

ons in behalf of these valuable portions of the British Empire, have not been confined to the preservation of the Timber Trade alone, but with the late as well as the present Ministry, his talents and influence were zealously exerted to secure to these Provinces that just protection in trade with the West Indies, without which, it must fall almost entirely into the hands of foreigners.

The very gratifying intelligence of the defeat of the measure introduced by Ministers into Parliament to impose an additional duty upon Timber shipped from the North American Colonies, was received here on Tuesday last with a general feeling of satisfaction. In the evening of the day following, a large quantity of combustible materials having been collected in King's Square, a "bonfire" was made to show the joy that pervaded all classes of the citizens. Other demonstrations were not wanting to prove the feelings of the people on the occasion; and we feel convinced we are uttering the sentiments of the whole Province when we say, that for the last ten years at least, no announcement has been made here that gave greater satisfaction than that communicating the defeat of the obnoxious measure alluded to. And, with the protecting duty on timber in our favour, should the Colonial Trade Bill now before Parliament be passed, these Colonies, we are persuaded, would reap incalculable benefit from the carrying trade that would arise out of the new arrangement; but as there appears great probability of an immediate dissolution of Parliament, the measure will therefore be delayed for some months at least, and it might therefore be advisable for the Chamber of Commerce of this City to take the subject into consideration, and lay their sentiments on the contemplated Act before Parliament without delay.

The Reform Bill passed a second reading in the House of Commons by a majority of one. Whether Ministers will bring it forward for a third reading before the present Parliament, is yet uncertain, as an immediate dissolution was confidently spoken of, it being feared that the measure would be defeated, were it again introduced.

The success of the Poles over the Russians will give new energy to that brave and determined people, and will no doubt be the means, if not of enlisting other nations in their cause, at least of gaining an accession to their numbers from among the friends of liberty in different parts of the Globe. They have our best wishes for their success.

Our readers are referred to a Supplement which accompanies the present number of the Courier, for several very important documents respecting the North Eastern Boundary. The State of Maine, it will be seen from the Report adopted by both Houses of the Legislature, and approved by the Governor, is determined not to abide by the decision emanating from the King of the Netherlands. How this business will ultimately be settled it is impossible for us, at present, even to conjecture; nor can we discover why the State of Maine should come to so hasty a conclusion on the matter, when, in the House of Lords on the 14th March, a motion for producing the papers relative to the decision, was withdrawn, on the ground that all the matters relative to the subject were not then completed. Although the decision is equally unfavourable to Great Britain as the United States, yet, the question having been left to an arbitrator mutually chosen by both parties, we must, of course, now do justice to the defendant; but this, we hope, will be done without having recourse to the measures suggested by the "United Kingdom," a London paper, viz:—"We must offer compensation—assign lands elsewhere—give a slice out of the northwest—give Indians for English, and furs for freedom. If General Jackson should decline our terms, we of course must fight him; and leaving Washington in its wilderness unmolested, we must burn New York in order to bring him to his senses. This we can easily do; particularly as we are not at war with any other nation. We will be fools if we listen to any further terms of Negotiation. "Settle it at once" is the word, and let there be no mistake!"

A report has just reached town that the brig *Billow*, of Yarmouth, N. S. from Bermuda for Halifax, with part of the 77th Regt. on board, has been wrecked on Cape Sable, and all on board, consisting of 300 persons, perished.—About 150 bodies are said to have come ashore and were interred.

Sir Archibald Campbell.—As any information respecting the distinguished individual who has recently been appointed to the office of Lieutenant-Governor of this Province, in room of Sir Howard Douglas, will be of interest to our readers at the present moment, we copy the subjoined paragraph from the *Glasgow Scots Times*, of the 26th February:—"Among the distinguished individuals at present in Edinburgh, is Sir Archibald Campbell, the hero of the Burmese war. He visited the exhibition of the Scotch Academy on Saturday forenoon, and, we understand, purchased Mr. D. O. Hill's picture of Castle Tarbet, a view on Lochfine. Sir Archibald is a hale, spirited-looking veteran, wonderfully little worse of the pestilential climates he has sojourned in, and the dangers he has braved."

In another column of our paper we give notice of Monsieur de la Glaineur's intention of publishing a Grammar of the modern French language, with improvements in the arts of teaching. From the late hour that the work came into our hands, we have only time and place to-day for the short and brief dedication of that gentleman's (we believe almost first) writings since a dweller in our land. We will perhaps make some extracts in our next from the preface; and shortly will have prepared a subscription list for the reception of the names of those who may be desirous of promoting science and literature in our infant Province.

