Your success in the execution of the arduous office assigned you, has been unclouded, by any commutation of authority; and has given to your Sovereign's dignity and authority, and has given to the minds of a loyal and devoted people, an effect, which is not always the fruit of even zeal, ability, and disinterestedness, in the conduct of Colonial affairs, affords an ample pledge, that under your renewed connexion with the inhabitants of New-Brunswick, the intimate relations now so happily subsisting will be perfected in the fullest bond of peace and unity of spirit, between the Parent and the offspring States.

The Clergy, however, acknowledge that there are still more exalted grounds of felicitation, when they consider Your Excellency in that part of your delegated trust, which respects the Church Establishment. You, Sir, represent our revered Monarch, not only as the Supreme Civil Magistrate, but as He is invested with the Laws of the Realm, with the special Guardianship and Protection, of that pure, Apostolic Religion, adopted for the benefit of the Great Family of the Kingdom of England and its Dependencies. They have seen you sustaining this high function, by promoting liberally and zealously the erection of structures to be appropriated to Religious uses, by your ready attention to every suggestion, which has been made, for the spiritual and moral renovation of the people, and by a warm interest in those Institutions, where provision is made for the co-instruction of Religious principle, with every branch of sound and useful learning. Influenced by these impressions, they think it but justice to declare, that your endeavors have tended, to the advancement of Gospel Knowledge, the good of God's Church, "the safety, honor, and welfare of our Sovereign and his Dominions, and the settling all things upon the best and surest foundations."

Accept, Sir, the farewell wishes of the Clergy. Whosoever your valuable labours may be required for the service of your Country, their cordial and grateful respect will attend you, and their prayers will always be directed to the Great God, that, until he shall be pleased to summon to a better world, He may multiply upon yourself, and every branch of your Family, His gifts of Christian Grace, and Christian Hope, together with every earthly blessing which a well regulated mind can give or desire.

DEPARTURE OF HIS EXCELLENCY SIR HOWARD DOUGLAS.

To-morrow morning having been fixed as the period of His Excellency's departure from the Seat of Government, for England, the following addresses were presented to His Excellency this day, between one and two o'clock, at Government House, by the respective Committees, accompanied by a number of the respectable inhabitants of Fredericton and its vicinity.

To His Excellency Major-General Sir HOWARD DOUGLAS, Baronet, Lieutenant-Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Province of New-Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

WE, the Magistrates, Clergy, and principal inhabitants of the Town of Fredericton and its vicinity, cannot allow your Excellency to leave the Seat of Government on your departure for England, without expressing the very high sense we entertain of the benefits which the Province at large has derived, under the protecting influence of your Excellency's Administration; and we beg to assure your Excellency, that in so doing, we are actuated by the warmest feelings of gratitude for the energetic exertions your Excellency has used during the period you have presided over us, to promote the prosperity and welfare of the Province in general—and we in particular, residing at the Seat of Government, feel doubly indebted for the kind patronage and assistance which your Excellency has always bestowed on the Town of Fredericton, under the influence of which, it has rapidly risen, in ornamental and substantial improvement, from the embers of the dreadful conflagration which destroyed so large a portion of the Town.

When we look back to the commencement of your Excellency's Administration of this Government, and take a review of the wise and judicious measures which you then adopted, and have since pursued, and the laborious and fatiguing journey which you have taken to the distant parts of the Province in order to obtain, by personal examination, an accurate knowledge of its internal wants and resources—the public institutions which you have been the means of establishing, by the most zealous exertions, and have since patronized and encouraged by your support, for the bringing of those resources into active operation—the encouragement so substantially extended by your Excellency to all Seminars for Learning—the having succeeded in establishing a Provincial University, Royally endowed under His Majesty's most gracious Patronage, upon the most liberal principles through your strenuous exertions and influence—and having witnessed the warm interest your Excellency has uniformly taken in every thing that tended to secure the good Government, and promote the general prosperity of this rising Colony; we cannot but feel that all His Majesty's subjects in this Province are deeply indebted to your Excellency—and the recollection of all these benefits, while it inspires us with the most lively feelings of gratitude, leads us the more deeply to regret the loss that we shall sustain by your removal, although we are aware, that, even in leaving us, your Excellency is to be actively employed in a Mission wherein the interests of this Province are most seriously involved—and it affords us no small consolation in knowing that those interests are intrusted to one so eminently qualified for this important service.

But it is not merely of your public acts that we would speak, as we cannot pass over without acknowledging, with the most pleasing recollections, the kind and condescending intercourse which your Excellency, Lady Douglas, and your amiable family have always held with the Society of this place; and the liberal hospitality displayed by your Excellency on all occasions: and in taking leave of you, Sir, we feel that we are parting with a Governor, endeared to us not only by his public virtues, but by all those qualities which adorn private life.

