

formation of their minds. How many millions are ruined in their early days for the want of good instruction! Yes! we need to be constantly reminded of the Power of Education,—right or wrong, thorough or superficial, controlled or uncontrolled,—to make or mar the hopes of a world; and, in reference to this subject, it has been amply said,—a man cannot leave his country a better legacy than a well-educated family.

I have been led irresistibly, Mr. Editor, into the preceding reflections, by observing among the Youth of our City, such a small spirit of ambition to excel in literary or scientific pursuits. That such a fact, requires no proof whatever. It is self-evident, and is more particularly observable by men of talents, who may happen to visit us from foreign parts. Whether this neglect of improving the mind, is owing to the engrossing influence of their several and diversified pursuits, or want of talents or ability, it is not for me to determine. True it is, the time of many of our young men is very intensely occupied with business; but then it is equally certain, that there are very few, comparatively, among them, who have not an abundance of time for recreation and amusement,—they have all of them reasonable and proper intervals of leisure; and it is, therefore, to be inferred, that their lack of literary spirit, is more owing to a disinclination to such pursuits, than to any other cause.

In other Towns, Institutions for debating, composition, reading, and scientific purposes, are numerous; and productive of the most beneficial results, while we are completely destitute. Should not this be a subject of sincere regret—and are there any, but would frankly acknowledge, that something ought to be done soon, towards supplying these desiderata?

For my own part, I know of no scheme better calculated to afford amusement, promote improvement, and, at the same time, cherish correct principles, than Institutions established for the purpose of teaching, exhortation, and reading, and scientific purposes. The pleasure to be derived from them, is infinitely better than that which is to be found at places of public amusement; for while we have the proud gratification of perceiving that we are daily increasing our knowledge, and that our minds are gradually extending their compass, and embracing new topics of reflection, brighter prospects will open on every side, and a higher destiny seems to await us. In such a case, we shall not be at a loss how to employ our time, for while we are surrounded by friends, pursuing the same objects, with a laudable emulation, and while we are surrounded by persons, who are gathering strength, we shall not be at a loss for amusement. The economy of such Institutions, is another argument, why they should be adopted; for while they are but of trifling expense to the individuals composing them, they tend to wean the mind from that habit of extravagance, which is incident to a desultory life of fashionable pleasure.

But the improvement resulting from the exercise of the mind, however, is one of the most important of its benefits.—The preparation necessary for speaking, and its consequent practice, leads to a habit of reflection, and a desire for information. The habit of composition, and the preparation made in general knowledge, improves the art of correct conversation, and by banishing restraint and bashfulness, moulds the deportment to a different order and appearance. An attention to composition has also its benefits: if it does not in all cases lead to a development of powers, which otherwise might forever sleep and lay dormant, it compels persons to regulate and methodize their thoughts, and gives them a perspicuity of style, which is of pleasure and of service in almost every pursuit of life.—Frequent readings and recitations, are also of benefit.

In order, if possible, to be more deeply impressed with the importance, let us more fully look back at the success of such men as BURKE, SHERIDAN, ERSKINE, CROFT, CHATELAIN, and CANNING, with many others, who sprang to eminence, in a great measure, from the ambition inculcated in these miniature communities. There they learned the extent of their own powers; and by dint of energy and perseverance, they arrived at that distinction, which is the happiness of great and good men!

I have made these remarks, by way of bespeaking a favourable attention to the subject. Let the youthful reader bear in mind, all his future interests and happiness, in a great measure depend upon the present culture and improvement of himself. Having made these observations, I shall say no more of the present, intending, when time and inclination may permit, to resume the subject,—investigate it with more precision, and treat on it, perhaps, with more ability.

LEGISLATURE OF NEW-BRUNSWICK.

COUNCIL CHAMBER, Fredericton, January 12, 1830.
This being the day appointed for the Meeting of the Legislature, His Honor the President came to the Council Chamber at 2 o'clock, and opened the Session with the following SPEECH:—
Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of His Majesty's Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

His Excellency Sir HOWARD DOUGLAS, as announced to not closing the last Session of the General Assembly, having repaired to Europe on a very important service, of great moment in its result to the interests of this Province, and for the management of which he is, by his accomplished abilities and intimate acquaintance with the merits of the subject, so eminently qualified; His Majesty has been graciously pleased to commit to me the distinguished honor of administering the Government during his absence.

