

LATEST FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

From Paris Press.

The Ambassador of France at Constantinople, to the President of the Council.
THEATRIA, July 8.—The Porte has received intelligence that a battle has been fought in the neighbourhood of Aleppo, and that the Turkish army has been defeated. The result of the battle has not been stated, but it was not stated whether or not the Egyptian army had pursued them.

The Gazette de France contains the following account of the engagement between the Turkish and Egyptian armies:—The Turkish army occupied a strong position at Nizli. Ibrahim, who had received the Sultan's permission to advance, had been ordered to assault this position in front; but Soliman Bey (Colonel Selim) succeeded in restraining his army, and it was agreed that the enemy should be drawn by manoeuvres from his entrenchments. The Egyptians made a feigned retreat; and the Seraskier, Haliz Pacha, sent out a strong division of cavalry. The first corps it came up with, composed of the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd divisions, and the 4th division, which was ordered to follow them, and the Seraskier, imagining that the Egyptians might be easily routed, advanced with the whole of his forces. Thus he advanced his strong position, and two formidable redoubts constructed by Russian officers, from which great advantage was to be derived. In order to draw the Turkish army from its position, the Seraskier, Haliz Pacha, sent out a strong division of cavalry. The first corps it came up with, composed of the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd divisions, and the 4th division, which was ordered to follow them, and the Seraskier, imagining that the Egyptians might be easily routed, advanced with the whole of his forces. Thus he advanced his strong position, and two formidable redoubts constructed by Russian officers, from which great advantage was to be derived.

On reaching this ground the Egyptian army suddenly fell right about, and, availing itself of the nature of the position, formed into compact masses, the infantry in the centre, the cavalry and light artillery on each wing, and made vigorous charges on the Turks, who were astounded by this sudden attack. The ranks of the latter were soon thrown into disorder. The Seraskier, however, rode up to the front, and by his valor and the bravery of his troops, he succeeded in rallying them. He then ordered them to form again, and the light guns of the Egyptians, directed by European officers, and seconded by well-trained charges of cavalry, threw his ranks into disorder. His wings were at the same time too extended, and his troops, excited by the ardor of pursuit, could not preserve any regular order of battle; they could not resist any resistance; and at this period some corps of Arabs, which Ibrahim in his retreat left in ambush, on the right and left, fell upon the Turkish rear, and thus completely put the Ottoman troops to the rout.

The disorder became so great that the Turkish soldiers threw away their arms, and fled in the greatest confusion. Part of the troops endeavored to gain the entrenched camp, while others made for the most formidable points in the Euphrates. It appears that a large portion of the fugitives succeeded in escaping, and that the massacre was not so great as might have been expected. But the camp, artillery, baggage, and even the muskets of the Egyptian army, fell into the hands of the Egyptians. The Seraskier, carried away in the general rout, crossed the Euphrates. His horse, wounded by a ball in the shoulder, fell from loss of blood in the middle of the river, and would have been carried away by his rider, when a young Albanian, on a small Egyptian horse, seized the Seraskier by the middle of his stirrups, and carried him safely to the bank. Three hours after Ibrahim was repulsed under the tent of the Seraskier.

THE TURKISH FLEET IN THE HANDS OF THE EGYPTIANS.

The Moniteur of Friday, July 25, received by extraordinary express, has the following important telegraphic despatch:—

MARSEILLES, July 25, 3 P. M.—On the 8th, the Sultan's death was known at Alexandria. On the 9th, a Turkish corvette, having on board Nezh Bey, captain of the fleet, charged to announce to the viceroy the presence of the Sultan. The viceroy, on receiving this news, immediately ordered him to place the Turkish fleet under his protection to guarantee it against the troubles to be feared in Turkey on the Sultan's death. The viceroy's reply is not known, but he has sent the steamer, the Black Sea, to the captain pacha. On the 10th, Asif Effendi, sent by the young Sultan to announce his father's death to the viceroy, arrived at Alexandria.

PARIS, Friday, Five P. M.—The above news has produced a great sensation and the diplomatic corps is in dismay. The Augsburg Gazette of the 22nd inst. states that the two fleets, Turkish and Egyptian, will sail to Constantinople together, to overturn the new order of things.

The Semaphore of Marseilles, of the 23d, announces the arrival of Prince de Joinville at Constantinople on the 8th. Ibrahim's bulletin of the victory says that he would pursue the enemy, but he cannot find them. Letters from Alexandria of the 6th inst. great reveal there. On the 10th, the French envoy, the French envoy, had not arrived at Ibrahim's headquarters.

This corroboration of the defection of the Turkish admiral with the fleet is bad enough. But worse and still more startling tidings have we fear, to be added to it. These are, that the members of the Egyptian army, who were ordered to follow the Turkish fleet, have taken a step similar to that of the captain pacha, and have written to Mehmet Ali to put themselves and the Sultan under his protection, offering him the hereditary government of Syria and Egypt, and inviting Mehmet Ali to Constantinople to reorganize the government.

Knowledge of the captain pacha's defection—an insurrection prepared at Constantinople as well as in Albania—is said to have decided Khosrew and Halli to this surrender of the empire and of their young sovereign. Their own disagreement, their want of mutual confidence, and the complete inexperience of Abdul Medjid, are the motives which led the ministers to submit to the Egyptian pacha, by a simultaneous, but, it appears, by no joint step.

Death of Sultan Mahmoud.—The Austrian official paper, announces the death of the Sultan to have taken place on the 1st of July. The Augsburg Gazette asserts that he really expired on the 29th June, at 4 in the afternoon, but that the event was kept secret till the 1st. The correspondence states that Mahmoud had solemnly sworn, on the 26th, to all the great functionaries, being conscious of his approaching fall, "declaring that he had nothing to reproach himself with, and asking those around whether they could say the same."

He then called to him his heir Abdul Medjid, his son-in-law Haliz Pacha, and Khosrew; and told his successor to depend on Khosrew and Halli, taking the first as an example of firmness and courage, the latter as the symbol of prudence and circumspection. "In these times of trouble and tumult, foolish work I have begun." This German correspondent represents the Sultan as greatly irritated against France, and as having expressed his indignation at the French attitude towards Egypt. He called upon all the authorities of his empire (the creations of a few years ago), Muslims in faith, the children of Christian Europe by education, and recommended to them the most touching terms, his young heir, the all-wise to fulfill his wishes.

The Sultan left seven children by his wives—three sons and four daughters. He succeeded on the throne by his eldest son, a youth of eighteen, named Abdul Medjid—who has been elevated to the throne at a troublesome time—a time which would require all the energy of his father in his best days, to guide successfully the helm of State.

Previous to his death he issued an order to set free all persons who had been imprisoned for political offences. He also made large bequests to the poor, and before he died he burst into tears. He wept—his empire menaced in so many ways—his son, left to him, exposed to so many dangers. He called upon all the authorities of his empire (the creations of a few years ago), Muslims in faith, the children of Christian Europe by education, and recommended to them the most touching terms, his young heir, the all-wise to fulfill his wishes.

 doubt as to the secret machinations and intrigues
 of Russia against the British interests, they are
 here so plainly exhibited, that we need not be in
 quest of perfect conviction to every unprejudiced mind.
 The papers are voluminous, and many of them of
 little importance except that of keeping up the
 chain of history relating to the events; but the
 documents, especially of certain official documents,
 which are at once conclusive as to Russian de-
 signs, and of the utter recklessness of principle
 with which they are followed up.
