interest, have been selected for this day's paper, and will be found in our preceding columns.

CITY IMPROVEMENTS.—It is with feelings of no common degree of satisfaction we learn, that the recommendation of the Grand Jury, the Common Council of the City, came to a Resolution on Monday last, to set about the improvement of that part of Princess-street, lying between Germain and Prince William-streets; or, in plain terms, to reduce *Rocky Hill*. This is an undertaking, which former Common Councils were almost afraid to allow to be brought under their consideration; its accomplishment was almost reckoned an impossibility. The success, however, which has attended their attention to other streets of the place this season, seems to inspire them with fresh zeal and confidence; and our inhabitants have no good grounds to hope, that this long neglected subject has now been taken up in earnest. Of one thing we are certain, "the blessing of them who are ready to perish, will fall upon our City Magistrates;" for among the number employed in labouring our Streets, many would, in the absence of such improvements, have been idle and indigent, and the Parish burdens.—We understand the work allied to, will be commenced some time during the ensuing fall.

AGRICULTURE.—We continue to receive from various districts of the Province, the following accounts of the quality and abundance of the different sorts of Grain raised this season. The wheat and Oats, particularly the former, have prospered to a degree, and brought under the sickle in such good condition, as they now have been. The Potatoe crop, also promises a rich return; and the Hay, though not an extraordinary crop, is well considered to be more than an average one.—On the whole, considering the backwardness of the season at its commencement, which almost dashed the hopes of success from the bosom of the Husbandman, the harvest has been such as to inspire him with the warmest sentiments of gratitude for the timely interference of a gracious Providence in his behalf, and feelings of confidence in, and reliance on, the will of the Great Disposer of events, who doth all things well.

Another very important lesson which all of us, who are engaged in the Farmer, ought, from these accounts of application and industry, is, the necessity of leaving the result to one who knows better than we ourselves do, what is good in the morning sowing thy seed, and in the evening withhold not thy hands, for thou knowest not whether shall prosper this or that, or whether both shall be alike good.

It is supposed, that nearly double the quantity of Oats was raised this year, than that sown in the former year.—The erection of Oat-mills is now wanted in all parts of the Province, and we would indulge the hope that our Legislature would take some measures more effectual than those now existing for the accomplishment of this desirable and important end. Two or three Mills of the size of the one at the Cape, would be of great service to the public chest we cannot state that five times the number of those now in existence in the Province.—A Gentleman from Charlotte County informs us, that one has been erected near the Paper-mill on the Cape, on a very extensive scale, by the late Mr. John Wilson, Esq. who has been assisted by the County Agricultural Society and public subscription.—It is hailed by the inhabitants of that part of the County as one of the greatest blessings, which they could enjoy. The lumbering district, which they could enjoy, is, in fact, must prove in the highest degree beneficial.—A great saving in the County will be made in consequence of the abundance

and early housing of the Wheat Crop.—Our informant says that on the 8th instant the *Grist Mill* belonging to JOHN LINTON, Esquire, on the Maguadawick, commenced grinding new wheat; he saw the flour himself and considers it equal in quality, though not quite so well cleaned, as any that could be imported. This is the first production of this year's crop which we have heard of. Experience is the best ground upon which to establish facts; but no one therefore after this season say "the country cannot bread itself"—its absurdity appears.

Further Agricultural report.—Our readers will observe, in another column of to-day's paper, an advertisement of Mr. RATCHFORD'S, offering for sale 40 bags of 2 bushels each of Indian Corn, the produce of York County, a sample of which has been left at this Office for inspection.—The quality of the grain is excellent. But we do not view this subject in an isolated point of view, as being only the speculation of an individual; we would rather draw a general conclusion as to the capabilities of the County, from the fact that the Corn was received by Mr. JAMES BALCH, of Fredericton, at his Store in Woodstock as a remittance for goods, advanced, or given in exchange for the same, to the growers of it.—We are happy to state in addition to the above, that Mr. B. has received during this season, into his store at the above mentioned place, upwards of 1000 bushels of Indian Corn of the same quality.—Examples of this description call loudly to our easy-going complainers against the fertility of the New-Brunswick soil and climate—"Go and do likewise."