We have now only to assure your Excellency that you will carry with you our respectful and sincere esteem and warmest good-wishes for your speedy and safe arrival in England, and happy meeting with all your family; and (unless His Majesty should require your valuable services in a higher station,) we shall indulge the hope that the period is not far distant when your Excellency will return to resume the active duties of your Government.

To which His Excellency was pleased to make the following Reply—

To the Magistrates, Clergy, and Principal Inhabitants of the Town of Fredericton and its vicinity.

GENTLEMEN,

I THANK YOU for the sentiments expressed in this Address.

In my endeavors to promote the general welfare and prosperity of New-Brunswick, it has been particularly within the compass of my power to bestow, personally, much of my patronage and assistance on the Seat of Government. These were called forth in a forcible manner, by the dreadful calamity in which this Town suffered so severely; and if my endeavors have, happily, had influence in raising Fredericton, from the embers in which it was then, in great part, laid, I may be permitted to view, with peculiar delight, the substantial and ornamental improvement which has been effected; and I take with me the pleasing expectation, that designs, of which these are parts, may hereafter be accomplished for the improvement of this Town, and for the advantage, comfort and convenience of its inhabitants.

The knowledge which I have acquired by much personal observation, of the wants and resources of the Province, has been highly useful to me in my desire to adapt the measures of my Administration, to the actual condition of the Country, and at the same time to promote the future and lasting prosperity of this rising Colony. In these endeavors I have ever felt that it was most particularly incumbent upon me to encourage, by every means in my power, all places of Education, Seminars of learning and useful knowledge. I trust I may feel assured of having been no less mindful, as well in my public acts as in my personal endeavors, of those Seminars which bestow, gratuitously, the blessings of education on the people, than I have been of those which are to confer the benefits of the higher degrees of learning; and if any of my measures are hereafter to be remembered amongst you, I love to think that they will be most felt, and experienced, in the blessings and benefits which these Institutions insure to all the People of this Land, and to its best and dearest interests.

In the intercourse which my family and myself have held with the Society of this Place, we have experienced much pleasure and satisfaction, and we shall ever retain a lively recollection of the time we have passed amongst you. I thank you for these warm assurances of your respect, esteem, and good wishes. Should it be His Majesty's pleasure that I return to this Country, I shall resume, with undiminished zeal, the active duties of this Government, and find great pleasure in renewing the relations of a cordial, happy and social intercourse with a Society, in whose happiness and prosperity, I shall ever feel deeply and sincerely interested.

Revel of the Timber Trade.—By a letter received in Town announcing the arrival of the ship Mary, it is stated that White Pine Timber was sold at Liverpool at 21d.—From the very long depression which has occurred in the timber trade, we think there are good grounds to hope, that the present improvement in price, arises, not from speculation, but that it is the effects of the actual consumption of the article;—thereby affording us hopes, that its progress will be made on sure grounds.—Should the price of timber keep up in the home market, there is little doubt but a fair proportion of the vessels offered for charter, will be chartered for this place.—We would not wish from this remark, however,

to be understood to wish the whole country to go to lumbering;—not at all;—there is a great difference between a thing's being well-done and over-done.—The effects of the over-doing part as to the timber trade have been felt by almost all classes of the community; we make it only with a view of encouraging those who have gone moderately and securely into the manufacturing of timber. Those who have gone in debt for supplies, must as usual, look out for the consequences.

THE NEW PRESIDENT.—After we had gone to press last week, we received the Eastport Sentinel, containing the Inaugural Speech of GENERAL JACKSON. It is inserted in a previous column of to-day's paper.—There certainly can be no objections to the sentiments expressed by General Jackson, either with regard to domestic or foreign relations;—but, like the generality of Speeches made on similar occasions, it appears to be cautiously framed, so as to allow of the Speaker's taking, consistently, either side of any future question that may arise.—It is deeds not words that stamp a public man's character, and it is to be hoped, that the new President's conduct will, as a man placed at the head of the U. States Government, give practical proofs to the world, that he is not possessed of that violent temper and disposition, which his opponents, during his election, have charged him with.

FESTIVAL OF SAINT PATRICK.

On Tuesday last, the sons of HIBERNIA, together with a number of public and private guests, celebrated the anniversary of the TUTTLE SAINT OF Ireland, by dining together at Mason Hall.—R. E. ARMSTRONG, Esq., President of the Saint Patrick's Society, presided, at the Table; and was ably assisted by DR. HAMILTON, the Vice-President.—The harmony and good feeling which existed among the gentlemen who laid claim to the EMERALD ISLE, as being the land of their own nativity, or that of their ancestors, was conspicuous; and their kind attention, to those who could not be present on the occasion as countrymen, showed that, whatever their own Religious sentiments might be, the creeds of their fellow subjects should be respected; and that, as common inhabitants of a British Colony, they were animated with corresponding feelings of loyalty, and attachment to the British Constitution.

A friend has kindly favoured us with a list of the *Wandering* coats and sentiments drank at the festive board. We understand, however, that a number of very spirited and Patriotic *Volunteers* were given;—the whole accompanied with appropriate instrumental music, and songs.

