And a diamond, mentioned by Florisha as having formed part of the plunder of Chusero, one of the Mahomedan conquerors of India, who, in 1255,000 sterling; for it is described as "a perfect diamond of 163 carats," or 147 carats, and in consequence of its size, it is supposed to have been equal in value to the "Regent" and the second Portuguese diamond above mentioned, its value would amount to the sum just stated.