We understand, from a Gentleman who arrived from Passamaquoddy yesterday, and who received his information from one of the Pilots in that quarter, that a vessel, said to be the *Brig Charlotte*, supposed to have been wrecked in May last, on her passage from Greenock to this port, had been discovered, sunk, with her masts and sails still standing, all under water, by some fishermen while fishing for Bait off the West end of Grand Manan. A party, with a Diving Bell, we are happy to state, were going to the spot, to ascertain further particulars.

Another Melancholy Accident.—On Tuesday morning last, Mr. ROBERT STEVENS, and Mr. ALEXANDER DOUGLAS, of Indian Town, were in a boat fishing for Bass near the head of the Little Falls; when being near the draught of the Falls one of the oars broke, and the boat became unmanageable,—she was immediately drawn into the vortex, it being then low water the falls were running with their greatest fury: the boat was immediately swamped and upset and they were both precipitated into the water.—Mr. STEVENS succeeded with much difficulty in getting hold of the boat and although she was taken under water several times he managed to keep his hold, and was fortunately rescued from his perilous situation by the assistance of a boat which happened to be near at the time: but melancholy to relate Mr. B. in attempting to gain the shore by swimming, failed in the attempt, and sunk to rise no more.—He was a native of Shelburn, N. S. and came to this place in the spring of 1825: he was in the 24th year of his age, and was universally esteemed by all who knew him.

PROCTOR.—The grain crops in this district are finer than they have been for several years, the straw in some instances is short, which has been occasioned by the want of moisture, but wheat, rye, and oats, are well filled and abundant. The hay crop is light and the potatoes in many places small, the latter may yet be assisted by timely rains. Large fires have been raging in this neighbourhood, some fences and a few sheep have been destroyed, and much of the wood land that had been parched by a continuance of dry weather, has been striped of branch and leaf. On Monday week very serious apprehensions were entertained for the safety of many of the settlements, the fires having appeared in a great many places, and in some with an alarming energy and extent. The air is loaded with smoke, and at night the blazing hills reminded the gazer of the poet's description of a Highland gathering. A heavy shower which fell on Monday night and Tuesday Morning, quenched many of the fires and subdued others, lending a refreshing purity to the air, and a fertilizing moisture to the earth.—(Extract of a letter, Aug. 26.—*Newscotian*)

The following article is from the New-York Mercantile Advertiser of the 7th inst.
Late and important intelligence is received from Columbia and Mexico. The Baltimore papers of Friday evening, inform us of the arrival below that part of the brig *Seraphim*, in sixteen days from Chagres. Captain Bessiere, the master, states, that on the 11th of August, a Government vessel arrived from Guayaquil at Panama, the Capt. of which came down bearing despatches from Bolivar. Nothing official had transpired: but the verbal report of the officers and others on board was that Bolivar had just entered Guayaquil when they sailed.—The Peruvian army having abandoned it some days previous, after destroying or carrying off every thing like ammunition or articles of war, and were then at Pinta.

There had been a revolution in Bolivia. General Camara had sent the President of Bolivia, General Lamar on board a vessel sailing for Chili, with private orders to shoot him on the passage.—General Santa Cruz had been elected President of Bolivia, and had dissolved the Congress. It was the general opinion at Panama that there was much important information suppressed by the officers and others who arrived in the vessel at Panama.

Capt. Bessiere came in to the Capes with the schooner *Spartan*, whose Captain informed him that previous to having left Havana, part of the men of war and transports had returned from Tampico after landing and taking possession of that place—he further stated, that the Mexican troops had immediately joined the Spanish army, and the Spaniards had met no resistance in landing.

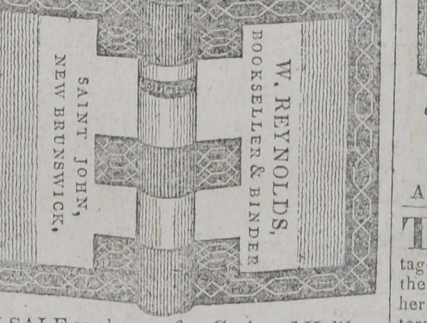
