Ordinary that this question should be brought forward, just at the moment when so important a matter was about to be determined. The hon. member for Gloucester (Mr. Ead) appeared to be turning his attention to an increase of representation in his own county, and therefore, perhaps, he advocated the introduction of the present bill. However that might be, he (Mr. C.) tho't the uncertainty of the Boundary a conclusive reason for delaying the consideration of this matter for the present. Mr. Taylor defended the measure, and represented its necessity, from the great hardships at present pressing on the remote inhabitants of the county. He observed, that the Boundary Line was always the bugbear brought forward in opposition to the division of the County of York. But if hon. members would but look at the map, and fairly consider the question, and then lay their hands on their hearts and say that the boundary line was a sufficient reason for preventing that division, he (Mr. T.) would be almost inclined to give up the question. But this argument was merely for the sake of opposition. The true reason was, that they were afraid of an increase of representation. This he firmly believed, and he would not hesitate to say so. He however had, nevertheless, no doubt that the bill would be enacted; and if it should be so, it would not affect the representation of the county during this Assembly. The bill would provide that no increase of Members would take place till the next general election. But as soon as the bill should receive his Majesty's royal assent, it would obviate the grievous difficulties under which the inhabitants of the county now labour, in regard to gaols, courts of session, &c. If hon. members would consider how many poor people are now compelled to travel hundreds of miles, to come to the courts at Fredericton; how much the great extent of the county tends to encourage vice, by enabling evil disposed persons to screen themselves in its remote parts; how the extent of the county almost amounts to a denial of justice, it being often better for a poor man to suffer injury, or the stealing of his cattle, than to come so far for redress; he (Mr. T.) was sure they would not oppose the bill. Mr. Clinch added a few remarks, which we understood to be in favor of the question. Leave given to bring in Bill; bill accordingly brought in, and read first time by its title.

EXTRACTS FROM THE JOURNALS.

Tuesday, February 22.

Mr. S. Hombert, Chairman from the Committee, to whom was referred the subject relative to Roads throughout the Province; reported, that they had taken the same into consideration, and he was directed to present the following; which he read, viz:—

"That they are of opinion, that the sum of seventeen thousand pounds should be applied to the improvement of the Roads throughout the Province, to be equally divided between the Great Roads and Bye Roads; that is, the sum of eight thousand five hundred pounds to the Great Roads, and the like sum of eight thousand five hundred pounds for the Bye Roads; which they recommend to be appropriated as follows:—

The Committee remark—"The above is the Total Revenue of the Province for the year 1830, agreeably to the foregoing returns.

"Your Committee, with great submission, however, beg leave to remark, that from the unusually large quantities of West India produce on hand in the Province on the 31st Dec. 1830, the exportations have been and will be very large the present year, and that, consequently, at least £2000 will be drawn back."

"The total Balance in the hands of the Province Treasurer, Dec. 31, 1830—£16,237 13 3½. Of which there are in Bonds, £13,722 2 1—In Cash, £2515 11 2½."

The Committee further remark—"These accounts are clear and methodically stated, and they give your Committee very great satisfaction."