In the exercise of this highly responsible trust, I have on due consideration deemed the present the most convenient time for assembling the Legislature, when you can best be spared from your private affairs, and will have ample opportunity afforded you, to dispatch all the various and important matters that will necessarily engage the wisdom of your deliberations.

Fully impressed with the arduous nature of the numerous and weighty duties, which have devolved on me, I must greatly rely on the aid of your wise and efficient co-operation, to enable me in such manner to discharge them, as to fulfil His Majesty's gracious and paternal solicitude, by promoting to the best of my abilities the happiness and prosperity of this faithful subjects in this loyal Province.

I am happy to have in my power on meeting you, to speak favorably of the late Crops, as having proved by the bountiful blessing of Divine Providence, generally abundant throughout the Country.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Assembly;

I shall order the Treasurer's Accounts, with all the other documents therewith connected, and also the continuation of the Provincial Auditor's Report, to be laid before you; and I rely on your making provision for the ordinary services of the Province.

It is with great satisfaction I have to inform you of the sound and thrifty state of the Provincial Finances, the amount of Revenue for last year being more than sufficient to meet the expected and have therefore been enabled to discharge the greater part of the demands on the Treasury.

The prudent policy adopted last Session, has already been beneficially felt by the public, and if, as far as consistently with the improvement of the Roads and other pressing and indispensable objects, that system should be persevered in; the best effects to the Province cannot but result from it.

Mr. President, and Gentlemen of the Council; Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the Assembly;

I am happy to acquaint you that some time ago I had the peculiar gratification to see opened for instruction, on its new and liberal foundation, that noble Institution King's College. From the eminent and sterling abilities of its accomplished Principal, and the other learned Professors, with the auspicious number of students already under their charge, that important Colonial Institution, I feel confident will, with the Divine blessing, in due time realize the good and salutary purposes of its establishment, to the fullest expectation of its warmest advocates; and reflect great and imperishable honor on the Legislature of New-Brunswick, which I am sure, will vouchsafe to it and our other seminary of education the cordial continuance of their fostering care and patronage. But on all the leading and important interests of the Province, and the best means for protecting and cherishing them, His Excellency Sir HOWARD DOUGLAS, who with so much enlightened and successful zeal and ability, that I need only now express my conviction and confidence that they will continue to engage your most attentive consideration and liberal support.

In prosecution of the wise measure recommended last Session for facilitating the navigation of our coast, I am enabled, with much satisfaction, to inform you that the Grants for that purpose in the Bay of Fundy have been efficaciously applied, as, by the judicious exertions of the intelligent gentlemen to whom the same were intrusted, there has been an excellent Light for some months in full operation at Head Harbour in Campo Bello, and another on a substantial new pier erected at the entrance of the port of Saint John.

The accounts, and reports on these works, so valuable for the protection of lives and property, and also the favorable state of the measure in progress, with the humane and laudable view of establishing a Light on Saint Paul's Island in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, shall be duly laid before you.

On these and various other important subjects I shall have occasion in the course of the Session to communicate with you by Message.

blossom as the rose, and the solitary places be made glad." We shall then no longer be under the humiliating (for it is so in the strictest sense of the word) of crying to our neighbours "come over and help us;" on the contrary we should have within our own Province, the means of subsistence; and possess, in an overflowing abundance, (the thought pushes our pen along), those very necessities of life, we are compelled to seek for at the hands, and to the increase of the wealth, of a foreign grower. We might extend our observations to a greater length, had we not already materially infringed upon that space which should be exclusively allotted to other articles. We intend, however, to revert to this important subject, as often as occasion may require.

THE PRESIDENT'S SPEECH.—Every

Editor is supposed to be capable of writing a critique upon all matters, whether local or foreign, which may happen to pass before his review; more particularly on such articles as have an immediate reference to HOME. Of this class is the Speech before us; and we have much satisfaction in laying it before our readers to-day. It will be found quite short and comprehensive—so much so indeed, when we first perused it, we thought for a moment of that of His Majesty, which is concise, and much to the point. We learn from that document, that the Finances of our Province are both in a healthy and thriving state. And we rejoice to find it stated therein, that His Honor is fully determined upon supporting the views, entertained, and so often expressed, by our respected Governor, SIR HOWARD DOUGLAS, now absent from the Province; and has stated his intention of urging them upon the consideration of the House of Assembly, during the present Session of the Provincial Legislature. For further information, the reader is referred to the Speech itself.

