

VI. And be it further enacted, That the Justices of the Peace, in their General Sessions, respectively, shall be, and they are hereby authorized, if they should think fit, to appoint a committee of two or more Justices, to visit and inspect every parish school, or schools in their respective counties, and if necessary to report the state of the same to the Lieutenant-Governor or Commissioner-in-Chief.

VII. And whereas, in and by the third section of an act, to which this act is an amendment, it is provided, that no larger sum than One Hundred pounds shall be paid out of the Province Treasury, to the Schools in any one town or parish, in any one year. And whereas, that sum has not been paid sufficient to extend the benefits intended by the said act, to all the inhabitants of the most populous parishes in this province: Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council and Assembly, That the said Proviso to the said third section, be, and the same is hereby repealed.

VIII. And be it further enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for the Trustees of Schools, in any one town or parish in this Province, to receive from the Treasury, a sum not exceeding one hundred and Forty pounds, to be applied for the use and benefit of the said Schools, agreeably to the provisions and benefit of which this is an amendment. Provided always, that no county in the Province shall be entitled to receive a larger sum from the Province Treasury, in any one year, than would arise from an average of One Hundred pounds for each and every parish in the said county.

IX. And be it further enacted, That the trustees for schools now appointed in the several counties, shall continue in office until the last day of the next Session of General Assembly, unless the Justices of any county at their General Sessions shall deem it expedient to make any alteration therein.

X. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall continue and be in force during the continuance of the act to which this is an amendment, and no longer.

An ACT providing for the publication of the County Accounts.

Passed 10th February, 1829.

BE it enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council and Assembly, That the Justices of the Peace in the several counties, shall, at some General Sessions, at least once in the year, cause a statement to be prepared of the receipts and expenditures of county monies, and cause the same to be published, in some newspaper in the County; and in those Counties where no Newspaper is published, the said statement shall be deposited in the office of the Clerk of the Peace for the County, to be there open for the inspection of any person who may desire to see it.

Since the publication of our last number we have had several arrivals from the Mother Country—none of them, however, bring so late foreign intelligence, as that which was received by the English Mail, which came to hand last Saturday, after we had gone to press.

Meetings of the CABINET were almost daily taking place—in some cases even twice in one day—from which, and from the frequent meetings of His Majesty's Ministers at the different offices of state, and the regular attendance of each of them to the duties of his particular department, it is obvious, that the two leading questions in Politics, namely, CATHOLIC EMANCIPATION, and the affairs of ROMANIA and TRAIK, have been taken up by Government with a zeal, and anxiety for their settlement, which probably never marked the adjustment of any previous measure.

The motion for the second reading of Mr. PEEL'S Bill in the House of Commons, was carried by a large majority; so that there can be no doubt but that it will be passed by the Lower House, notwithstanding the numerous petitions which were laid on the table against it.—This point may be considered as settled so far.—The principal opposition to the final passing of the Bill, we conceive, be made in the House of Lords, for we believe it is generally understood that His Majesty will give his assent to it.

But if the Bill be passed, still a serious difficulty remains to be overcome with regard to the settling of the claims of the Roman Catholics.—Will they be contented with the measures of it?—From what is to be collected from the public prints, it is to be feared that they will not.—It only provides for a partial removal of disabilities—and however great and important the concessions which are now made by Government to them, at the present time; we cannot help thinking that they will stand out for complete emancipation.

By Mr. PEEL'S Bill there are three offices, and only three which a Roman Catholic cannot hold,—that of Lord Chancellor, that of Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and that of the Keeper of the Privy Seals.—Under these circumstances the concessions must be considered, with reference to the former restrictions laid upon Papists, as being liberal—but whether this liberality on the part of Government will inspire them with fresh confidence in their cause, and induce them, after having gained their point so far, to attempt the accomplishment of their wishes to their full extent, is an important affair which will require some time to set at rest.

For our parts, we have before said, we do not see how complete emancipation to the Roman Catholics can be granted, by a Government constitutionally Protestant, without good security being received from them, that they will not acknowledge, or obey, any one as head of temporal or civil matters except a Protestant King—if it is granted without this security, and the Catholics stand out for it,—one of the following consequences must be the result, viz.—Either the constitution itself must undergo a change.—The union with Ireland dissolved, or, a civil war take place in that country.—It has become a question, therefore, amongst Politicians whether His Majesty's Ministers ought to have brought the matter forward in the way in which they have done, at the present time.—The question is not now a House of Commons proposal or Bill,—it is a question of the Cabinet.—Our readers will have fresh in their recollection that when the late

CANNING took the reins of Government in his hands, he stated, that Catholic emancipation should be, during his administration, be brought forward as a Cabinet measure.—But, change of mind, and change of measures.—It has now originated with the Premier and his coadjutors.

On this subject we have inserted His Royal Highness the Duke of Clarence's Speech in the

House of Lords, which, from its candour, and openness of expression, we cannot help admiring, particularly where he gives his reasons for not having come forward on the subject previously; and the manly and impressive manner in which he refreshes the memory of their Lordships, with regard to the services which the British both as soldiers and sailors have rendered to the Government of which they now form a part.—His Royal Highness, in taking a view of the subject, as involving the interests of the other nations of Europe, endeavours to point out, from the political connexion which subsists between Great-Britain and them, the good effects which might probably flow, from England's granting Catholic emancipation.—Further comment on this subject, though it be one in which we, and the nation to which we belong are most deeply interested, would be useless until some news, later than those we have received, come to hand.

Since writing the above, English dates have come to hand, via Halifax, down to the 21st ult.—Mr. PEEL'S Bill was committed on the 19th and was passed in the Lower House by a majority of 180—the papers contain nothing however that could lead us to form a well grounded opinion as to how the question will be terminated in a House of Lords.—It is reported that, as it arises out of Religious differences, the Bishops will only be allowed to debate, not to vote.—Should this be the case, there is much reason to believe that the Bill will be passed. At all events it was fully expected, the question upon it would be put to vote, previous to Easter day.

BOUNDARY LINE.—Fresh accounts respecting its settlement.—In another column will be found an extract of a letter to the Editor of the Baltimore Patriot, dated at Washington; which, if true, gives a different colour to the whole matter;—the arrangements mentioned therein seem to be of a much more simple nature than those previously advertised to; and of course there will be less delay in bringing this knotty question to a point, than was generally supposed. As all the documents on the subject are to be laid before the Arbitrators on the 1st of January next, and be left unfettered, and with regard to any negotiations—having only to refer to the arguments adduced pro and con; it is more than probable his decision will be given within twelve months from this date. Until then, parties on both sides, will be engaged in speculating on probabilities, and passing events—this may serve to amuse the public in the meantime, but it is not to be believed, that any thing certain regarding the adjustment of the affair will transpire before the King of the Netherlands shall have made his opinion known to the two Powers OFFICIALLY.
