

(the particulars of which were published in our paper at the time.) A verdict of guilty was returned. At the close of the trial, George Crownshield was placed at the bar, charged also with being an accomplice in the murder. Several witnesses on behalf of the prosecution were examined, but the prisoner's counsel thought the testimony of so feeble a kind as not to require them to go into a defence, and they therefore submitted the case to the Court. A verdict of acquittal was brought in by the jury.

ACCIDENT.—Captain PARKINS, of the brig *Hyperion*, was unfortunately drowned at Miramichi on the 1st instant, by the upsetting of a boat in which were five other persons, who clung to it, until assistance reached them; but Capt. P. in attempting to swim to land, supported by an oar, sunk at the moment when help was on the point of being rendered.

IMPROVEMENT OF STOCK.—We are informed, that George Hazen, Esquire, of Sussex Vale, has now on his farm, a Bull Calf, of six months old, which weighs 600 lbs., and another of five months and seventeen days, which weighs 465 lbs. This stock is of the short horned Durham breed, imported a few years back by the Agricultural Society of this Province.

ST. ANDREWS, Nov. 23.—Seizure and rescue.—Capt. Hook of the 34th regiment, a detachment of which is now stationed at this post, purchased a Boat at a Custom-house sale in this town, on the 19th October last, which had been previously seized for a breach of the Revenue law. After going to a considerable expense in fitting her up as a pleasure boat, he with some of his friends, proceeded to Eastport, on Wednesday last, and landing, the boat was forcibly taken from the person left in charge of her, by Thos. Bibber, the former owner, who, with the assistance of a yoke of oxen, and the populace, dragged her to the top of the hill, accompanying their march with every demonstration of joy. On Capt. H. applying to the sub-collector, he was informed that [the sub-collector, in his capacity of Attorney] had advised Bibber to act as he had done; and on making application to a Magistrate, he was informed, that Bibber was perfectly justifiable in the course he had taken, and that he could not interfere. We believe it is the intention of Capt. Hook to forward a statement of the circumstances to his Majesty's Ambassador at Washington, who will, no doubt, afford him full redress. This is the first time we have ever had to complain of any want of courtesy in our Western neighbors, and we trust it will not have the effect of preventing that mutual reciprocity of favors which has been found to operate so beneficially for the interests of the Inhabitants of both Eastport and Saint Andrews.—Communicated for the Herald.

Owing to the want of freshets sufficient to float the Timber down the various Rivers in this County, both last spring and this fall, several vessels have had to leave this Port, and proceed to Saint John for cargoes.—*Ibid.*

QUEBEC, NOVEMBER 11.—Since the 30th ult. the wind has blown without intermission from the eastward, and frequently been very strong. About 25 to 30 vessels are supposed to be detained in the river on this side of Green Island Light-house, and about 60 are ready for sea in the port. This wind has been very favorable to the inward bound vessels, a number of which are however still due, but many of them will have gone into the lower ports, being, with the exception of one or two West India traders, all ballast ships.

The severity of the wind has driven up several rare birds, and among others a young bird of Pelicanus Bassanus or Solan Goose kind, which has been shot in the St. Charles, and placed in Mr. Chasseur's museum.

About 20,000 bushels of the new wheat crop has been purchased in the lower part of this District, at 6s. 3d. and is now shipping. The present price of Flour is about 42s. 6d. The advices from England of the 10th Oct. do not warrant the expectation of such high prices for bread stuffs, as the 1st October packet did.

A raft of Oak staves, valued at £1000, was broken up below the Island of Orleans during Friday night last, and will be, we are sorry to say, entirely lost. Seven men belonging to it, were picked up from detached pieces of the timber by the *John Molsom* steamer on her way up with the *Hope* which had been ashore at St. Thomas.

The General Elections which have recently taken place in Nova-Scotia and Upper-Canada afford instructive lessons in Colonial politics. Nova-Scotia was the quietest of all the North American Colonies, and the easiest governed. The Assembly had not only the control of all the money levied within the Province, but it passed the Revenue Bills only for one year. In an evil hour the Council took it into its head to alter an item of the duties by diminishing it, and the year's revenue was lost. A General Election has followed, and of the three or four supporters of the Council in the House, only one is returned, while nearly all the new members are pledged to support the pretensions of the Assembly. In Upper Canada there was a House of Assembly in which the Administration had only a few Members, and the majority insisted on turning out all the placemen of the former administration; at the same time putting forth many new and extraordinary pretensions and projects, spitting into parties and mutually abusing each other; at the late election only thirteen of the former House have been returned out of fifty of which it is composed, and the majority is said to consist of members connected with the persons in office and Sir Peregrine Maitland's administration.—*Neilon's Gazette.*

RAIL ROADS IN CANADA.—The Canada papers are beginning to discuss the subject of establishing rail roads in the British provinces, as the most efficient, and, in the end, the most economical mode of transit that has yet been invented. A rail road from Montreal to Stanstead, a distance of about 80 miles, is recommended by the Canadian Contant. The Quebec Star proposes a rail road from Laprairie to St. John.
