

of them were well enough executed to deceive the unwary, but a very slight inspection would soon convince any person that they were altered. The original words Five Shillings had been scratched out with some sharp instrument, and One Pound inserted in the place. By holding the notes up to the light, the cheat would be instantly discovered; and by comparing the Notes of the respective denominations issued by the Bank, it will be observed that no two notes contain words of the same character, but are totally dissimilar. This is a complete check against altering the amounts, if the parties receiving them are at all on the guard. We cannot learn that any more than fifteen Notes altered, have been in circulation, and it appears that the first issue was on the Saturday previous to the detention and apprehension of the offenders.

**NEW WHEAT.**—Mr. H. Fletchery, of Magadavick, presented to us, on Saturday last, a sample of Wheat, of a full grained and rich quality. We understand that the sample is part of a lot brought by Mr. F. to the Chamcook Mills. This is the first grain, of this year's production, brought to Mill this season, in the county, and it is probably as early as any in the Province.

**MELANCHOLY OCCURRENCE.**—The Rev. J. Snellgrove, of the Wesleyan Missionary Society, appointed officiate in New Brunswick, was on the 10th inst. on his passage from London, in the Barque Hebe, 89 days out, whilst the vessel was lying to in a gale of wind, on the Banks of Newfoundland, by a sudden lurch of the ship thrown overboard, and thus suddenly precipitated from the midst of life into eternity. His body immediately sunk, and was not seen afterwards.

**HALIFAX, September 1.**—His Majesty's Ship Blanche, Commodore Farquhar, arrived here on Monday afternoon, in a wrecked and dismantled state, from Jamaica. On the 5th ult. she experienced a violent gale, which continued for 24 hours. On the 15th in the Gulf of Florida, she encountered a dreadful hurricane—had her mainmast and foremast and bowsprit sprung, her topmasts carried away, her mizenmast injured, lost two boats, and had three seamen washed overboard. On the 23d, she met with equally tempestuous weather—was puffed and had her stern stove in. On the 18th, she fell in with the ship New-York Packet, from Jamaica, bound to London—she had several dismantled vessels.—Passenger in the Blanche, Lieutenant Walpole, Rifle Brigade.—Gazette.

On the 7th August, Jamaica was visited with a hurricane of four hours duration. Great damage was sustained by the shipping and wharves at Kingston, the brig George the Fourth and another brig name unknown, were upset at sea. Part of the crew of the former were picked up by the barque Melancton, which vessel lost her foremast and main yard.—Nova-Scotian.

The East-India Company's Ship Asia, 168 days from Canton, arrived at Halifax on Sunday last, with a cargo of 200 tons of goods.

The brig Aberdeenshire, (arrived at Halifax) on the 24th August, off Cape Sable, fell in with the wreck of a large vessel, supposed to have been a ship of upwards of 300 tons, sunk on the 24th inst. in a great part of the cargo, hulks, &c. supposed to have belonged to the same vessel.  
The ship Pluto, Dimock, from Hampton Roads for London, put into Nantuxet Roads on the 24th ult. to land the officers and crew, and the ship Days, Murray, of and for London, from Jamaica. The Bruce had a cargo of 500 lbs. sugar, 118 puns. rum, and other cargo, valued at about 10,000, and when fallen in with was in a sinking condition, having sprung a leak and received other damage in a gale on the 24th ult.

Schooner Ward, at Charlston, from the Bay of Honduras, spoke at 10 A.M. on the 17th August, Charleston Light being 40 miles distant, barque New Prospect, Miller, of London, 17 days from London (Am.) for London, with a cargo of coffee, sugar, rum, indigo, and arrow root, in a sinking condition, with 12 feet water in her hold, she having experienced a severe gale on the 15th and 16th—lost from her crew, consisting of 20 persons.  
After laying by the barque until 7 P.M. it was thought expedient, in consequence of the squally appearance of the weather, to abandon her entirely.

The following note, copied into the Charleston Patriot of the 17th August, is said, in that paper, to have been picked up that morning at Hobeau, on the North-East side of Charleston harbour, a little above the city. It was enclosed in a bottle.

"The brig Crawford, sailed from Jamaica, 17th June, 1830, bound for Falmouth, (England) and was struck by lightning and burnt at sea on 29th June, 1830. Any one finding this, is requested to report it in any paper."