THE ABORIGINES.—In accordance with annual custom and established usage, a number of that race of beings, who were once "lords of the soil," and reigned free and uncontrollable, over the vast tracts of country, which we now inhabit, paid their yearly visit to Government-House, at Fredericton, on New Year's Day. They were thirty-five in number, headed by their Chief; and were received in the most friendly manner by His Honor the President, who, with several of the principal Gentlemen of that place, were in waiting to receive them. They were then taken to the hall, and had partaken freely of cake and wine, handed round on the occasion, they were entertained with the most enlivening music, from the Band of the Rifle Brigade. This being ended, they were addressed, by order of the President, by S. C. PUTNAM, Esq. in a short Speech, adapted to their comprehension, the substance of which was, that the President "saw his Indian Brothers and Sisters, with much pleasure, at the beginning of the New Year, and wishes them all health and happiness. He was glad to hear that the Indians paid attention last year to the settlement of their lands, and hopes they will continue in so good a practice. The President is very sorry that some of their Crops failed; but trusts that the Indians will not, on this account, cease to cultivate their lands, the crops of the white men they should observe, had failed as well as their own. The President hopes, that both the Indians and the White Men, will cultivate their Lands with greater care and diligence, and that both will have good crops in future years.—He has received from the Catholic Bishop of Quebec, a very good account of the Priests, and of the Indians themselves, and recommends them to pay great regard, to the instructions and directions, which the Priests may give them."

This harangue being finished, two Muskets were then presented to the two young men, whom the Chief had selected, as being fit objects to have conferred on them this mark of honorable distinction. They were told, however, that these presents were made, only as a reward for the skill and industry, evinced by them, in the culture of their Land. Sargum Thomas Francis (the chief) after this, made a brief reply to the Speech, already quoted.—In which, he expressed great satisfaction with all that had been said; and embraced that opportunity of enquiring, "whether it was true, as some persons had told the Indians, that their Lands were about to be taken from them." In order to solve this question, and to remove this unfavorable impression from their minds, they were told that this report was unfounded; and if they should want information at any time, it was their duty to apply to the proper and authentic sources. They were then taken leave of by His Honor, and after having the Company with a few of their favourite dances, these "children of nature," (as they have been emphatically styled,) set out for Indian Village;—their city of habitation—apparently, highly delighted with their visit—the attention they had received from their White Brothers and Sisters; and above all, the cordial reception they experienced from "their GREAT UNCLE—the President of New-Brunswick."

At a meeting of Merchants and other gentlemen of Quebec, on the 24th ultimo, it was resolved to create a joint stock company and to raise a fund of £16,000, for the purpose of procuring a steam-boat to be employed in navigating between Halifax and Quebec, and fitted to cross the Atlantic at the opening and close of each season.

CIRCUIT COURT.—On Tuesday last at 12 o'clock the Court of Oyer and Terminer, and General Gaol Delivery, for this City and County, and the Court of Nisi Prius, commenced their sittings in the New Court House. The Hon. Judge BATHURST presides.

In charging the Grand Jury, the Hon. Judge observed, that the frequent sittings of the Superior and Inferior Courts rendered the duty of Grand Jurors familiar to them; and the charges delivered on those occasions had a tendency to cherish in the minds of the people a lively sense of the inestimable blessings we enjoy under our happy and incomparable Constitution.

The Sheriff's Calendar, containing the names of eight or nine persons, chiefly charged with larcenies, and one other very serious offence, he said was heavy, in comparison with the Calendars for some time past. Grand larceny, though a felony of death, is entitled to benefit of Clergy, the punishment therefore in the first instance, is fine and imprisonment, or more commonly, in consequence of incapacity of offenders to pay a fine, it is from six months to two years imprisonment. Under the present mode of prison management the confinement of offenders for the longest term became very burdensome upon the public, the shortest, or an intermediate term, unless under circumstances of peculiar aggravation was therefore most frequently awarded. The mildness of this sentence, the learned Judge thought had a tendency to lessen the horror of punishment, and to weaken the restraint from committing the crime of Larceny. He had pleasure in stating that the subject of a Penitentiary for the Province, which had been for some time an object of desire, was now under the consideration of the legislature, that due enquiries were making, and there was reason to expect, that as soon as a proper plan and system were matured, the work would be undertaken. When a penitentiary of conveniently constructed, and under a proper system of management, shall get into operation; it will have a most favourable effect in the prevention of crime.

