

which, under the most favourable circumstances, invariably attend such proceedings. This Petition was very numerous and respectfully signed by the principal members of this community as well as by the Chamber of Commerce as others.

Your Committee are happy to observe, that a Committee consisting of three members of the House of Assembly has been appointed to investigate the matter during the recess, and they have full confidence that these Gentlemen will bestow their attention upon the subject which its importance demands; and will come forward next session, prepared to suggest and support a plan of reform in every way adapted to the circumstances of the Country, and in unison with the more liberal sentiments on the subject of Law, as so strongly urged by the present Lord Chancellor of England.

At the time the Steam Boat "Saint John" ceased last season to ply in the Bay of Fundy, the Mails between this place and the United States, were forwarded only once a week, the inconvenience of which arrangement was likely to be severely felt, by the Commercial body; Your Committee immediately by letter applied to John Howe, Esq. Post Master General, Halifax, requesting that he would cause a mail to be forwarded twice a week, and they have now much pleasure in acknowledging the polite and prompt attention, which in this as in every other case he bestowed upon their application, by giving the necessary directions to the Post Master here which was immediately complied with, and the Mails have since been received and forwarded much more regularly than has formerly been the case at the same season of the year.

Another subject which arrested the attention of your Committee was the Revenue Law, many parts of which were found rather oppressive to trade, and, in their opinion, different in their effects from the original intention of the Legislature in framing the Bill. Your Committee therefore prepared a memorial to the Legislature, pointing out the alterations which they deemed to be most necessary, and are happy to observe, that the same had met with due attention, and the prayer of the Petition has been complied with. Among the most important and beneficial of these alterations are, the allowing the whole amount of drawback upon the exportation of Articles entitled thereto, in future to be considered as cash payments, and endorsed on the Treasury Bond as such; Importers of West India Produce, Brandy, Gin, Wine, Shrub, &c. being allowed to warehouse the same for exportation, in the same manner as the Treasury Bond, on the same terms as Flour, &c. is Bonded in the King's Warehouse, and the Admission, free of duty, of Hides, Cotton Wool, Tallow, Plants and Seeds of every description, Indigo, Fruits whether Preserved, Dry or Green, Dye Woods, Salt, Leaf Tobacco, Beeswax, Felt, Lignumvitae, Bristles, Horse hair, Horns, Cordage, Canvas, Hemp, Iron and India Rubber; also repealing the discriminating duty formerly charged on Rum and Sugar owned by non-residents, which alterations your Committee are of opinion will be very beneficial to trade generally.

Your Committee being of opinion that a more speedy and less expensive mode than the present, of settling disputes between the masters or owners of merchant vessels and their seamen, regarding their wages, is very desirable, and at the same time quite practicable; were induced to request one of our Representatives to lay before the House of Assembly, a Bill for that purpose, which he accordingly did, and the same passed the House, but was rejected by His Majesty's Council. Your Committee regret this circumstance the more, as the Bill proposed was, in their opinion, well calculated to relieve the parties from the difficulties of the present system, and being very similar to one now in operation in England, of 50 Geo. III. cap. 25, entitled, "An Act for facilitating the recovery of the wages of seamen in the merchant service;" the beneficial effects of which are felt and acknowledged by all those interested or engaged in navigation.

Your Committee with gratitude acknowledge the attention of Henry Bliss and John Bainbridge, Esqrs. Provincial Agents in London, to all presentations from this Board, which have been forwarded to His Majesty's Government, and the readiness with which they have at all times communicated information respecting the progress of any measure likely to affect the trade of the North American Colonies; and particularly mentioning the petition requesting the removal of the tonnage duty on Am. vessels and the remonstrance against the re-admission of Am. vessels into the B. West Indies, forwarded to these Gentlemen by your Committee. And although contrary to the hopes and wishes of this Chamber, as well as the other Commercial Societies in the Provinces, the American Minister has succeeded in obtaining the re-admission of their vessels into the British West Indies, yet, your Committee sincerely hope, and are much inclined to believe, that the disastrous consequences to the trade of these Provinces, so much feared as the result of this measure, will scarcely in any degree be realized for the admission of Br. Colonies into the Ports of the United States, with Colonial Produce, will, in a great measure, afford a market for our surplus West India Produce, and the productions of our fisheries. By these means, the carrying trade of the Provinces will be increased, and, as has already been the case, American merchants will frequently employ Colonial vessels to carry their own produce to the British West India possessions, and even to Great Britain; and either British or British Colonial vessels may, after carrying a Cargo to a port in the United States, take in a return Cargo of the produce of that country, and, by touching at a port in these Provinces, for the purpose of clearing out, may then proceed to Great Britain, and there be admitted with their Cargoes, on the same terms as if such cargoes were actually the produce of the Colonies.

