

We are in possession of the Eastport papers of Wednesday last, but they are almost wholly occupied with the President's Message. The *Sentinel* states that there were no late accounts from Europe. Our intelligence, therefore, from that quarter, remains as it did three weeks since—viz, to the 24th of October.

THE WEATHER.—A seasonable fall of snow on Wednesday evening last, with what was previously on the ground, has since made good provision for the City and its vicinity; and our travelling is protected with the softening sound of the snow, at least a fortnight earlier than last year. As yet we have had no intense cold—the thermometer on Thursday morning was as low as 6 above 0.

We understand that the Committee of the New-Brunswick Auxiliary Bible Society, at a late Meeting, divided the City into Sections, for the purpose of more easily ascertaining the Biblical wants of the Poor, and that an Address is in preparation, to be presented to every family which the Visitors may call upon.

The Provincial Parliament of Lower Canada has been summoned, by Proclamation from Lieutenant-General Lord Aylmer, the new Governor-General, to meet at Quebec, for the despatch of business, on the twenty-fourth of January next.

Commercial.—We copy from the Quebec Mercury, the following statement, shewing the number of men and boats employed, with the exports from Gaspe, for the year 1830, from returns to the Custom-house, by the sub-collector at that place:

CENSUS OF MADAWASKA.—By the following extract from the *Portland Advertiser*, it will be seen that General Webber has succeeded in taking a census of the inhabitants on the disputed territory between the State of Maine and this Province. That the General's mission was not so much for gaining statistical information, as to pump the residents regarding their political views, in case of a change of Government, (for, with few exceptions, they have always considered themselves amenable to British authority,) appears evident from the information given by the General himself to the *Portland Advertiser*; who, without the least hesitation, appends the valuable territory to an *American County*; and thus, by a stroke of his pen, has done more towards settling the disputed question, than could be accomplished by the King of the Netherlands for months, although assisted by all the information that could be furnished by the two contending Governments!—We have no doubt but official communications from the authorities in this quarter are now on their way to Washington, detailing the unwarrantable interference of the Marshal of Maine, under whose directions Webber has acted, as well as the recent flagrant violations of all good faith and government, that have been committed by citizens of the United States, within the known limits of this Province, and by them also upon British property on the American side of the lines; when it will be ascertained whether it is necessary for us to have an armed force on our frontier, to guard the lives and property of British subjects from foreign aggression.

As we learn from General Webber, who was appointed by the Marshal of Maine to take the census of the *Madawaska* settlement on the Saint John's river, in this county, within the disputed limits, that he has at length been able to complete the enumeration, without interruption from the Provincial authorities, which was threatened while he was there in the month of September last. The census is as follows: males 1314—females 1174—total 2488. The inhabitants are principally of French origin, and belong to that class who are expelled from Nova-Scotia—then Acadia—by the English, on the conquest of that country. So far as can be known, they are generally in favour of remaining citizens of the United States. The exceptions are chiefly officers receiving pay from the British government. These settlements will not increase much, until the disputed question, to whom they belong, is settled. At present they belonged nowhere, in fact. Yet this state of things had directed public attention to the natural advantages of this large portion of our State, and the extinguishment has invariably led to a better opinion of its situation, soil, &c. than before entertained.—These settlers, on the upper part of the St. John, are but the pioneers of a mighty army of emigrants, who will ere long be sent to spread themselves over the valley of the St. John and Penobscot.

