

per mode of arrangement was adopted with regard to the conduct of the laborers—that the idle and the dissipated were summarily dismissed, wherever idleness or dissipation was detected on them—that of all the emigrants who crowded to Fredericton the last summer, not ten families—not sixty souls, are now receiving permanent assistance from the parishes of Fredericton and Douglas, or beyond trifling, transient and voluntary donations from any charitable institution in those parishes; and when it is considered how destitute, how wretched were those who came, and who continued coming, until the River closed, and with what families they were burdened, I think it speaks highly in favor of the judicious steps taken by the Commissioners of the Royal Road. It also comes within my knowledge, Mr. Editor, that the Commissioners and the Secretary have devoted a great portion of their time, since June last, in the various details connected with exploring a Road on a line said to be impracticable, and employing, keeping in employment, and paying, from one to three hundred workmen—the great proportion of whom were new to the work and to the country, and not one shilling of the money has gone into their pockets, their services having been paid gratuitously; and with respect to my immense profits on the provisions, voluntarily purchased by the workmen, they were my sole remuneration for keeping and settling all the accounts connected with the Road; and after all the accounts were prepared and made up, the Commissioners and Secretary occupied five days of my time, and at a most busy season, in examining and comparing them with the vouchers.

Since queries are the order of the day, I trust I may be allowed to ask a Merchant, who appears quite cognizant on the subject, how many pounds, and how many shillings, and how many pence, the patriotic overseers of Fredericton and Douglas, have expended to the 9th of January, 1833, upon single men, and how many upon married men, who were working upon the Royal Road—not forgetting the families of such married men, and the families of married men who worked a short time on the Road, were dismissed for idleness, and cleared out—forgetting to take their families with them—And may I further request to be informed, when and I and my witnesses can meet a Merchant and his witnesses, to ascertain who has spoken truths and who has advanced falsehoods.

FROM EUROPE.—The N. York papers give extracts from Paris files, to Nov. 15, respecting the brig Mary Jane, from Rochelle. The only news of importance is the entrance of the French army into Belgium. The following particulars are given under date of Paris, Nov. 10:—

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THE Court of Oyer and Terminer and General Gaol Delivery, for this City and County, opened on Tuesday morning. His Honor Judge CHAPMAN, who presides, addressed the Grand Jury on the occasion, with his usual perspicuity and ability.—Some interesting and important cases have been tried, and we have not been able to obtain a report of them in time for our present number.

FIRE.—About five o'clock, last evening, the upper part of the dwelling house in Queen-street, was discovered to be on fire. The alarm being given, a great number of persons immediately repaired to the place, but for some time little or no exertion appeared to be making to extinguish the flames which were rapidly spreading, and threatening destruction to the surrounding neighbourhood.—We have seldom seen so much indifference to the consequences as was manifested by numbers on the occasion—at a time too when the flames had made their way through the roof—the wind fresh from the Northward—and the evening cold. At length the engines were supplied with water and set to work, and fortunately the Carleton engine arrived in a scow, from the opposite side of the Harbour, and by affording a constant supply of water to some of the other engines, was, in a great measure, the means of preventing the fire from spreading to the adjoining buildings which only a few moments before it seemed impossible to preserve.
The roof and upper stories of the building were destroyed by the fire, and the lower part was unnecessarily much cut, in the exertions made to save every thing that could be removed. Nearly the whole of the furniture, we believe, was secured, but in the hurry of removal, must have received injury.—The fire is supposed to have originated from a stove-pipe. The House and Furniture were insured in the New-Brunswick Fire Insurance Office.

It is to be regretted that the confusion and want of system which were apparent at the fire, our City authorities will see the necessity of immediately adopting and enforcing some better regulations than at present exist, for extinguishing fires within this City. At present, we have not time to point out the many defects in the present system, or the want of system; but as it is a subject in which all are more or less interested, we shall take care that it be not overlooked.

A Public Meeting was held at the County Court House in Fredericton, on Saturday evening last, for the purpose of taking into consideration the propriety of establishing a Liberal Newspaper Press at the Seat of Government. Several resolutions in favour of the proposed undertaking were passed, and it was determined that a Joint Stock Company should be formed, with a capital of £400, to be divided into shares of £1 each, for the purpose of carrying the object of the meeting into effect.

Beef and Pork.—The Legislature of Lower Canada has under consideration a bill to change the inspection system in that country from compulsory to voluntary—so that dealers may export salted Beef or Pork with or without inspection, taking their chance of the effect in a foreign market.—It is stated that provisions cured with Salina Salt will not keep well, and nothing of the kind is packed at Quebec with Liverpool salt. The character of Canada flour has risen under a system of compulsory inspection.

Extensive Forgery.—United States Bank.—The inhabitants of this town have recently had a piece of villainy practised on them which has never been equalled in our neighbourhood.—A vast number of Ten Dollar Notes of the United States Bank, have been in circulation for some time past, and the circumstance of their being forged did not come to light until within a few days ago. The notes have been traced as having been chiefly issued from a certain quarter of the town, and strong suspicions are attached to one or two individuals who are supposed to have been engaged in this affair, but as nothing has transpired to warrant their apprehension, we abstain from making any further remarks at present. Several individuals are more or less losers by the discovery, and a few of our mercantile friends have had payments made in counterfeit paper of the same description to the amount of \$100 to \$400. We would therefore caution the public to be on their guard, as many of them will not doubt find their way into different parts of the Province. Several articles being unfit for home consumption, we heartily wish that all concerned in this nefarious traffic, a speedy passage to the Westward, where we hope the rogues will soon meet with the treatment which in such cases is made and provided.—Royal Gazette.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY—LOWER CANADA, Thursday, December 27.

Mr. Wood reported the following answer of His Excellency to the address of Friday last:—
Gentlemen.—The Journals of the House of Assembly furnish abundant proofs of my desire to comply with the wishes of the House, by communicating to it such information as may be of use from time to time to require of the Executive Government.

Upon the present occasion, however, I find it necessary to desire that the House may be informed, that it is my duty to uphold the dignity of the high office in this colony which His Majesty has been graciously pleased to confide to my charge; and that considering, as I do consider, the compliance with the prayer of the Address which has just been presented to me, to be incompatible with that object, I cannot consent to inform the House whether I have, since the last Session of the Provincial Parliament, and what time, recommended any increase in the number of the Members of the Legislative Council, which persons I have recommended His Majesty's Government to appoint to that office, and whether it is probable that in consequence of such recommendations the same persons will soon be called to take their seats in the Legislative Council.