The Hon. Judge further observed, that Laws, however just and well adapted, and however faithfully administered, could not of themselves effectually secure the stability and welfare of a nation; Religion and Morality he added, are the foundation of true greatness. They are the pillars upon which it is supported. He adverted with much pleasure, to the number of Day Schools, and of Sunday Schools, established in this City for the instruction of the rising generation, and particularly noticed the efforts of the Rev. Mr. CARROLL, the Roman Catholic Clergyman, in collecting a large number of the children of parents belonging to his communion, for the purpose of giving them instruction.

He considered the difference of religious opinions which prevailed among men, as in itself useful, and as having a tendency to greater good, than if the whole nation were of one opinion; inasmuch as the zeal of the different denominations to promote their separate views might be exercised without violation of the law of charity; and the diligence and exertions of one body would excite the diligence and the exertions of all.

In conclusion the Hon. Judge, paid a tribute to the mechanical skill of the Gentleman by whom this New Court House was erected, he congratulated the community upon having such an edifice for the accommodation of the Courts of justice, and expressed a strong hope that the building might long stand, as a monument of the public spirit of the people of this City and County, of the interests which they take in the administration of Justice, and also—that these walls would never be polluted by a partial and corrupt administration.—City Gazette.

COLONIAL.—The Halifax Free Press of the 5th inst. says—"We observe by the Jamaica Papers, that there is a probability the Naval Yard in that Island will be abandoned, and the stores and artificers be removed to Bermuda. It is difficult to anticipate what are the intentions of Government, with reference to the Naval Command in America; and as respects the establishment at Bermuda, orders we understand have been recently received there, to dismiss the officers and the attendants of the Naval Hospital, erected not long since at that very expensive."

We understand, that yesterday a man was picked up in the Bay in an open boat, by one of the Pilot Boats. He survived but a short time after being taken on board; and as he had been several days out, his death was no doubt occasioned from the extreme severity of the weather lately. Owing to the lateness of the hour at which the intelligence was communicated, we have not been able to furnish any more particulars, relative to this melancholy circumstance.

CORONER'S INQUESTS.—The following is an extract of a letter from a Correspondent at the Nerepis Settlement:—On Thursday the 7th instant, an inquest was held by James Hazen, Esq. Coroner for the County of Sunbury, at the house of Mr. Charles Hamilton, Nerepis, on the body of Patrick Hamilton, a young man about 22 years of age, who was found frozen to death the night previous within a few rods of his house. It appeared on the inquest, he had been on Wednesday to Mr. Zebulon Jones' Mill, Long Reach, with Grain, and on his return is supposed from fatigue and cold to have laid down not being able to proceed further.—Verdict,—died from Fatigue and Cold.

On Friday the 8th instant, a Coroner's Inquest was held at Mispick, in the Parish of Portland, on view of the body of SAMUEL GRAHAM—Verdict,—deceased came to his death, by some cause unknown to the Jurors.—BRIT. COLONIST.

HALIFAX, JANUARY 5.—On Friday last the Steam-boat Sir Charles Ogle, was launched at Dartmouth. This vessel has been built for the Steam Boat Company, and is intended to ply between that village and Halifax. The facility and advantages which will thus be afforded to travellers coming from the eastern parts of the Province are very great, combined as it is, with the late improvement of the roads in that quarter; by which considerable saving is effected in distance and the expense of travelling. The boat is a beautiful specimen of ship-building, is 103 feet long, measures 167 tons, and is propelled by English machinery of the most approved description; she has two spacious cabins, and has every accommodation for waggons and country produce. We view the introduction of this description of vessel, which can cross the harbour at all times with rapidity and with safety, as abounding with the most beneficial effects to the Province generally; and we have no doubt that the number of persons who will find it to their interests to travel by this route, will amply repay the Company for the large outlay of funds which the undertaking has rendered indispensable. She unfortunately stuck on the ways, and was not got off till about 11 o'clock in the evening. The exertions of Capt. BOXER of the Hussar assisted by Capt. TRAVERS and a party from that ship were unremitting, and to this circumstance may be attributed the fortunate termination of the launch.—Free Press.

Halifax, January 8.
On Saturday night last, at 11 o'clock, the Saw Mill and Machinery, belonging to Messrs. John Anderson & Sons, Musquodoboit Harbour, were totally consumed by fire. We understand that it was occasioned by the fire from the furnace of a Nail Factory, connected with the establishment, communicating with some dry wood near it. The loss is estimated at about £700.—Acadian.
