ENTER BRILLIANT DE CORTEZ DANS LA VILLE DE MEXICO.

After making the conquest of the Province of Mexico, Cortez took the road towards the City of Mexico, the capital of the Empire, which was situated in the middle of a large Lake.

His army was composed of four hundred and fifty Spaniards, besides officers, and six thousand Indians.

Having arrived within view of the City, he beheld the buildings rising in magnificence before him.

A body consisting of four thousand men, who appeared to be composed of the nobles and officers of the capital came out to meet him.

Mexico was defended on this side by a rampart of stone, which extended through the large streets, and terminated at a draw bridge.

The Spaniards now saw a vast avenue; the houses on each side were of the same structure with terraces and balconies.

These were covered by an infinite multitude of people, who had left the streets by order of the Emperor, who wished to receive Cortez in person at the head of his troops.

The Emperor, who was seated on a throne, was surrounded by a number of officers of the Imperial Palace, all in uniform dresses, wrought with rich colours and figures.

They marched two by two, their feet bare, and their eyes cast down. In the centre was Montezuma borne upon the shoulders of his favourites in a litter of burnished gold.

Four of the principal lords of the Empire bore above his head a canopy of green feathers, issued with so much art that they formed one curtain, mingled with several figures in silver.

ERUPTION OF MOUNT ETNA.—The Journal of Commerce gives the following translation from a Bordeaux paper, describing a terrible eruption of Mount Etna, which occurred in the month of May.

The terrible explosion which opened seven craters of the volcano at once, has destroyed eight villages in the neighborhood of the mountain, to which neither the lava nor the fire ever extended before.

All the buildings have disappeared under the heaps of calcined stones and burning cinders, which were thrown from these new openings of Etna.

Notwithstanding the frightful detonations which announced beforehand the approach of the catastrophe, the inhabitants of these villages remained quietly in their dwellings, considering themselves safe on account of the distance, which had preserved them in all preceding eruptions, however violent.

In the destruction of these villages and the neighboring hamlets, perished a great many victims, both men and animals.

On the 21st of May the consumed edifices were still smoking, and these unhappy places were inaccessible on account of the heat which was given out from the cinders, stones and lava, with which they are covered.

It was not until the eighth day after the disaster, that it was possible to approach for the purpose of affording any succour.

Never was a calamity more terrible, more unexpected, or more general. The shores of Calabria, and some parts of Italy, lying in the current of the wind which blew on that disastrous night, were covered with the same kind of ashes under which the places in the vicinity of Etna were buried.

Scilly will long remember this disaster, which has devastated the richest and most fertile country of the world.