CENSUS OF NEW-YORK.—The population of New-York City, according to the census recently taken, amounts to 218,750.—It appears by Mr. Butler's anniversary discourse before the Albany Institute, that the State population has increased from 240,000 to two millions—improved land from one million acres to eight; there are now in the state, 55 counties—757 towns—5 incorporated cities—93 incorporated villages, many of which are populous and flourishing—several colleges, and numerous institutions for instruction in general literature and in medical science—select, common and free schools, sufficient in number to educate all the children in the republic—penitentiary establishments, in which the great problem, whether the ends of criminal justice can be united with the melioration of the penal code, has at length been solved; and happily for mankind, solved in the affirmative—484 miles of canal navigation, constructed at the public expense, and owned by the state, and 81 miles constructed and owned by an incorporated company—salt springs, whose annual produce amounts to nearly a million and a half of bushels—1400 post offices—70 steam boats, plying wholly or partly in the waters of the state—211 newspapers, 14 of which are published daily—214 incorporated manufacturing companies, and several hundred manufactures owned by individuals or associations not incorporated—44 banks and 53 insurance companies, now in operation—350 turnpike and bridge companies—5 savings banks—numerous literary, scientific and benevolent institutions—and a militia of nearly 200,000.

CORONER'S INQUEST.—On the 3d instant, an Inquest was held at Annapolis Royal, before Peter Bonnett, Esq. on view of the body of Bridget Maghin, late from Sligo, Ireland. After several witnesses had been adduced, sworn and examined, the Coroner requested the Jury, who were attended by a Medical Gentleman, to be very particular in examining the body—which being carefully done, the Jury returned the following Verdict:—That the deceased came to her death in consequence of excessive drinking of ardent spirits.

At a meeting of the Members of "The Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons of New-Brunswick," held on the 14th inst. the following Gentlemen were unanimously admitted Members:—Wm. Liversidge, Esq., C. M. University of Glasgow; and John Paddock, Esq., Member of the Royal College of Surgeons, London, &c. &c.—*Observer.*

FREDERICTON, Dec. 22.—The weather which in the early part of this month was remarkably mild and changeable, has been followed during the past week with several nights of severe frost, forming sufficient ice on the river to afford amusement and recreation in the delightful exercise of skating. A heavy fall of snow on Sunday last, has made the travelling on the land very good, although there is every prospect of the winter setting in, without a single occurrence (in our neighbourhood) of those accidents which we have so frequently to notice at this season of the year.—*Gaz.*

HALIFAX, DECEMBER 15. On Monday last, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, attended by Captain Deeds, A. D. C. proceeded to the Council Chamber, and, being seated, commanded the attendance of the House of Assembly. The Speaker and Members waited upon His Excellency accordingly, when His Excellency was pleased to give his assent to the following Bill, and to sign the same:—

An Act for granting to His Majesty certain duties of Import on wine, brandy, gin, rum, and other distilled spirituous liquors, and brown sugar, for the support of His Majesty's Government, and for promoting the Agriculture, Commerce, and Fisheries of the Province.

The following are the duties imposed by the act: For, and upon, the following Wines, that is to say:—Champagne, Madeira, Port, Lisbon, Claret, and Sherry, 2s. per gallon.

For, and upon, all other Brandy, Gin and Cordials, 1s. and 4d. per gallon.

For, and upon all Shrub, 1s. per gallon.

For, and upon, all Rum and other Distilled Spirituous Liquors, 1s. per gallon.

For, and upon, every hundred weight of Brown Sugar, 2s. 6d.

For, and upon, all Brandy, Gin, Rum, or other Spirituous Liquors, manufactured, extracted, or distilled, in this Province, 7d. per gallon.

Malasses and Coffee are not subject to any Excise Duty.

We have great pleasure in offering our congratulations to the inhabitants of the Province, on this happy adjustment of the Revenue question.—And we are particularly gratified at having it in our power to state that the discussions on this important subject in the House of Representatives were conducted very temperately. Though the additional duty imposed upon Brandy in the last Session has been retained in the Act, the duty on Sugar has been greatly reduced, and the duties on Molasses and Coffee removed—so that the Tax has been more than counterbalanced by the relief which has thus been afforded. The Bill, we believe, met with but little opposition in His Majesty's Council.—It was sent up on Friday afternoon, and returned the following day, agreed to.—*Royal Gazette.*