The utmost conviviality prevailed throughout the night; and the goodness of the dinner, together with the taste and flavor of the wines (the whole furnished by MR. LAWSON,) induced some of the *jeux d'esprit* to make an encroachment on the hours claimed by *Sheelach*.—But as they, at last, separated, well pleased with themselves and with one another, she will no doubt forgive them.

We would beg leave to remark, that national meetings of the above description, are attended with the best results which properly conducted. They tend to promote that unanimity and concord which ought to be cherished by all, whether their Countrymen be that of the Rose, the Thistle, or the Shamrock;—and with reference to the management of the last St. Patrick's Dinner much credit is certainly due to those Gentlemen upon whom the task devolved.

The British ship *Jessie*, built at L'Etang, in this Province, and which arrived at Charleston, S. C. on the 16th inst. is says the *Patriot*, "the largest Merchantman that has ever visited that place."

Patrick Logan, a lad of about 13 years of age, has been committed to Saint Andrews goal, charged with robbing Capt. Baxter, of the Revenue Cutter *Defiance*, of thirty eight pounds, in American half dollars. As the offence was committed in the harbour of St. John, he will be sent there to take his trial.—*St. Andrews Herald.*

North Eastern Boundary.—The Committee on Foreign Affairs have in report to the Senate, decided, that an appropriation to maintain the frontier line, from Liverpool to near Mary Hill, in the state of Maine, through the territory now in dispute, was inexpedient.—*New-York Tribune* March 7.

Growth of Tobacco in Ireland.—The attention of the English government is invited to the subject of the growing Tobacco in Ireland, as a retaliatory measure on our tariff. Ireland they say, grew 700 bbls. last year, and great exertions are making in Carlow, Wicklow, and Wexford, to extend its cultivation.—*New-York Mercantile Ad.*

Stephenson Arrived.—Extract of a letter from Savannah 1st March: Mr. Rowland Stephenson, the banker, and his clerk, Lloyd, arrived yesterday per British brig *Kingston*, Wood, master, who had sailed from Liverpool for this port, but put into Mill River, and ultimately sailed thence. The gentlemen are at the Coffee-House, and sit at the public table.—*New-York American.*

From the St. Christopher's Advertiser, Jan. 27. Major-General Stuart, at Garth, arrived at Barbados in the *Hope* Packet, on his way to his Government of St. Lucia.

The oft-mentioned brig *Carabao*, Capt. Cook, left this port, this morning, for St. Domingo, to receive on board the part of her cargo detained there.

From the same, February 20. Lieutenant-General Sir James Lyon, K. C. B. & K. G. H. Governor of Barbados, arrived at that Island, on the 16th inst. in His Majesty's ship *Herald*, and was sworn into the administration of the Government on the 19th.

The Earl of Belmore, Governor of Jamaica, also came out in the *Herald*.

The mail boat from Saint Thomas brought accounts of a fire and three other men, who had taken the *Carabao* to sea, in which they had been afterwards apprehended at Saint Thomas, having been executed at Saint John on Friday last, and that five others, for other piracies, were to suffer death in the course of this week.

B. 55, 54, at 2 p. m. fell in with the American sch. *King's Creek*, of Chelmsford, took from her Benjamin Williams, master, and two men, one of them almost frozen to death, and who died a few days subsequently. The *King's Creek* was the regular Mail Boat between Chelmsford and Norfolk, (Virginia), and had been blown off from Cape Henry, 17 days previous to having been blown in with—she has 8 of which we were without provisions of any kind, except a little water, and a few biscuits.

Sunday, Brig *Spray*, Hume, Grenada, 19.—J. Kirk, rum, molasses and cordage.—Left St. John, 10th inst. On the 10th inst. 25, 100, 57, fell in with the American sch. *Henry*, of Gardiner, (Maine), from New-York, bound to New-Orleans, with a cargo of molasses, and a crew of 15. The mate and one man washed overboard.—Although there was a very heavy sea running at the time, lowered the stern boat and succeeded in rescuing from the wreck, the mate and remainder of the crew, six in all. The schooner was loaded with building stone and lime.

The sloop *Traveller*, Welch, from Robinson, for Eastport, with cord wood, was driven ashore on Frost's ledge, near Pleasant Point, in the snow storm, on the morning of the 6th inst. The crew and passengers succeeded in getting on shore in the skiff, but Captain WY remained on board, and was drowned, the vessel being dashed to pieces.

An *Arden*, sch. Rambler, McArthur, from Douglas, N.S. At Demerara, brig *Calcutta*, from Panama, (Panama), an American brig from St. Domingo, for Bath, (France), passed Barbadoes, on the 10th ult. and got into Ferro river in Cornwallis, N. S.—had experienced very severe weather in approaching the coast.—Several of the crew dead, and sails much shattered.