FIRE.—On Monday morning, about 3 o'clock, our citizens were awakened from their slumbers by the cry of fire, which was found to be in a house on the bridge leading from the City to Portland, owned by Mr. JAMES BURNS, and which, with a Shingle Maker's shop attached, owing to the great headway the fire had made before assistance reached the spot, were burnt to the ground. The house was occupied by the families. It is supposed the fire was occasioned by some defect in a stove pipe.—*Ibid.*

The Brig *Woodman*, Woodfendale, of this Port, in getting under way in L'Eau, (where she took shelter in the gale of the 9th inst) on Wednesday night, struck on a rock, but received no damage: the day following, however, when going at the rate of 3 or 5 miles an hour, she again struck on a sunken rock between Pope's Ferry and Indian Island, and was so much injured that she will return to this Port to receive the necessary repairs. There was a Pilot on board at the time.—Lieut. Col. Love and Lady, and Mr. H. P. Saxon, who were passengers on board the *Woodman*, arrived here on Wednesday evening last, in the *Plover* from Esaport.

EASTPORT, April 20.—*Melancholy Shipwreck*.—Schr. *Susan-Mary*, Captain John Davis, of Nova-Scotia on her passage from St. John, to this Port, went on shore at Beaver Harbour during the late gale, and all on board were drowned, with the exception of the Master and one man. The following are the names of the persons lost.—Mr. Robert Morris, of this town, a worthy and industrious young man; his sister, Mary Morris; Hugh M. Duffie; William Spaul, of Campbell; and James Harris. All the bodies, excepting the young woman's, have been found and decently interred at Beaver Harbour by Mr. A. N. Cross. The remains of Mr. Morris were brought to this place on Saturday last, and re-interred in the Cemetery from the North. Spirit Meeting-House, and followed to the grave by the Members of the "Mechanics Institute," of which he was one, and who, as a testimony of the respect they have for his memory, voted to wear crepe on the arm for thirty days.—*Sentinel.*

DOWNING-STREET, LONDON, MARCH 21.—The King has been pleased to appoint Sir G. C. B. to be Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New-Brunswick and its Dependencies.

COLONIAL INTERCOURSE BILL.
[The following is a copy of an Act said to have been submitted to Parliament on the 11th ultimo:—]

1st. Whereas, in an Act passed in the 6th year of the reign of his late Majesty King George IV. intitled "An Act to regulate the trade of the British Possessions abroad," and by subsequent Acts, made and passed, to alter and amend the said Act, certain duties of Customs are imposed upon articles of Foreign production, when imported or brought into the British Possessions in America; and whereas, it is expedient to discontinue some of the said duties, and to alter or vary others of them: Be it therefore enacted, &c. that from and after the ——— so much of the said Acts as imposes any duty, in any of the British Possessions in America, upon the importation or bringing in of Corn or Grain, unground; or of Meal or Flour, not made of Wheat, or of Bread or Biscuit, or of Rice, or of Live Stock; shall be, and the same is hereby repealed.

2nd. And be it further enacted, That so much of any of the said Acts as imposes any duty in the Provinces of Upper or Lower Canada upon the importation or bringing in of Wheat Flour, or of Beef, Pork, Hams or Bacon; or of Wood or Lumber, shall be, and the same is hereby repealed.

3rd. And be it further enacted, That so much of any of the said Acts as imposes any duty in New-Brunswick, Nova-Scotia, or Prince Edward Island, upon Wood or Lumber, shall be, and the same is hereby repealed.

4th. And be it further enacted, that so much of any of the said Acts as imposes any duty in the British Possessions on the Continent of South America, or in the West Indies, or in the Bahama or Bermuda Islands, upon the Flour of Wheat, or upon Beef, Pork, Hams or Bacon, or upon Wood or Lumber, when imported from any of the British Possessions in North America, shall be, and the same is hereby repealed.

5th. And be it further enacted, that upon the importation from any Foreign Country, into the British Possessions on the Continent of South America, or in the West Indies, or into the Bahama or Bermuda Islands, of the Articles mentioned in the following Table, there shall be raised, levied, collected, and paid, unto His Majesty, the several temporary additional Duties, as the same set forth in the said Table, that is to say:—

TABLE OF ADDITIONAL DUTIES.
Staves and Heading, until the 1st January, 1834, the 1000, 11s. 3d.; and on and from the 1st January, 1834, to the 1st January, 1836, the 1000, 7s. 3d.
White or Yellow Pine Lumber, until the 1st January, 1834, the 1000 ft. 1 inch thick, 7s.; and on and from the 1st January, 1834, to the 1st January, 1836, the 1000 ft. 1 inch thick, 5s.
