

Murray is at the head of the Colonial Department, and the Duke of Wellington, Prime Minister, but the successor of Sir James Kompt, whatever may be his character, abilities and views, will be with the advantages possessed by Sir James, for successfully carrying on the Government of Lower Canada. He had been personally acquainted with the country in the troublesome times of Sir James Henry Craig, and during the late war with the United States. In a few months after the departure of the late Governor he returned to the country, and was deeply engaged in the duties of the Executive Government, which had put him at the head of the country, and he passed over two Sessions of the Legislature with favorable results; and although the causes of the late difficulties, which his predecessor had made so apparent, still remained, the country had been led to the conclusion that they would be speedily removed.

DEATH OF BISHOP HOBART.—Intelligence was received last evening of the demise of this distinguished and much respected Prelate. He died at Auburn, on Sunday morning, after a severe illness, brought on during his visitation of the churches in the Western counties. The anxiety manifested during his illness was great, and his death will occasion much grief, not only to the church, and his very numerous personal friends, but to the community generally. *N. York Adv.* Sept. 15.

The *Schr. "Palm de Civil,"* under the Mexican flag, arrived at Callao, in the early part of May, from the coast of Mexico, with 29,000 dollars on board, for British account, which amount was regularly manifested. At sea, the vessel and cargo were seized for defect in register, (as alleged by the Peruvian authorities,) the money landed, and placed in deposit. During the adjudication, it was removed by the Peruvian Government to Lima, on which the owners demanded to have it placed again in C. until a legal decision was made relative to it. This was refused, and the application was then made to H. B. M. Pro Consuls, for their assistance in reclaiming. No satisfaction was obtained; and after several insulting letters had passed, the British corvette *Sapphire*, Capt. Dundas, sailed from Callao, and off the port met the Peruvian ship of war *Libertad*, which Capt. D. ordered under his stern, and, after a little detention, took out 15,000 dollars, Government funds. So soon as this was known in Lima an order was published not to admit any British vessels of war into the ports of Peru, immediately after which the consuls embarked, with their families, on board the *Sapphire*, and sailed for Valparaiso. *D. Adv.*

EXECUTION OF KNAFF.—The Governor and Council, we learn, have appointed Tuesday, 25th inst., for the execution of John Francis Knapp, convicted of the murder of Capt. White. *Boston Palladium.*

POSTSCRIPT.

[From the *Halifax Royal Gazette*, Sept. 22.] We have been very obligingly favored with Glasgow Papers to the 20th ult. received by the *Jeau Harvie*; the following is the most interesting intelligence contained in them:

PARIS, AUGUST 6. The Dukes of Chartres and Nemours have been nominated to the dignity of Grand Cross of the Legion of Honour.

Orders have been transmitted to the Army in Africa to assume the national colours.

The Duke of Orleans has just granted a pension of 1500 francs from his Privy Purse, to M. R. Delisle, author of the *Marsellais Hymn*.

The news of the death of the King of Naples, is not confirmed.

It is affirmed that the English Government has given orders in all its Ports not to receive the Princes of the families of the Bourbons if they should present themselves.

M. de Peyronnet has been arrested at Tours by the national Guard.

Prince Talleyrand was this morning amongst the number of persons received by the Duke of Orleans.

CHAMBER OF DEPUTIES—ROYAL SITTING.

Accession to the Throne of His Majesty Philip I.—This day, at half-past 2 o'clock, the Duke of Orleans proceeded in state to the Hall. The declaration agreed upon in the sitting of Saturday last in the Chamber of Deputies was read by the President—his Royal Highness then ascended the Throne, received the declaration, asked for the Act of adherence given by the Peers of France, to the Declaration of the Chamber of Deputies, which was handed to him—and then said:

"Gentlemen, Peers and Deputies—I have read with great attention the Declaration of the Chamber of Deputies, and the adherence of the Chamber of Peers. I have weighed and meditated all the expressions of them. I accept without restriction or reserve all the clauses and engagements which this declaration contains, and the title of King of the French, which it confers upon me. I am ready to swear to the observance of them." Then raising his hand to Heaven, His Majesty pronounced the following oath:—"In the presence of God I swear faithfully to observe the Constitutional Charter, with the changes and modifications expressed in the Declaration of the Chamber of Deputies; to govern only by the laws, and according to the laws; to cause good and strict justice to be done to every body, according to his right—and to act in all things solely with a view to promote the happiness and glory of the French people." After which the King signed the Declaration—the Act of Adherence—and the Oath—took his Seat on the Throne, again expressed his acknowledgments in a Speech to the Peers, and Deputies, and soon after retired from the Hall, amidst repeated acclamations. After the ceremony, the King repaired to the Palais Royal, and gave a grand dinner to the Peers and many of the Deputies. In the evening Paris was illuminated.

His Majesty, it is stated, has asked of the King of England, the relics of the Prisoner at St. Helena.

Henceforth the sittings of the Chamber of Peers will be public.

Charles, it is said, is to embark at Cherbourg for Holy Road House, his former residence in Scotland.

The Dev of Algiers has proceeded to Naples. The Duke of Bordeaux is styled by those who are in favour of the Republic.

A letter from Paris says:—"We shall have a Republican Government with a monarchial name. The troops at Algiers have declared in favor of liberty and the Charter."

The sum of Thirty-two Millions has already been received from Algiers, which will be deposited in the Royal Treasury.

The National Guard of Paris has named a Deputation to go to London, to thank the inhabitants of that great City and the English Nation, for the sympathy which they have testified for France in the recent struggle.

Algiers will remain in possession of the French.

The King of Spain, it is said, will be obliged to convoke the Cortes. A report is in circulation that a union of Spain and Portugal is fixed upon, and that Lisbon is to be the capital of the Peninsula.

Paris, August 12.

The choice of Ministers made by the King appears to have given great satisfaction. Charles X. will reach Cherbourg on Monday.

Two French soldiers were poisoned at a Coffee-House in Algiers on the 28th ult. and 19 others massacred by the populace in a revolt near the gate of Bab Azoun. On the following day forty of the rebels were executed—but this example of severity had not the effect of intimidating the populace, and it was further necessary to point the guns of the Mole against the city and threaten its destruction. The Bedouins were disposed to be very troublesome.

The King of Prussia has given orders against the admission into Prussia of any French Refugees who may choose to quit France, owing to their attachment to Charles X.

August 14.—A Brussels paper of the 12th says:—"We have just learnt that 60,000 Austrians are on their march for Italy—so that the forces which that Power has in that country amount to 110,000 effective men."

LONDON, AUGUST 10.

Prince Paul of Wurtemberg it is said, has accepted the Sovereignty of Greece.

Forty-two men and boys have been deprived of life by an explosion in the Jarro Colliery, near South Shields.

The Duke of Sussex has been seriously indisposed. On Friday great apprehensions were entertained respecting him—since then we are happy to state his health has been improving.

Prince Polignac has arrived in England. *Aug. 17.*

Mr. O'Connell is returned for the county of Waterford.

It is understood an immediate recognition of the Mexican Government by France will take place.

His Majesty is enjoying excellent health. His beloved Consort on Friday completed her 38th year—her birth day is in future to be kept in January.

The Duke of Cumberland has resigned the command of the Blues.

A Dispatch announcing that Charles X. had arrived off Spithead, has been received at the Admiralty by Telegraph from Portsmouth. *Sun.*

It is reported this morning about the Government offices, that Austria has determined not to acknowledge the new King of France, and that a large army under the command of one of the Archdukes, is ordered to march upon Italy. *Sun.*

Orders have been received at this Port not to pay any honors to the Ex-King, should he land there.

HALIFAX, Sept. 22.—The Elections.—On Friday at one o'clock, Mr. Murdoch withdrew from the hustings—when Messrs. Fairbanks and Debois were declared duly elected as Representatives of the Township of Halifax. The following was the state of the Poll:—Mr. Fairbanks, 415; Mr. Debois, 409; Mr. Murdoch, 325.