Your Committee are of opinion that many and great advantages arise from the regulation of this Chamber, which constitutes the Members of the Assembly for the City and County of St. John, ex-officio members of this Committee; as, at their meetings, the Representatives of the people have an opportunity of hearing the operations of the laws and enactments of the Legislature discussed, and their different bearings and effects pointed out by practical men; and your Committee hesitate not to affirm, that the measure of the very important subjects which have come under the notice of the Legislature during the past session, had their origin at these meetings, and that there some of the Members were made acquainted with the views of the mercantile body, on the Provincial laws regulating trade and commerce.

Your Committee humbly trust, that the benefits resulting from a well organized and active Chamber of Commerce, are too apparent to require any argument in support of the premises, and they would earnestly call upon all persons, anxious for the good and prosperity of their Country, to come forward and lend their aid in support of the institution.

The proceedings of the Committee will be found more at large in the Books of the institution, which can at all times be seen, by any Member of the Chamber, on application to the Secretary.

At the Annual General Meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, which was held on Wednesday last, the following Resolution was proposed and unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That a letter of thanks be forwarded to Sir HOWARD DOUGLAS, from this Chamber, expressive of the high sense they entertain of the exertions made by him to prevent the alteration contemplated by His Majesty's Ministers in the Duties on Timber, from being tried into effect, and that the same be communicated to him by the Chairman.

We have peculiar pleasure in noticing the foregoing, as we conceive the expression of the feelings of the commercial community to be in perfect unison with those of the Province generally, and justly merited by the distinguished individual who has been the means of calling them forth at the present time.

At a Meeting of MERCHANTS and others, held at the Exchange Coffee-House on Wednesday, the 27th of April, 1831:

IT WAS UNANIMOUSLY RESOLVED, That a Committee be appointed to receive Subscriptions for the purpose of presenting SIR HOWARD DOUGLAS with a Piece of Plate, as a testimony of the sentiments entertained by the Inhabitants of this Province, of his able exertions in opposing the late measure introduced into Parliament, for the purpose of altering the duties now imposed upon European and Colonial Timber and Deals—and that the Committee solicit the Co-operation of the Inhabitants of the principal places throughout the province in carrying the same into effect.

The following Gentlemen were then appointed a Committee with power to act to their number: C. SIMONDS, JAMES KIRK, E. W. RATCHFORD, G. D. ROBINSON, J. T. HANFORD, L. WOODWARD, Junr., T. LEBDEL, and JOHN ROBERTSON. ANGUS M'KENZIE.

A MEETING of the COMMITTEE will take place on TUESDAY the 3d of May, at the Coffee-House at 12 o'clock—when a punctual attendance is requested.

The following letter addressed to His Honor the President, from an official source in England, under date of the 7th March, is published "by authority" in the Royal Gazette of Wednesday last. It was written, no doubt, for the purpose of apprising the Inhabitants of this Province of the sentiments of His Majesty's Government in proposing an additional duty on the staple produce of these Colonies; we are apprehensive, however, that it will be viewed by many here as an apology for bringing forward a measure which, but for the decision come to by the House of Commons, would, most certainly, have sacrificed our just interests to the advantage of Foreign States.

"I am sorry that it is not in my power to forward to you by the present occasion, the new scale of Duties proposed for Timber and Deals; but they are not finally arranged and have not been laid before the House of Commons. I shall postpone, therefore, for the present, any official communication upon the subject. In the mean time I can assure you, and beg you will assure those whom it may concern, that the object of the proposed modification is purely financial, and that nothing can be further from the truth than the notion that, in proposing any change at the present time, His Majesty's Government are actuated by any feeling of indifference towards our North American Provinces, or any readiness to sacrifice their just interests to the advantage of foreign States. We are too well convinced of the importance of those Colonies to the general strength and power of England, not to feel that such a policy would be in the highest degree mischievous; and we deem the progressive development of their great resources one of the most interesting objects to which our attention can be directed; but we are obliged, at the same time, to look to the general interests of the Empire at large, and if it should not be found possible at all times to make the local interests of particular portions predominate in the scale, we cannot but trust that our motives will not be misunderstood, or our intentions misrepresented, by those whom we are most desirous to conciliate, and who have (it cannot be doubted) a just claim upon our vigilant care.

"I have the honor, &c. &c."

