We are still without any later European intelligence.

In preceding columns will be found a part of President Jackson's Message to Congress. The whole of this document occupies upwards of seven closely printed columns of the *New-York Evening Post*. We have taken those parts that relate more particularly to the present state of affairs between the United States and other Governments. The Message, on the whole, is a plain State document, distinguished only for its extreme length. It breathes throughout a spirit of moderation on all subjects, either of internal or external policy; and is marked by a desire to cultivate a friendly feeling towards Great-Britain and other Nations, but possesses no feature of commanding interest or importance to the inhabitants of these Colonies, that is not already known.

MELANCHOLY DISASTERS.—We have been informed, that during the violent gale of wind, accompanied with snow, which prevailed on Monday and Tuesday se'night, a schooner, plaster laden, from Falmouth, (N. S.) was driven on shore about 7 miles above Digby Gut. The vessel, we understand, had a crew of three men and a boy: two of the men were washed from the deck soon after the vessel struck—the other, named RATHBURN, and the boy, succeeded in holding on by the pump until low water, when, after much difficulty the former got on shore, in an almost naked condition, and with scarcely life left, having been literally stripped of his clothes by the force of the waves which were continually breaking over the vessel. The boy in attempting to follow him, being exhausted by his previous exertions, was unable to contend with the heavy surf that broke on the beach, and soon shared the fate of his more unfortunate companions.

Another small vessel, loaded with potatoes and turnips, is reported to have been wrecked at the same time, about 17 miles below Digby Gut; and, melancholy to relate, all who were on board are supposed to have perished. The name of the vessel is not known.

Fears are entertained for the safety of other vessels that are thought to have been exposed to the late boisterous weather on the Coast.—The *Beliahk*, which arrived last week from Boston, lost her deck load in the same gale, but succeeded in getting into Eastport; and a small schooner from Truro, (N. S.) which was within a few miles of this harbour on the Monday, was blown off, and did not arrive until the latter part of the week, having lost fifteen barrels of beef and other articles, from her deck.

LARGE HOG.—Mr. CHARLES ADAMS, Master Shipwright, of this City, killed a Hog on Wednesday last, which weighed 525 lbs. It was not eighteen months old, and is considered the largest Hog of that age, ever killed in this Province. It was brought from Ireland in September, 1829—required little food, and had no extra care.—Would it not be a public benefit, if our Agricultural Society, or any patriotic individual, would introduce a similar breed into the Province, for the general improvement of that species of stock.

ANOTHER LARGE HOG.—A Hog belonging to Mr. EWEN CAMERON, of this City, which was killed on Thursday last, is expected to weigh upwards of 600 lbs. It was 23 months old, and, until lately, received no extra feeding or care.

ST. ANDREWS, DEC. 14.—Another Rescue of Smuggled Goods.—We have again to record another disgraceful scene of seizure and rescue. On Wednesday last a seizure was made by Samuel McGowan, Tide-Waiter at Saint Stephen, of two yoke of Oxen, and a sled loaded with 9 bags Indian Corn, 12 bags Indian Meal, 3 bbls. Pork, 1 barrel of Onions, and 4 Chairs.—The goods were deposited in Mr. McGowan's store, and on the following day he took the Oxen to Saint Andrews, and delivered them to the Officers of His Majesty's Customs.

About two o'clock on Friday morning (during Mr. McGowan's absence), his store was forcibly entered by about twenty men, with their faces blacked and otherwise disguised to resemble Indians, armed with muskets, several of which were discharged, in order to put down any interference.—The goods were rescued, and carried over to Calais, in the United States, in triumph. If this kind of conduct is to be tolerated, the sooner we know it the better, that we may prepare to fix our abode in some other land, where the Laws are respected. We doubt not but such representations will be made to the Government of the United States, and will prevent a recurrence of any similar outrage.

HALIFAX, DEC. 10.—Provincial Legislature. During the week, the attention of the House of Assembly has been chiefly occupied with the Revenue Bill, the different items in which having been arranged, the Bill was brought up on Wednesday last, and read a second time yesterday. We understand it will be sent up to the Council for its approval to-day. By this Bill the former duties are placed on wines; the one penny per gallon on molasses and per pound on coffee, has been taken off, as also a reduction of 1s. 6d. per cwt. on sugar has been made, by which the two former articles pay no duty, and the latter only 2s. 6d. per cwt.; the unfortunate four pence is again placed on the article of brandy. As it is impossible to surmise what the issue of the Bill in question may be, we shall at present refrain from further remarks on the subject.—Acadian.

QUEBEC, DEC. 2.—A failure for about £45,000 has occurred here within last week. The losses fall most heavily on persons in trade at Quebec, and on a lumber merchant in Upper Canada. The house (Dyke & Co.) was chiefly engaged in the timber trade to London and in the foreign trade to Spain. These losses, and other circumstances, appear to have given rise to further want of confidence and unfavorable rumors.

Agricultural Report for November.—The climate of this Province rarely permits of an agricultural report for November. The soil is usually locked up by frost from the beginning of the month, and soon after covered with the first stratum of snow, which continues till the end of April, leaving nothing to be done for the immediate improvement of the soil and adding to its productive powers. Preservation, disposing of the produce of the year, and preparation for the return of the productive season, are all that the climate will admit of; and the labour and care is still great and unceasing.—Up to the 22d of this month there was no frost to prevent ploughing; and no land that was judged proper to plough for crop next year, has remained unploughed. The snow which fell on that day, continues to protect the soil against frosts, which will be favorable to the next year's hay crop; but unfavorable to the pulverisation of clay lands.

DECEMBER 6.—The Hercules, the last steam-boat this season, arrived on Friday night with two barges in tow, filled with cattle for the government contractor. She sailed again yesterday at 5 P. M., and will go to her winter quarters, where all the other steam boats have already gone. The navigation continues perfectly open.—It was, however, rather cold last night, and for the first time this season the beaches of the river were to-day whitened about high water mark with thin ice.—*Neilon's Gazette.*

At Annapolis, (N. S.) on the 6th instant, the Rev. JOSEPH LIDGER, L. L. D., Missionary of the Society for Propagating the Gospel, who, during the time he was Missionary at Granville, and the many years in which he was Rector of Annapolis, was distinguished for the uniring zeal and great ability with which he discharged the duties of his sacred office.—Eminent as Dr. Millidge was for unaffected piety, active benevolence, and all the virtues which adorn the character of a faithful Minister of the Church of CHRIST, his loss will be deplored by that Church, and his memory will be long venerated by all who lived within the sphere of his unobtrusive, but most useful and truly Christian life.—Dr. M. was 56 years of age.
At Sussex Vale, on the 5th inst. after a short illness, SARAH, daughter of Mr. George Hayward, in the 16th year of her age.

At St. David, on the 5th inst. Mr. ARCHIBALD STEVENSON, in the 72d year of his age. His death, which was instantaneous, was occasioned by a tree falling on his body, that had been previously lodged on another tree, which latter he cut down. Mr. S. was a native of Wigtownshire, North Britain, and emigrated to this Province in 1824.