The rejoicings at Fredericton and Saint Andrews, on the defeat of the proposed measure for raising a duty on Timber from these Colonies, have far exceeded those of the Inhabitants of this City. At the former place, on Wednesday last, we learn that, among other manifestations of joy, an Ox was roasted, and partaken of by the Inhabitants generally. An effigy of a celebrated supporter of Baltic produce, was also, we hear, carried through the streets, and afterwards burnt.—We subjoin an abstract of the doings at St. Andrews on the occasion, from an account published in the Herald of Tuesday last:—

"Saturday, being St. George's Day, it was determined upon to be merry, even at the expense of a portion of wisdom. 'Tis folly always to be wise." At 7 p.m. the Militia Artillery Company fired a salute of 17 guns, and this was the signal for a general illumination. To add to the amusements of the evening, a Boat, said to be Baltic built, was filled with a cargo of combustibles, and was towed into the harbour, where she was moored. The Effigy of a distinguished supporter of the Baltic interests was suspended from the mast, with a paper in his hand, bearing the inscription, "Baltic Timber Bill." Several pounds of gunpowder were concealed under his pinnacles, and there was also a large quantity in the boat. The combustibles were set fire to, and in due season poor — was blown to atoms, — the repeated explosions of the powder, while the boat was burning had a very pretty effect. The evening being fine, most of the population were in the streets. We have not space to describe the illumination further than that several of the windows were very tastefully decorated with colored waters, in cut glasses, and lighted up with tapers, which made a most brilliant appearance, whilst other houses were lighted up with candles fantastically arranged in the windows. The whole passed off without the slightest accident and the most perfect good humour prevailed. A large perambulating party of notables visited their neighbours in succession, and laid their hospitality under contribution for wine, when the "glorious 46," "success to the Poles," and "Reformation to the Reformers," were drunk in flowing bumper with hearty cheers. In such a cause we would call him a driveller, who would not pity for once, the man who got up the following morning with an aching head and more than usual thirst!"

"The majority in the House of Commons on the Timber question."

The intelligence of the defeat of Ministers on the Timber Duty Bill, was received at Quebec on the 16th instant, by the brig Nemesis, 21 days from Poole, which, we believe, is more than usually early for arrivals at that port. The paper announcing the receipt of the news, does not state that any public demonstrations of joy had taken place on the occasion, but we are inclined to think that the Canadians will not allow the opportunity to pass without some token of gratification.

We understand that His Excellency Sir ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL, our new Governor, will leave England for this place some time in July. It is reported in Fredericton that Sir HOWARD DOUGLAS has received an appointment in the Ordnance.—City Gazette.

KINGSTON, (K. C.) April 20.—Coroner's Inquest.—Yesterday, an Inquest was held to view a dead body, found in a pond, near the house of a certain gentleman there was discovered on the bottom of his shirt, a "William Maxwell, 1 Rifle, (34) Brigade." Verdict—"Found dead, supposed to have been drowned."

N. B.—A Deserter from that Brigade being advertised some two or three months ago, the above is supposed to be the person.—Observer.

DISSOLUTION OF THE AMERICAN CABINET. Mr. Van Buren, Secretary of State, General Eaton, Secretary at War, Mr. Branch, Secretary of the Navy, and Mr. Ingham, Secretary of the Treasury, have all resigned, and their resignations have been accepted by the President. It is rumoured that Mr. Edward Livingston will succeed Mr. Van Buren; Mr. Louis McLane Mr. Ingham, Col. Drayton Gen. Eaton, and Mr. Forsythe Mr. Branch. Mr. Van Buren's letter to the President, accompanying the resignation, has been published, and in it we observe the following passage:—

"Whatever may have been the course of things under the peculiar circumstances of the earlier stage of the Republic, my experience has fully satisfied me that, at this day, when the field of selection has become so extended, the circumstance referred to, by augmenting the motives and sources of opposition to the measures of the Executive, must unavoidably prove the cause of injury to the public service, for a counterpoise to which we may in vain look to the peculiar qualifications of any individual; and even if I should in this be mistaken, still I cannot so far deceive myself as to believe for a moment that I am included in the exceptions."

From the President's letter, in reply to Mr. Van Buren, the best understanding appears to prevail between these two high functionaries.

EXECUTION.—The New-York Commercial of Friday says—Gibbs and Wansley, the murderers of the Vineyard, paid the penalty of their great offences this morning, upon Ellis's Island. The steam-boat provided by the Marshal left the city at half-past nine, the prisoners being escorted by the officers of the Court and a company of marines, and attended by several clergymen: Few others we believe, went to witness the spectacle.
